MODERN VULCANIZING PLANT IS MANAGED BY LOCAL MAN

Though many people are not aware of the fact, Pendleton possesses the only completely equipped vulcanizing plant between Boise and Portland and it is renewing the tires, not only of a great many Umatilla county autos, but of many Walla Walla, Baker, La Grande people. C. E. Smith, known all over the Pacific slope as "Rubber" Smith, is the owner and manager of the plant which he is operating on the top floor of the Pendleton Auto Company's garage.

In view of the fact that Umatilla county has an unusually large number of cars and is centrally located, Mr. Smith saw an opening here for a vulcanizing plant and the business which he has done since installing his machinery has justified his judgment. Automobiles were quick to appreciate the saving on the expense which results from vulcanizing and consequently old tires, which were formerly discarded into the dump heap, are now turned over to Mr. Smith to be made new again. Inasmuch as it costs only about half as much to have tires vulcanized as it does to buy new ones, the saving amounts to considerable.

Pupils Go Up Too Fast.
SALEM, May 29.—County School Superintendent Smith declared that the large percentage of failures of pupils who recently tried the eighth-grade examinations in this county was due to the teachers advancing them too rapidly. About 66 per cent Mr. Smith said, had failed.

"However," he continued, "it is not always the fault of teachers. Parents usually are anxious to have their children promoted. In many instances they almost force the teachers to advance them."

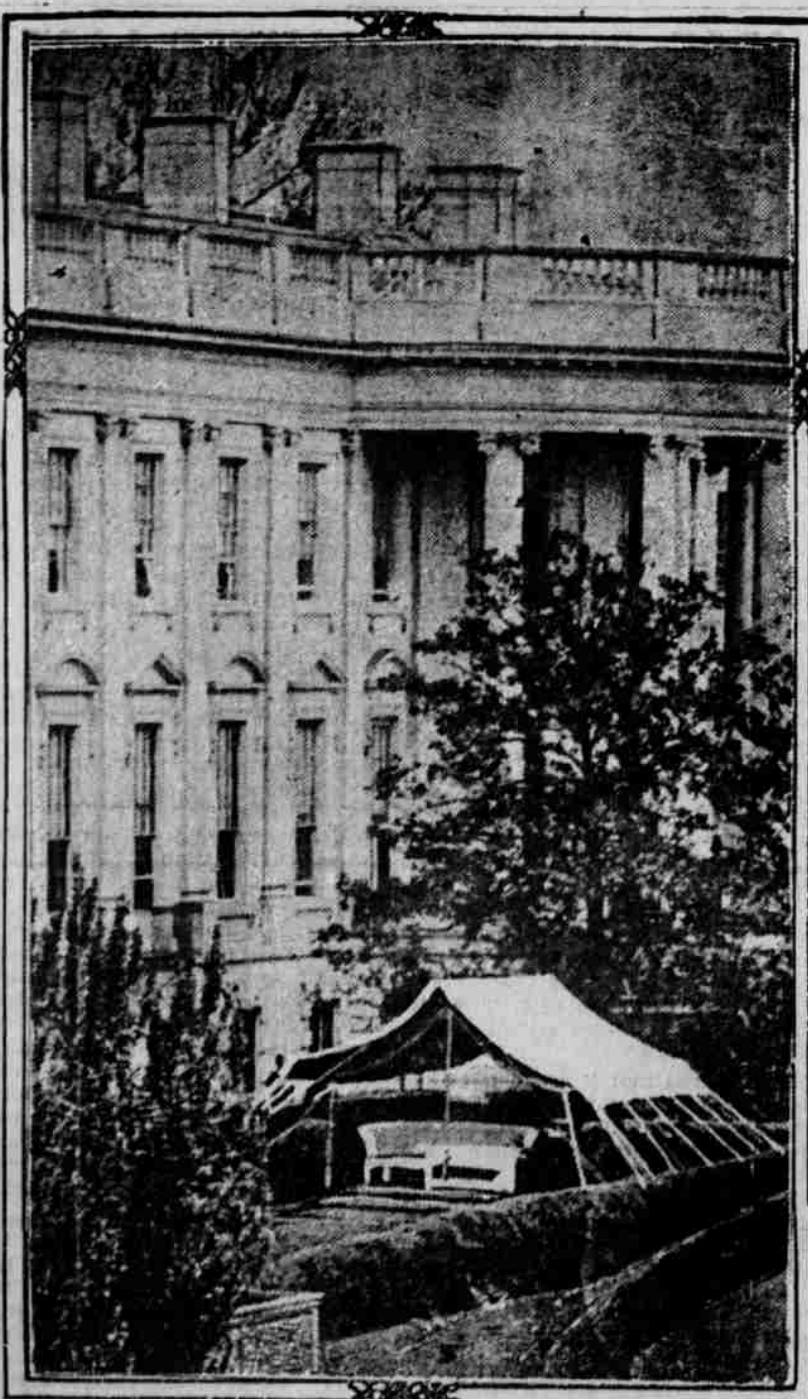
Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill said the recent test was not fair, as the failures percentages do not include exemptions in the eighth grade, and that 75 per cent of those who failed would pass the June examinations.

Jewish Schools Closed.
ODESSA, May 28.—Owing to the hatred of the Russian nationalists toward the Jews three Jewish girl schools at Kieff have been closed, the pretext being that the parents, relatives and guardians of the pupils had "no right to live" in Kieff. The total number of girls thus deprived of the means of education is 559.

