WASHINGTON TOWN IS WIPED OUT BY FIRE

LEBAM IS PREY TO FLAMES AND MANY FAMILIES ARE HOMELESS.

LEBAM, Wash., May 22.—The heart of Lebam is practically a pile of wreckage and debris, entirely wiped out, except for a few outlying homes and buildings, by a fierce fire at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, which, while it lasted, assumed the proportions of a conflagration. The estimated loss is about \$500,000.

Paper, shingle, planing and saw-mills, railroad depot and warehouses, business blocks, hotels, merchandise stores and churches and many dwellings are included which will cause a total loss of at least half a million dollars. This conservative estimate may be increased when all losses are known.

Many of the 600 to 800 inhabitants are without homes, and worse yet, without food, practically all manner of edibles having been consumed in the rush of the flames. One loaf of bread is all that remains from the destruction of the bakery.

With a strong wind blowing, with no available water except that to be pumped from wells, and everything as dry as tinder the flames made remarkable headway, rushing simultaneously in many directions, once they had gained uncontrolled headway in the boiler room of the Lebam Mill and Lumber company paper mill.

The fire communicated immediately from the paper mill to the saw, shingle and planing mills, jumped the tracks to the Northern Pacific railroad yards, licking up the depot as it ran, badly scorching a Northern Pacific train that was passing, and then continued to spread through the business and residence sections.

One building was dynamited in an effort to check the flames but proved unavailing.

Gorki Is Writing Play.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 22.—In an interview with a representative of the Bourse Gazette Maxim Gorki stated that he preferred not to discuss his trial on a charge of sacrilege. He does not, however, seem to be expecting any trouble, inasmuch as he has sent and is sitting up a residence in St. Petersburg. Meanwhile he is traveling in Finland.

Mr. Gorki is writing a play which he expects to produce at the People's theatre which is to be founded at Moscow. He believes that the future of the stage lies in the hands of the young democratic intelligence, and that the plays of the future will be "dramatic melodrama."

Aged Man Killed by Bull.

ALBANY, Ore., May 22.—Gored by an angry bull at his farm, five miles east of Albany, John H. Kamph died two hours later.

Mr. Kamph, who was 70 years old, entered the barn lot to drive the bull into the barn. It charged at Mr. Kamph suddenly, threw him against a fence and gored him several times.

Two sons in a nearby field ran to his rescue and, armed with pitchforks drove the animal back after considerable effort. Mr. Kamph was terribly injured and never regained consciousness.

Mr. Kamph was a native of Ohio and had lived in Linn county for the last 11 years. He is survived by a widow and 11 children.

237 Mail Boxes Tampered

LONDON, May 21.—Sydney Drew, printer and publisher of the Suffragette, the newspaper representing the militant section, was committed for trial at the Old Bailey, charged with inciting members of the Women's Social and Political Union to commit malicious damage to property.

An official of the postoffice testified that 237 letter boxes had been tampered with and 4000 letters damaged by suffragettes.

PERSONAL LIBERTY ADVOCATES OPEN FIGHT

CINCINNATI, May 22.—Ohio personal liberty advocates formally opened war on the movement recently started for state-wide prohibition. A huge demonstration was planned starting with a street parade and ending with a big mass meeting in Music hall where the best speakers at the command of the personal liberty forces will be on the program.

It was estimated by those in charge of the parade that 35,000 men would be in line. The city has been divided into sub-districts and marshals appointed for each one. These marshals have made it a point to personally visit every man they believed would join the demonstration and invite him to participate.

Safety Taught by Movies.

NEW YORK, May 22.—Motion pictures are to be used by the Safety First Society in helping to educate the public so that fewer persons will be killed in the streets. Ralph Polka, secretary of the society, was informed by the Motion Picture Exhibitors association of Greater New York that it will show "safety first" films without cost to the society.

Mayor Mitchell said when he heard this: "The picture film may be made one of the greatest educational forces. I know of no better use of films or slides than to teach pedestrians, children in particular, how to make safe and proper use of the streets."

Painter of Peasants Dies.

NEW YORK, May 22.—Advice from Auvers sur Oise, France, made public here, announced the death there of Charles Sprague Pearce, the artist. Mr. Pearce was born in Boston in 1851. He attained much fame as a painter of peasants and fishermen, and was a conspicuous figure in art circles of Paris, where he made his home for many years. He had not been in America for 15 years.

FAMOUS AUTHOR WILL CAMP IN THE ROCKIES

EDMONTON, Alta., May 22.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of the "Sherlock Holmes" adventures, and Lady Doyle, will camp in the Yellowstone Park of the Canadian Rockies, west of here, for several weeks this summer, according to London advice received today by the Woman's Press Club of Edmonton, officers and members of which organization will give a reception in honor of the distinguished writer on his arrival in this city. The letter states that Sir Arthur and his wife will sail from Southampton on May 26. They will visit various parts of the United States and Canada before and after their vacation in the mountains. It is intimated that Sir Arthur's view upon Canada as a country for the British will be expressed in a book, in which

he will deal with conditions and affairs as they are. Sir Arthur visited North America several years ago when he passed most of the time in this and neighboring provinces and the North Country.

OREGON DAIRY RECORDS ARE RELATIVELY HIGH

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., May 22.—The supremacy of Oregon as a dairy state, as often asserted by the Agricultural College Dairy Department, is being verified by tests and records made in various parts of the state. The number of cattle of any one breed in Oregon is very small in comparison with the number of that breed in the United States, yet the number of cows that have made note-worthy records in Oregon is a very large percentage of

the entire number in the United States.

In the Jersey breed this condition is most noticeable. Of sixteen cows in the United States that have produced over 100 pounds of butter in a year, 12 are in Oregon.

Of 25 cows that have produced more than 800 pounds of butter, 20 are in Oregon. Of 100 cows that have produced more than 700 pounds of butter, 80 are in Oregon. There are but 5 cows in the whole country that have produced above 1000 pounds of butter per year, but there is one more that came within 7.1 ounces of reaching the mark, and that one is an Oregon cow.

The foregoing figures are from official records, which are kept by but few dairymen. There are more than 60 breeders of pure bred Jerseys in

Oregon, and but twelve are doing advanced registry work. This is called a poor showing by Professor Graves, head of the College Dairy department, but it has accomplished enough to show Oregon's unexcelled dairy record.

County Defends Roads

MARSHFIELD, Or., May 21.—Good road bonds were defeated in the county districts at the special election in this county, although the cities gave good majorities.

The vote was 1559 for and 2082 against.

Falling Halibut Kilt

MUZZQUIZ, Coahuila, Mex., May 21.—Sixteen lives were lost in a tornado which swept this town.

Hail stones of enormous size fell and several who lost their lives were killed by being struck by the stones.

WRITES AN AUTONOMY — RUSSIAN AUTHOR JAILED

ST. PETERSBURG, May 21.—For publishing a book on "Autonomy, Regional and National," Prof. Beaudou de Courtonay, a member of the Imperial Academy of Russia, today began serving a two years' sentence in one of the fortresses. Because he advocated the granting by Russia of autonomy to individual districts, the court held that the book was an incitement to the overthrow of the existing government. Prof. de Courtonay is one of the leading literary men of the empire and a recognized authority on Slavonic languages.

Richland and Newbridge, Baker county, are to be supplied with a mountain water system to cost \$50,000.
