Home Hints and Recipes

Wedding Vases.
Wedding vases are named as follows: First, cotton; second, paper; third, leather; fourth, fruit and flowers; fifth, wooden; sixth, sugar; seventh, wooden; eighth, rubber; ninth, willow; tenth, tin; eleventh, steel; twelfth, silk and fine linen; thirteenth, lace; fourteenth, ivory; fifteenth, crystals; twentieth, china; twenty-fifth, silver; thirtieth, pearl; fortieth, ruby; fiftieth, golden; sixtieth, diamond.

Name Card Plants.
Small potted artificial plants are still used effectively for place favors. A tiny card can be tied to these little plants for a name card. Artificial rose trees in square little porcelain tubs are pretty. Flowering violets are also good.

To Clear Honey.
To obtain strained honey, by separating the honey from the wax as it comes to us in the frame, place the frame in a bowl in the oven, just warm enough to melt the honey and wax may be skimmed off the top without any trouble.

Table Runner Is Stenciled.
Very effective for a table runner is one of the Japanese stencils. These stencils can be purchased already cut and are applied in the same way as other stencils, using either oil paints or dyes, says the New Orleans Picayune.

Cream Linen or Gray or Cream
crush is most effective fabric for a table runner, and whatever material is chosen, it should be wide enough for the selvage, to finish off the hem at each end, about four inches deep.

The Care of Children

Somebody Should Count Our Babies.
In the May Woman's Home Companion Miss Julia C. Lathrop, chief of the children's bureau in the United States Department of Labor, writes an interesting article entitled "The Safe-guarding of the Child"—full of new facts and ideas. She goes on to show that if the waste of infant life is to be diminished, doctors and nurses must get into touch with the children and their mothers at the earliest possible moment after birth.

Nothing, it is said, has done so much toward lessening infant mortality in England as a law now rigidly enforced in that country which requires the registration of all births within thirty-six hours. In the following extract from Miss Lathrop's article appears a statement of an amazing condition of affairs in the United States: "Unfortunately we have in the United States no adequate laws to cover the entire country, compelling the registration of births. In only eight of the states—the New England states, Pennsylvania, and Michigan—are birth records kept in such a way as to meet the requirements of the census bureau, and even in those states not all of the states are registered."

"No immigrant can enter this country without the making of a record of his or her sex, age, and nationality; but the nation keeps no books to show how many children enter the United States by birth. Nobody knows how many babies are born in the United States, or where they are born. The importance of putting down a baby's birth in the public records is a new idea to people in this country—whereas in European lands such records have long been kept most painstakingly."

MANUFACTURERS MEET TO DISCUSS ISSUES

LEGISLATIVE MEASURES ARE TOPICS CONSIDERED BY NATIONAL BODY.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Discussion of legislative issues affecting industries, with James A. Emery as the principal speaker, was the important business before the second and closing sessions of the nineteenth annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers here today. Reports on legislative issues were made by committees on immigration, uniform state laws, patents, etc.

C. J. Modskhovsky, commercial attaché to the Imperial Russian Embassy at Washington, Manuel Gonzalez, Z. consul general for Costa Rica in New York, and other prominent men, spoke on export trade opportunities in Russia, South America and West Africa. An innovation has been planned for the banquet tonight when the wives and daughters of the attending delegates and visitors will be seated at the regular tables instead of in the galleries as heretofore. Among the speakers at the banquet will be Curtis Guild, formerly governor of Massachusetts, and later ambassador to Russia. One of the interesting side features during the convention has been an elaborate exhibit devoted to the various phases of fire prevention in factories and all industrial plants.

TOLD OF FAMOUS PEOPLE

Robert E. Lee, as captain of engineers, arranged the American batteries when the United States forces landed at Vera Cruz in 1847. Lee's brother, a naval lieutenant, served one of the guns, and here Lee's first impressions of war. "Whenever I turned my eyes reverted to him, and I stood by his gun whenever I was not wanted elsewhere. Oh, I felt awfully, and am at a loss what I should have done had he been cut down before me. * * * He preserved his usual cheerfulness, and I could see his white teeth through all the smoke and din of the fire."

It is asserted and also denied that porridge was the cause of Thomas Carlyle's ruined digestion. Sir Ritchie and Quin sold porridge had nothing to do with his ruined digestion. PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—With the Willamette river steadily rising water crept over the lower deck of Ash street dock yesterday. This is the lowest structure in use in the harbor. The river rose six-tenths of a foot here for 24 hours up to 3 a. m. yesterday, standing at 15.5 feet above zero.

District Forecaster Beale says there will be a stage of 14.5 feet today and 15 feet tomorrow.

At Lewiston the Snake rose one-tenth of an inch and at Camilla the Columbia gained three-tenths.
