**DECISION QUESTIONED
IN BAKER'S VICTORY**

**McKEEN LOOKS SAFE IN NINTH
BUT UMPIRE CALLS
HIM OUT.**

BAKER, Ore., May 21.—Baker won from Pendleton 4 to 3 yesterday on a questionable decision by Umpire Roy Beck who called McKeen out at the plate in the ninth when he surely looked safe. Fulwider deserved to win more easily than he did. He pitched a five hit game and with a little better backstopping would have blanked the visitors.

Baker got to Schroeder early and scored in the first, two more in the third on clean hitting and another in the fourth on three hits, one a two bagger. Schroeder tightened then but it was too late. The Bucks scored in the third on a passed ball, walk and Varian's double. In the eighth they made another on a walk, error and putout and in the ninth Peterson tripled and scored, after McKeen had walked on a double steal. Coen then walked after Briggs had sacrificed and again the double steal was tried. It looked as though McKeen was safe by a mile but Beck didn't see it that way.

**IRRIGATIONISTS TO
MEET AT CALGARY**

CALGARY, Alta., May 21.—The Dominion government has been requested by the board of control of the International Irrigation congress to invite delegates from all countries where irrigation agriculture is practiced, to attend the 21st Congress in Calgary, Oct. 5 to 9. In addition to the foreign representatives and speakers there will attend expert irrigationists from the principal stations of the union and the provinces of the Dominion.

The congress this year promises to be one of the most notable in the history of the organization from an educational standpoint, and from the economic results which may follow. There is much in the methods which have been so successfully used by the Canadians which can be studied and to some extent adopted by the home builders of the states. Methods of colonization are to be given special attention.

The congress work is in charge of a board of governors consisting of Geo. A. Snow, Salt Lake City, chairman; Major Richard W. Young, president of the congress, Salt Lake City; J. S. Dennis, chairman of the local board of control, which has been organized at Calgary; Douglas White, Los Angeles; Lou D. Sweet, Denver; L. Newman, Great Falls; and Arthur Hooker, secretary of the congress, of Spokane.

Delegates will be shown over the great irrigation project which begins practically at the city limits and extends 150 miles to the east. This is the largest project of its kind on the American continent, embracing over 3,000,000 acres and on which millions of dollars have been spent. Hunting and fishing abound in the mountains near Calgary and the meeting comes at a delightful season of the year for tourists.

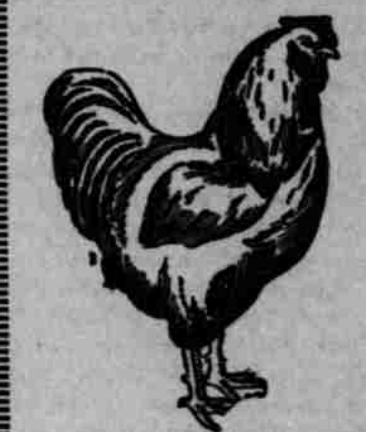
