## Home Hints and Recipes

### Needlework Notes

The latest bath slippers are of white Turkish toweling. They are likewise embroidered in blue in a French knot design.

Long, pointed bags of white ratine show a design of blue French knots. Women planning their summer outfits will do well to spend an hour embroidering one of these.

The dainty Wascall embroidery is still holding its own. It would seem that women are taken for keeps by its airiness and its pretty colorings as well as by the ease with which it may be acquired.

Filet lace is the thing nowadays. Baby Irish may be bought for a song but filet is growing gradually more expensive every day. Even the tiniest medallion of it makes a gown, while for the table it is being much sought after by women with long purses.

### Linen Closet

Linen stored in a closet warm and poorly ventilated will become yellow and will crack earlier than if stored otherwise. The properly constructed linen closet should be in a cool, dry place. Each shelf should be covered with linen slips fastened up with drawing pins. Have the linen slips broad enough to fold back and cover the contents of the shelves. Old sheets may be used for this purpose.

## The Care of Children

What shall the baby who is to be put into his first short clothes wear during this summer? What length should the first short clothes be?

Let us suppose this baby to be from three months to six months of age; but what is said about weights of clothing, number, etc., will also apply to all babies under one year of age. Next to the skin should come the lightest weight silk-and-wool, ribbed, knit band with shoulder straps. This is the most important article the baby wears and must never be left off night or day. It prevents the delicate organs of digestion from sudden chilling; it absorbs perspiration and aids digestion, thus helping to ward off summer complaint. Next comes the lightest weight silk-and-wool shirt, buttoning down the front. A thin silk and wool skirt made on the thinnest of cotton waists, cotton bird's-eye stockings, with dimity or nainsook dress and shoes, complete this outfit. A nainsook skirt may be added for dress occasions.

On exceedingly hot days leave off the highnecked, long-sleeved shirt and use only the band; the flannel skirt may be omitted also, especially during the noon hours; but as a rule both these articles will be needed for a baby under one year of age. If a baby is excessively fat and troubled with prickly heat, a linen shirt may be worn next to the skin under the silk-and-wool band. The practice of babies going with low necks and short sleeves I do not advocate.

Bare legs are even worse than bare arms and necks and are responsible for many cases of summer diarrhoea. Soft moccasins, soft kid shoes, or when the baby begins to stand, stiff-soled lace should also be worn.

At night babies of this age should wear the band, shirt, diapers and nainsook nightdress; on very hot nights the shirt may be omitted, but never the band.

The first short clothes should be of ankle length. The coat for babies of this age may be of silk, pique or pongee; some wash material is best when possible. The little swiss cape is usually best, but when a baby is from nine to twelve months of age sometimes the pique hats may be used if a little more shade is wanted.
