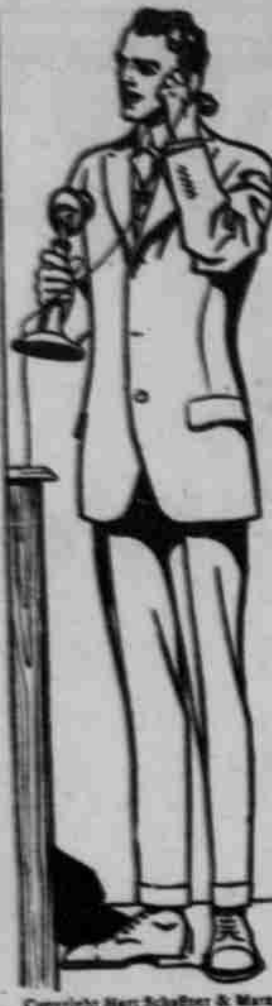

Steam schooner Beached. MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 14.—After leaving North Bend the steam schooner Tiverton, heavily loaded with lumber, listed so that she was in danger of turning over in deep water. She was run on the mud flats in North Slough, where she now stands almost on her port side.

Later it was found necessary to release the deckload of lumber. Part of it has been saved, but the bay is filled with floating lumber.

JAPAN WILL SPEND \$600,000 AT THE EXPOSITION

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—(Special)—The government of Japan will expend \$600,000 at the Panama-Pacific Exposition next year. In addition to an almost priceless exhibit of rare tapestries lacquer work and paintings an exhibit will be made of Japan's industrial progress. The Japanese pavilion will be built in the historic architecture of Nippon. The grounds, covering five acres, will be transformed by Japanese landscape gardeners. It is said that upon the conclusion of the exposition the building, which is upon the United States Presidio reservation, will become the property of the government, the gift of Japan to the United States.
