## MUTTON MARKET WEAKER

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—The market for mutton was very sluggish for the day. There were quite heavy arrivals since yesterday's report and general conditions indicate a loss of about a dime in the former price.

Weakness has appeared in the trade for mutton in the east and at some points lower values were the rule. At Omaha the trade was rather depressed with a loss of 10 to 15c in the former price.

## WHEAT DAMAGE REPORTED

CHICAGO, May 21.—Severe damage to the wheat crop is indicated by reports. John Inglis, the crop expert, is back in the city and says: "We have more or less sporadic cases of damage from Hessian fly but this year it is a severe situation, which is causing more consideration as to the probable outcome of the wheat crop. Many sections along the Missouri river, where there is a large acreage in wheat, think that they will have from 25 to 50 per cent. Some sections of Illinois are badly infested with both the chinch bug and the fly. Both corn and oats are looking poor."

Wheat opened at an advance of 1-4 @ 1-2c a bushel and closed with a net rise of 1 5-8c for May, 1c for July and 7-8c for September.
