Home Hints and Recipes

Don't Forget

A little minced ham added to the omelet makes a savory change. Small sweet peppers are excellent mixed with celery in potato salad.

Vegetables which grow under the ground should be cooked with the lid on.

Breaded veal served with tomato sauce and spaghetti makes a delicious dish.

Clean nickel and silver pieces with ammonia applied with a flannel cloth. Black stockings should be rinsed in blue water to give them a good color.

Discolored gilt frames can be brightened if rubbed with a sponge dipped in turpentine.

Try adding a little chopped parsley to the mashed potatoes; it gives them a delicious flavor.

When mixing the pie crust or baking powder biscuits they will be much lighter if a fork is used.

Needle Work Notes

When fringing anything requiring a deep fringe, tear it up as deep as you want the fringe at intervals of an inch or so all the way across the end, then fringe out these short pieces one by one, which is a much easier way than pulling out a long thread every time and having it break and being obliged to hunt for the end with pin or needle.

For the busy woman who has little time to embroider sofa pillows there is one that works up very quickly. It is the couched pillow. Many designs can be done in couching, but the favorite one for this stitch is scroll work. A cord, soutache braid, wool or rope silk is laid about the design and tack-

ed fast by far apart buttonhole stitches of red silk or thread. A rather pretty fashion is to have the buttonholing thread of a contrasting color to that used for the large couching thread. The buttonhole stitches should be about an eighth of an inch apart.

The Care of Children

Work in Maryland.
Mrs. Evelyn Harris of Betterton, Maryland, who organized the 1913 contest at Chestertown, has been conducting a unique promotion and educational campaign this spring. Chestertown is in the heart of the Maryland canning district, and the canners have been holding a series of special meetings to discuss topics of mutual interest. Mrs. Harris has had tea, cakes and Better Babies discussions for the canners' wives, to prepare for the August contest.

The growth and eruption of the teeth is a normal process and should cause no more disturbance than the growth of the bones. When the first teeth come through there may be a few days' discomfort, some irritability, and even slight fever. These symptoms should disappear within a few days. If they do not, the cause will be found in some error in the diet or general hygiene of the baby.

At about the sixth month the two lower incisors or middle teeth should appear; next, between the seventh and tenth months come the four upper middle teeth, known as the central and lateral incisors. About the same time, extending to the eighth month, come the two lower lateral front teeth and the four front molars; the "eye" and "stomach" teeth or cuspids appear between the eighteenth month and second year, to be followed by the second molars between the twentieth and thirtieth months.

There is a wide variability in the time when the teeth appear. Sometimes this depends upon family characteristics, as when all of the children have a late teething period or an unusually early one; but, in general, at one year a child will have six teeth; at eighteen months, twelve teeth; at two years, sixteen teeth, and at two years and a half the full set of twenty teeth.

The only trimming was a half dozen medium sized black buttons, which started at the V-shaped neck and extended almost the length of the waist, and this was pulled down loosely over the hips and gave somewhat the effect of the loose girdles which we are now wearing.

LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR BUILDING IS DESTROYED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2.—The California State building at the Lewis and Clark fair grounds was burned at 1 o'clock Monday morning in a spectacular fire that threatened for a time to destroy the Forrestry building, the Oriental building, and houses in the Willamette Heights district.

Sparks from the blazing structure were carried by a west wind over the northern part of the city. Had the wind not been light many other blazes would almost certainly have resulted. Patrolmen Waddell and Johnson, among the first persons to arrive at the fire, think it was of incendiary origin. They were a distance of only a few blocks away when it started. When they reached the scene the entire building was burning.

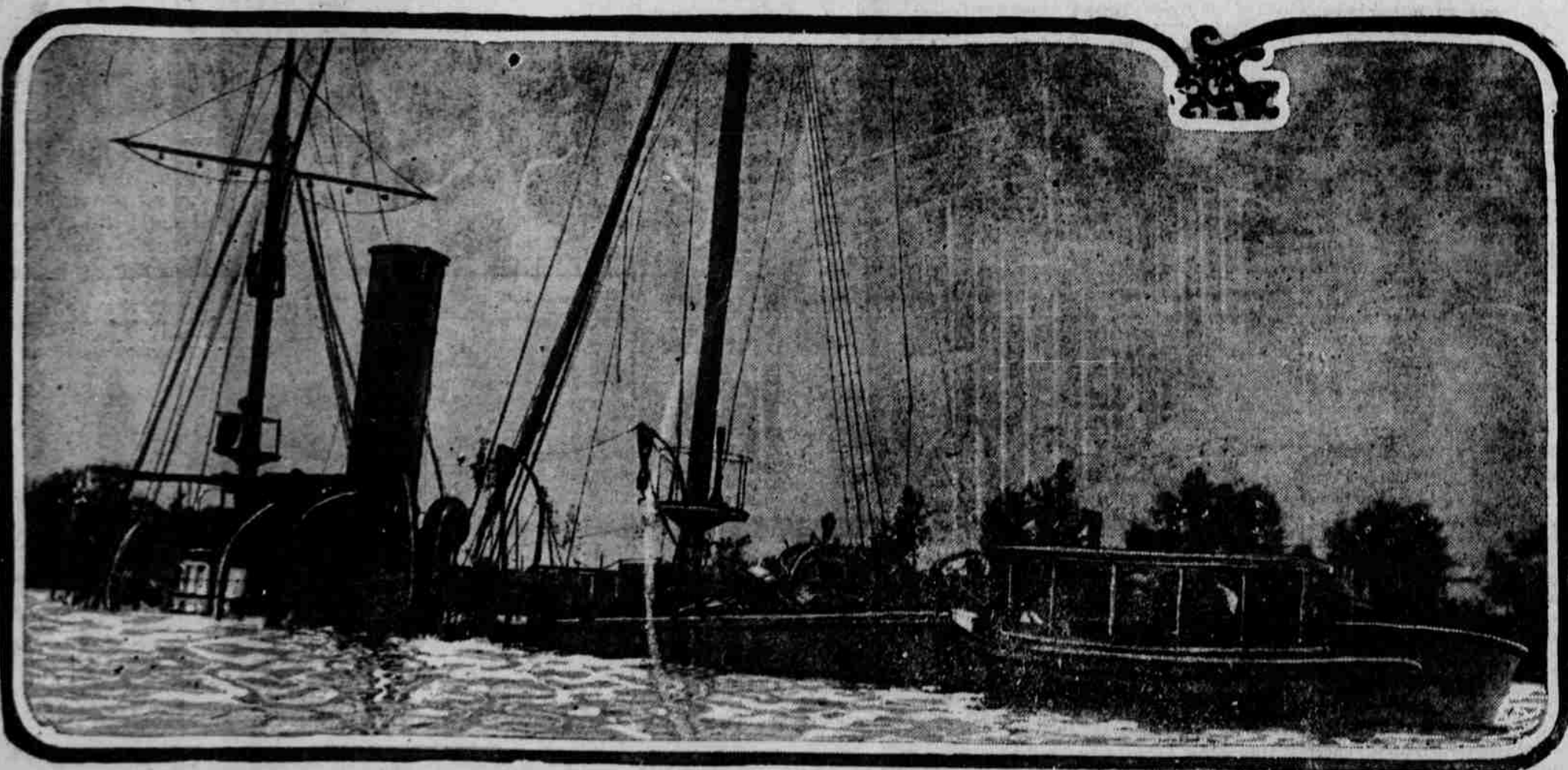
