

SMALL RUN LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—With the exception of calves, which showed a fractional increase over the preceding week, the movement of livestock into the North Portland yards for the six days showed a smart decrease.

The decrease in cattle offerings was in addition to the small run of recent weeks. The former surplus which killers have held in their yards by feed lots is being rapidly worked off and there is at present a real demand for cattle.

Good light stuff was in very short supply during the week's trade and

an advance of about 25c was forced in the price. While one or two head were sold higher, tops were generally quoted at \$8 for extreme selections during the week.

While the improvement in light fed cattle of quality is most marked, there is a somewhat better demand for the heavier stuff although changes in that line were limited.

The cattle market situation at points east of the Rockies was not quite so favorable for the week but price changes were rather small.

Extreme period of bearishness was shown in the entire American swine trade for the week. While local receipts were somewhat smaller than during the preceding six days, the demand was far less and for that reason killers reduced their bids. At the closing of the week tops were being quoted around the \$8 mark; a sale 5c above this being the only transaction at a higher figure during the last 48 hours. The bulk of the good stuff went at the lower figure.

In some quarters the belief prevails that the price of hogs is rapidly going to the bottom and that a reaction at an early date will place the market on a better basis and thereby force higher prices. While it is true that the production of hogs at Pacific northwest points is greatly in excess of a year ago, the demand is growing materially and there is no doubt that it will be able to take care of offerings at whatever price the country in general is paying.

Sharp reductions were shown in hog market prices at stockyard points east of the Rockies during the week.

Further reduction was forced in the price of sheep and lambs at North Portland during the week even though there was a rather fair decrease in the amount of stuff coming forward.

Spring lambs especially were weak

and at the closing of the six days' trade tops were selling around \$6.25 or fully 35c less than during the previous week.

Similar condition was shown for mutton offerings at stockyard points throughout the country.

NOTICE TO PUBLIC.

At a recent meeting of the Pendleton Medical Society, the physicians present, by unanimous consent, revised and adopted a schedule for professional services within the city the same to become effective after June 1st, 1914.

The new schedule was made in view of the fact that commercial commodities are higher now than in former years, that labor, both skilled and common demands more pay, that automobile service is much higher than former means of conveyance, that expenses incidental to home is greater, that the great amount of work that physicians are called upon to do, not in the name of charity, but in reality of the same effect and that the same charges that now prevail in Pendleton are the same as fifteen or twenty years ago, in view of these facts we believe the medical profession is justified in entering into this new schedule.

The increased charges for night service is not made to deprive any needing person of professional services in time of distress, but it is a deplorable fact that many people call a physician after time of retiring leaving him no fixed hours for refreshment, amusement, or sleep and with no consideration as to his comfort, his previous day's labor or a strenuous day's labor to follow. They are often awakened to answer telephone calls at night when some one wants to know when Mary shall take the next pill or was Mrs. Jones' baby a boy or a girl and questions of similar importance.

It is also noticeable that those indifferent to the physicians comfort at night are also indifferent to the payment of their bills.

Physicians are so human in their physical characteristics that even after long years of night service they would enjoy a night of undisturbed repose.

NOTICE OF PROPOSALS FOR EXCAVATING AND BACKFILLING

Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Pendleton, Ore., until 5 o'clock on the 6th day of June, 1914, for excavating and backfilling the trench for the overflow pipe line from the East line of Thompson Street, to Round-Up Park, comprising about 150 lineal feet.

Excavating shall include the work of removing all material necessary to be moved in excavating the trench for the overflow pipe. The trench shall be excavated true to line and grade and one foot wider than the outside diameter of the pipe. All material taken out in excess of the specified width shall not be paid for. Excavating and backfilling shall be paid for at the contract price measured in the excavation. The contract price for excavation shall include the backfilling. Just before the pipe is laid the contractor shall remove all loose material and sides or caves and dress the trench true to grade, and the cost of this work shall be included in the contract price for excavating and backfilling.
