Local Visitor Declares Pancho Villa Delayed Torreon Fight to Allow Pictures to be Taken

Confirmation of the dispatch yesterday from Youngstown, Ohio, to the effect that General Villa delayed his attack upon Torreon in order that moving pictures might be made of the event is given today by John F. Connolly, northwest representative of Pathe Frere who is here conferring with Manager Orliphant of the Alha theater. Mr. Connolly declares positively that James A. Galligan, the Pathe camera operator in Mexico, was responsible for the delay and he has a copy of a letter written to Don Manuel Gonzalez by Pedro Aguirre of the staff of General Villa commenting upon the manner in which the attack was postponed.
