NORTH YAKIMA, June 1.—Every-
body but Kile took at least one peck
at Shroeder Saturday and everybody
but Kile succeeded in negotiating all
the bases. However, he allowed but
19 men to face him in the three in-
nings that the arm held out. Peter-
son replaced him on the mound in the
fourth and allowed a scratch, two
single, a double and a homer with
two on bases, all for a total of five
scores. The Braves scored two in the
first and one in the fourth, and then
opened up for a repetition of Friday's
performance, making the final score
11 to 5.

Bucks Get Six Zeros.
Up to the seventh it looked like a
shutout for the visitors. In the sev-
enth Peterson got a single and ad-
vanced when Pembroke got hit.
Briggs' force hit retired Peterson at
third and advanced Pembroke, who
advanced with Briggs on Coen's single
to the fence and scored when Naughton
walked.

In the eighth Varian walked and
advanced after McKee and Peterson
fled out on Pembroke's walk. Briggs
drove them in ahead of him with
a long fly over left field fence and
Coen fled out to short.

Shroeder went out at first in the

IN 500 MILE RACE

THOMAS WINS, DRIVING A
FRENCH CAR — OLDFIELD
FINISHES 5TH PLACE.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 1.—Rene
Thomas, driving a French car won the
fourth annual 500-mile race on the
Indianapolis motor speedway yester-
day. All speedway records from five
to 500 miles were broken. The first
American to finish was Barney Old-
field, who crossed the wire in fifth
place.

Thomas' time was six hours three
minutes 45 and 99-100ths seconds. The
winner maintained an average speed
of 82.47 miles an hour. The former
record of 6 hours 21 minutes and 31-
100ths seconds was established by Joe
Dawson in 1912. The new record es-
tablished was due in a large measure
to the ideal weather conditions which
prevailed.

Arthur Duray finished second, 7
minutes after the winner. Albert
Guyot, team mate of Thomas, was
third and James Goux winner of the
1912 race finished fourth.

Six men were injured, none of them
seriously, during the contest.
It is estimated that 100,000 persons
saw the contest.
Thomas won first prize of \$6,000
and accessory prizes and trophies will
swell this amount to about \$40,000.

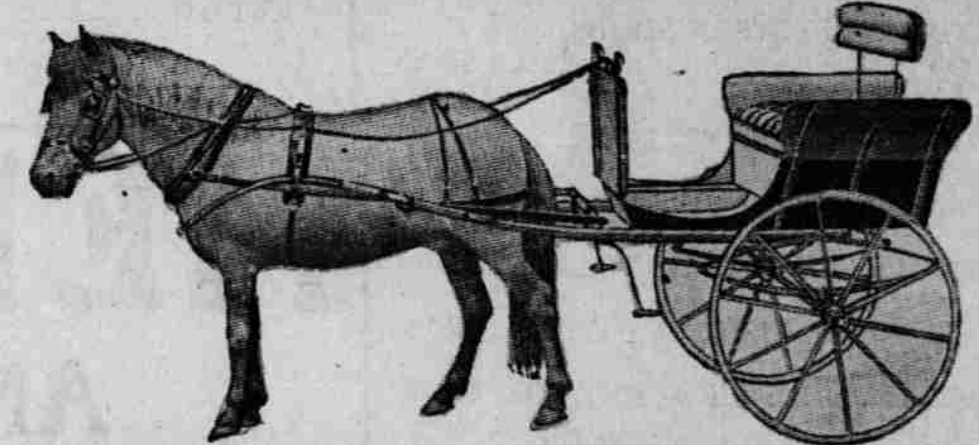
