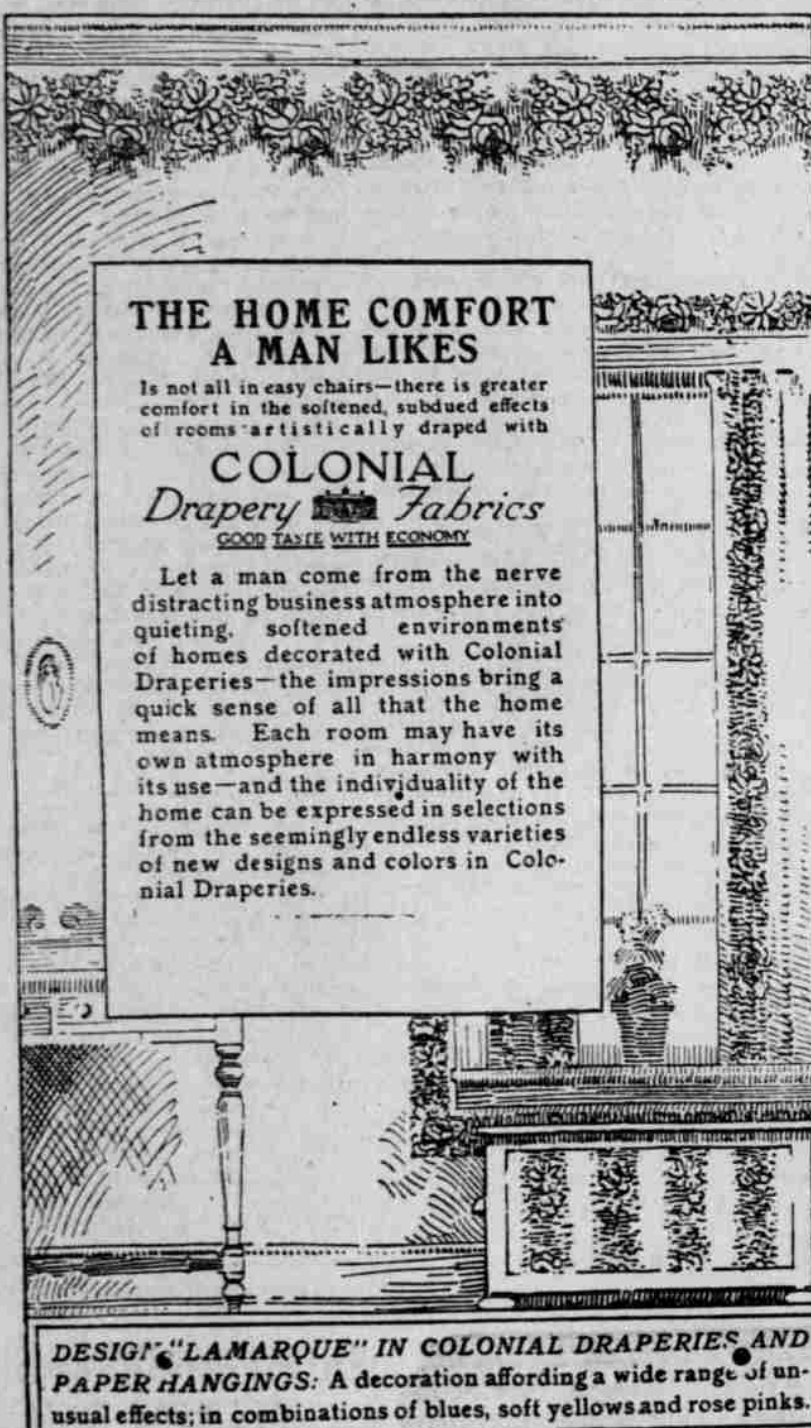

The Care of Children

Important Results in Philadelphia.