"Eugenics" Move Opposed.
BALTIMORE, May 29.—The American Medical-Psychological Association, at its annual convention, refused to go on record as favoring eugenic marriage laws. The resolution adopted by the council of the association recommending the enactment of laws

requiring a clean bill of health and evidence of a normal mind before the issuance of a marriage license was tabled by a large majority. Resolutions recommending the segregation of the feeble-minded, imbeciles or other mental delinquents, and the establishment of separate institutions for their care, were adopted unanimously.

Only 81 Cows in Chicago.
CHICAGO, May 30.—There are only 81 cows in Chicago, according to the statistics made public by the department of health. Thirty-four of the bovines are in the Twenty-seventh Ward, in the northwest part of the city.

The Care of Children

Doctor Hall and Washington Babies.
Dr. William L. Hall, superintendent of the Better Babies Contest at the Interstate Fair, Spokane, Washington, in 1913, handed his resignation to the fair officials last fall. This was the contest in which 1223 babies were examined. Doctor Hall wrote the director of the Better Babies Bureau that he could never undertake the work another year. The fair officials pretended that the resignation had never been written, gave Doctor Hall a few months rest, and then appropriated one thousand dollars for Better Babies at the 1914 fair. One thousand dollars, not in prizes alone, but for equipment and educational exhibits! Doctor Hall forgot that or, gaining contests is hard work. He has rolled up his sleeves and is hard at work for the coming contest. Mrs. W. G. Hall, president of the Women's Club of Spokane, will again assist in the splendid work.

Last year the babies came from eight rural districts tributary to Spokane, and from one hundred and fourteen towns in Washington, Idaho, Oregon and British Columbia. Dr. Mary McMillan had seventy physicians and sixteen dentists on the staff of examiners, who gave every minute they could spare for one entire week. St. Luke's hospital assigned five trained nurses to duty in the examination rooms, and one hundred members of the Women's Club worked in relays on the various committees. Splendid support was given the work by "The Press" and the "Spokesman-Review."

REGULATION WATER RIGHTS WILL ENGAGE CONVENTION

INTERNATIONAL IRRIGATION CONGRESS MEETS THIS YEAR AT CALGARY.

CALGARY, Alta., May 29.—The proper regulation of water rights for irrigation purposes promises to be one of the many important subjects up for discussion at the 21st session of the International Irrigation Congress to be held in Calgary, October 5 to 9. This subject has occupied considerable attention at previous gatherings, but the fact that the congress is to meet in Canada this year for the first time in its history gives the subject an added interest.

Different laws regarding appropriation of water are in force in the two countries, and the irrigators of both will be able, through the interchange of experiences, to get together and suggest important changes which may be applicable north and

south, east and west, and place the farmer in many irrigated areas in a better and safer condition in respect to these rights. There are doubtless points in the laws of both countries which men of practical experience could improve, and discussions on this subject will bring out valuable information.

That the subject is to be a live one, and one that will demand careful attention, is evidenced by letters received at the office of the secretary. "Probably we can learn a great deal from the experience of Canadians on this subject," is the way one correspondent writes from an irrigated state. "It seems to me that the subject of the proper regulation of water rights is of the most importance," writes another.

This seems to be a feature which will be of interest to both countries, and which will doubtless arouse considerable discussion. Experts in the matter of legislation along these lines, men who have been largely instrumental in the framing of laws in respect to the water rights of irrigationists in both countries, will be invited to this congress, and the question will be thoroughly thrashed out.

WIRELESS SEA SAFETY DEVICE IS TESTED

PARIS, May 28.—The automatic wireless apparatus invented by the French engineers Ducrot and Roger is being experimented upon from the Eiffel Tower. The machine receives messages sent by the Morse code registering them automatically on tape. The experiment has proved a success so far as tested which is up to 500 kilometers. Such an apparatus would, it is said, add materially to the safety of ships at sea.

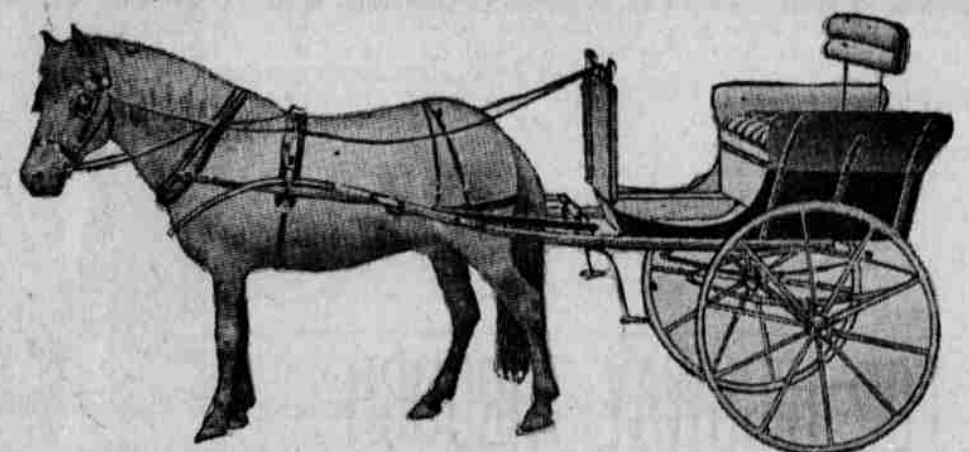
