A Building for Iowa Babies. Mrs. J. Edward Johnson, of the City Federation of Women's clubs at Sioux City, and Mr. Joe Morton, secretary of the Interstate Fair Association, who conducted the splendid contest at the fair last year, are working together for a bigger and finer contest this September. They have secured an appropriation for a Better Babies Building.

Work in Indiana. The Indiana state board of health is conducting a fine baby-saving campaign from its headquarters in Indianapolis.

Dr. J. N. Hurty, the secretary, is not satisfied to distribute leaflets and bulletins to doctors but he sends, with each a personal letter.

Governor Haskin is so interested in the campaign for securing a complete registration of babies born in Indiana and extending educational help to parents that he sends to the mother of each baby whose birth is reported by the attending physician or nurse this personal message:

My Dear Madam: I learn from the records of the state board of health that a baby has come to bless your life, and I write to offer my congratulations.

The state is deeply interested in all its mothers and their children, for they constitute the very foundations of the state; and for this reason there is a law requiring doctors to report for legal record all births they attend within thirty-six hours after they occur. The birth of your baby has been made of legal record in the state house at Indianapolis, and this is of great importance to the child and to you.

I sincerely hope that you and all the children which God may give to you, will always have good health and enjoy useful and happy lives.

GREATEST ENGLISH SHIP SOON TO SAIL

GIANT AQUITANIA, BIGGEST IN WORLD, PREPARES FOR MAIDEN VOYAGE.

LIVERPOOL, May 28.—The giant Cunarder Aquitania, Britain's largest liner and the world's most luxurious ship, sails tomorrow on her maiden voyage to New York. The liner which cost roughly \$10,000,000 to build, is 901 feet long, 87 feet broad, and her gross tonnage is 47,000. Although she will share the mail service with the Mauretania and the Lusitania, the Aquitania will not try to beat the records of her speedy sisters but will content herself with a comparatively modest 23 knots an hour.

Accommodation is provided for 3,500 passengers and a crew of 1000. Warned by the Titanic disaster the designers have allotted room for all. A new feature is the provision of two powerful motor launches which if necessary can tow the ordinary lifeboats. Each is fitted with a 300-mile range wireless installation in case of accident to the liner's main apparatus. The Aquitania is two ships in one, for the inner shell is separated from the outer shell by fifteen feet, which with a new system of water-

NEW CURRENCY LAW WILL AVERT PANICS

BANKER A. L. MILLS OF PORTLAND EXPLAINS MEASURE IN ADDRESS.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28.—"I do not believe we shall ever again see such panics as we had in 1873, 1893 and 1907," said A. L. Mills, president of the First National Bank, addressing the Progressive Business Men's Club yesterday on the newly enacted currency law.

Mr. Mills described in plain language the purposes of the new currency measure and how it is expected to work and detailed some of the steps already taken to place it in operation.

The currency bill is intended, he explained, to provide three principal remedies for existing financial ills: First, a mobilization of the bank resources of the country; second, an emergency currency in time of financial stress, and third, a system of rediscounting that will at all times provide greater elasticity to the nation's currency.

He then related how the federal reserve board, sitting at Washington, is to administer the affairs of the new system and of how the 12 reserve districts, recently formed by the board,

are to govern the affairs of the banks in their respective districts.

Concrete Example Explained.

In further explanation he applied the concrete example of the way the 12th reserve district in which Portland is located, now is being organized. For the purpose of effecting this organization J. W. Newkirk, cashier, and Henry L. Corbett, vice president of the First National Bank, recently attended a meeting at San Francisco with officials of four other banks in this district. There they formally formed the new bank and applied to the federal authorities at Washington for a charter, permitting it to begin business. As soon as this charter is issued all the member banks in the district will be notified and instructed to pay their stock subscriptions into the new bank.

The manner of electing the directors of the regional banks was further described. Three sets of three directors each are provided for. The first set consists of "Class A" directors, who must be active bankers; Class B directors must be business men within the district and Class C directors are appointed by the federal reserve board. They must live within the district, but cannot be officers or directors of any bank, although they are permitted to own bank stock.

Directors Close to City.

At a recent preliminary meeting in San Francisco, Mr. Mills explained, it was agreed that none of the Class A or Class B directors should live more than six hours from San Francisco, so as to facilitate the work of organ-

izing and operating the new bank.

He briefly discussed the provisions made for establishing branch banks at Portland, Seattle, Salt Lake City and Los Angeles and predicted that these branches probably will be ready for business within a few months after the main bank at San Francisco is opened. The San Francisco bank probably will be ready, he said, in time to handle this year's crops.

"While the new system is expected to be an important factor in improving business conditions, the business man, as a matter of fact, will have no direct relations with the reserve banks," Mr. Mills went on.

"He will continue to transact his business with the individual banks now in operation, as the reserve bank cannot take deposits from others than its stockholders, nor can the business man borrow money from the reserve bank directly. That bank simply is a bank of banks, a central reservoir for the individual banks of the district, where they will deposit their funds and where they will borrow money for their needs.

Notes to Have Fixed Maturity.

"Although the individual business man will have no direct dealings with the reserve bank, he will be affected by the requirements of the new system, which provide that all notes will be made with a fixed maturity and that interest be taken out in advance. This is to conform with the rules that will make rediscounting possible."

Mr. Mills also predicted that the system will invite the practice among business men of taking short-time

notes in settlement of accounts, as such paper will be subject to rediscount. It is probable, too, he said, that the exchange charges now are absorbed frequently by the city banks, will be greatly.

7-Year Fugitive in Cell.

GARNER, Ia., May 28.—After seven years of hiding in Texas, John H. Standing, defaulting cashier of the First State bank at Corwith, Ia., walked into the district courtroom here and pleaded guilty to 12 indictments charging forgery, which the Hancock county grand jury returned against him in the fall of 1907.

He threw himself upon the mercy of the court, and started for the penitentiary at Fort Madison to begin serving a 15 year term.

Businessmen living at Corwith and other depositors of the bank lost approximately 75,000 when Standing disappeared. He refused to make any explanation of his absence.