The Better Babies idea has been given a remarkable demonstration in Ward 19 of Philadelphia by the local Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Association, under the direction of Mrs. Charles P. Mercer, state chairman of the Department of Child Hygiene. This is distinctly a residential ward, and mothers were induced to attend conferences on child-health by the offer of prizes to babies showing the greatest improvement. These conferences were in charge of nurses and doctors, who examined, weighed, and measured babies and talked on topics of interest to mothers. The attendance was very large and the improvement in the condition of babies marked. As a result of one year's work the rate of infant mortality in the Nineteenth ward was reduced 44 per cent which figures can be verified through Doctor Neff, head of the Philadelphia board of health. This improvement in the condition of babies is a magnificent testimony of what can be done through education in motherhood and the Nineteenth ward is a bright spot of light against which the rest of the city stands out darkly. The work could be carried forward in other wards if the city would supply the funds or follow the plans of Mrs. Mercer and her associates. 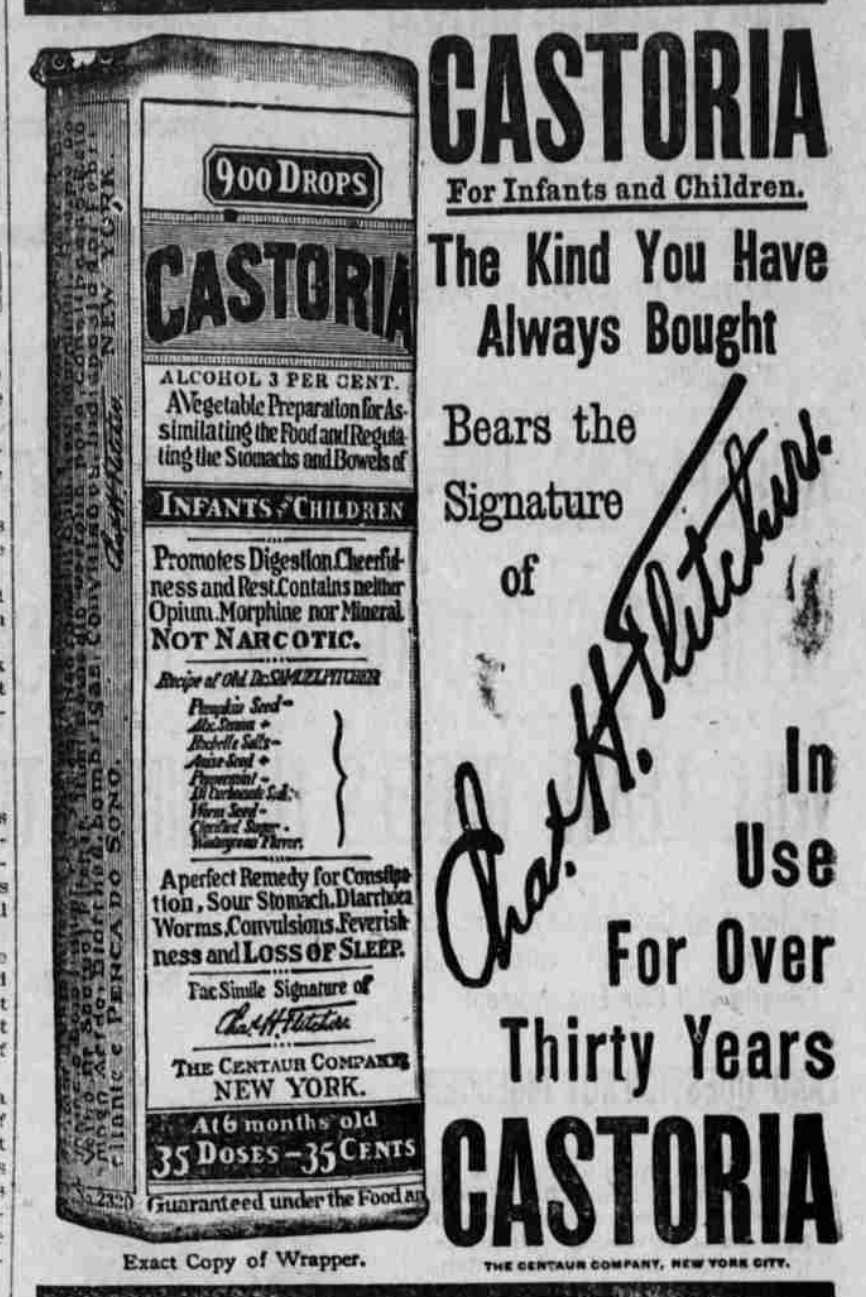

OREGON DEVELOPMENT TALKED AT SESSION

ORGANIZATION OF CITIES IS AMONG SUBJECTS AT ENGINEERING MEETING.

EUGENE, Ore., May 28.—"The Twentieth Century Oregon Municipalities and the Twentieth Century Oregon Rural Community," was the theme of this morning's session of the Oregon Commonwealth Conference at the state university here.

An interesting paper entitled "The Political Organization of Our Cities," was read by City Commissioner W. L. Brewster of Portland.

Marshall Dana, a Portland newspaperman, who has made a study of the subject, discussed the organization of the Oregon city for efficiency in its every day interests.

L. W. Weir, field secretary of the American Playground Association, advocated the extension of playgrounds and social centers in urban and rural communities.

At a special meeting this afternoon Oregon Development was discussed and the following papers read: "Report of the Oregon Hydro-Electric Commission," by W. D. B. Dodson, secretary of the commission; "Procedure and Program for Prompt Development of Oregon Resources," by State Engineer John H. Lewis; "The Oregon Commercial and Industrial Survey," by R. W. Raymond, secretary of the board of advisors; "Rural Credit Facilities for Oregon," two papers, one each by Dr. Hector MacPherson and H. G. Starkweather, members of the Oregon Rural Credit Commission; "Organization of the State System for Land Exchanges in Oregon," by L. L. Sharp, chief of the field division of the United States Land office; Prof. O. F. Stafford delivered a lecture, illustrated with experiments, on "Chemical Utilization of Nitrogen of the Air."
