VAST TERRITORY TO BE EXPLORED

EDMONTON, Alta., May 21.—Exploration of the hinterland of Alberta and the vast untraversed territory between the 60th parallel of latitude and the Arctic ocean will be continued this season by officials of the geological and meteorological services, the fisheries department and the geological and topographical surveys of the dominion government. Several parties are already in Edmonton to outfit for trips of from five to eight months' duration in the northern wilderness.

One of the parties is headed by John Pattison of the Toronto observatory, who is journeying to the Arctic ocean in connection with international work in the study of air currents in the Eskimo region. He is accompanied by George Hall Ingram, who is studying the natural history of the far northern areas with a view to placing his discoveries at the disposal of scientists. The outward trip will include a voyage of 1,000 miles by canoe on the Athabasca and Mackenzie rivers.

Charles Camsell of the geological survey, who was born at Fort Simpson, at the confluence of the Mackenzie and Liard rivers in northern Alberta, will make a map of the unexplored mineral territory in the Mackenzie river basin. He is accompanied by Francis Harper, dominion biologist, and F. J. Alecock and A. O. Haultain. The party will also endeavor to find the source and cause of Thelon river, which is supposed to rise in a chain of unknown lakes, several hundred miles north of the Dubawnt river.

C. D. Melville of Edmonton, will be head of a party of three explorers on an expedition to the east coast of Hudson and James Bay.

FOREST FIRES SEASON GET EARLY START THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The first reports of forest fires have begun to come in to Washington from the national forests and they indicate to the federal officers an early start of the fire season, with unfavorable weather conditions from the very beginning. In the northwest there was less snow on the mountains at the end of the winter than for many years past. Railroad rights of way which were last year deep in snow are reported clear now and dry enough to burn readily.

From the Canadian border to Mexico the reports are similar, and there have already been extensive fires in California and Arizona.

The chief forester reports, however, that the fire-fighting forces of the service are organized better than ever before, particularly in respect to the fire detection system of lookout stations. By means of these stations fires are reported quickly and accurately, so that the control forces may be on the ground at the earliest possible moment.

In those states where the gravest danger threatens, special efforts are being made by the government foresters and by cooperative fire protection associations organized among timber owners, to secure care with fire on the part of campers, prospectors, loggers and by railroads. The northwestern forestry and conservation association, with headquarters at Portland, Oregon, is one of the leaders in this campaign.

The contests in sweeping, table setting and bed making attracted more entries than all the other departments and showed more skill in house keeping than is expected of children of the common schools.

Being primary election day the attendance of the fathers was small but nearly all the mothers and big sisters were present and assisted as judges. The interest is increasing in industrial education. Faithful work has been done by the principal and teachers.

Saturday, May 16, at the city hall the school gave a fine entertainment. They were assisted by the local musicians. Mrs. McCollum playing the piano, Joe Papan the violin and A. H. Kirby the cornet. There were three drills which were well performed by the younger pupils and a play well executed by the older pupils.
