Idaho children made some unusual records in order to reach the contest at Boise. Little Elizabeth Fitzhugh traveled fifty miles by stage, twelve in a Concord coach, thirty-eight by auto-stage, her first trip from the mining town where she was born. Georgene Denman Jones covered one hundred and fifty miles, twenty by stage, and the balance on two different railway lines. Henry Sonna Smalley, son of Lieutenant and Mrs. Henry Roland Smalley, of the Fourteenth Cavalry, U. S. A., made one of the interesting scores at the contest. He was born in the Philippines and had a hard struggle for existence in that tropical country. A Philippine wet-nurse carried him through the danger period and until his parents returned to the states. Lily Fong, the twenty-two-months daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fong Yum, Chinese, and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Maori, Japanese, scored over 90 per cent, measured by American standards, in spite of the small stature of their parents. Governor John M. Haines, presented the Woman's Home Companion prizes to the champions, Charles Ambrose Adams, of Boise, best city baby with score of 100 per cent, and W. James Hallenthyme of Caldwell, best rural baby, score 99.5.

Home Hints and Recipes

Hatpin Holders.

Before discarding the empty talcum powder box with the perforated top see what an excellent hatpin holder it will make. The perforations in the top will accommodate five or six pins. If the box is covered with a gay bit of ribbon in the Roman color it gives an attractive note of color to the bureau, but any scrap of silk or satin can be used for the purpose and in its new office the powder box would not be recognized.

Bridge Falls Into River.

DAYTON, Ore., May 30.—Dayton's long wooden bridge across the Yamhill river, constructed many years ago, fell into the river during the night.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

SEATTLE, Wash., May 30.—The electric line to Lake Burien, the second unit in Seattle's municipally owned street railway, was opened for traffic today. The first unit was placed in operation a week ago. Seattle now has about 13 miles of street railway under its control and hopes in time to merge all the lines in the city into one workable system owned by the municipality.

IDAHO STATE BUILDING COMPLETED AT EXPOSITION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Idaho was the first of the states to complete its state building at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. The building was completed on May 12th. The huge New York state building, to cost \$300,000 is structurally complete and the ornamentation will be applied in the fall. The Canadian Pavilion, which will cost \$300,000 is now far towards completion. The pavilion is 420 feet long by 210 feet wide with an average height on the main portion of 150 feet. The exhibit will be under the charge of the exhibition commissioner of Canada, Colonel W. Hutchinson, with a staff of officials. It will include the products of every province, whether they are making separate exhibits or not, Canada appropriated \$600,000 for its display at the exposition and New York \$700,000.

HOSTS WILL HAVE MOST MAGNIFICENT BUILDING

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—The host building for the visitors at the Panama-Pacific International exposition will be the California state building and the ground for this structure was broken on May 7th. Governor Hiram Johnson was one of the speakers. Californians declare they will have the finest pavilion ever erected by any state or nation in any exposition and the announcement that the building and all contents will represent an outlay of \$2,000,000 looks as if they were correct. They promise a ball room, larger and more lavishly furnished than any ball room now found in the state of California and this is a real promise.
