Home Hints and Recipes

Health and Beauty.

Don't forget that microbes are apt

to lurk about the mouth of the milk bottle. It should be carefully wiped off before the milk is poured out.

Wash the hands with good soap, dry them before retiring, rub vaseline into and around the nails, to overcome cracking and brittleness.

Where the eyes are tired and dulled, as after motoring, use either an eye lotion both or one made of water in which a little boracic powder or witch hazel has been added. Keep the eyes open in the water; this both strengthens and brightens them.

A good tonic for the eyebrows is made with two ounces of red vaseline, one dram of tincture of cantharides, fifteen drops of oil of lavender, fifteen drops of oil of rosemary. Apply night and morning with a tiny brush. This can also be used on the eyelashes but must not be allowed to get in the eyes, since any oily preparation will inflame them.

The Care of Children

Dr. J. W. Schereschewsky, of the Public Health Service, in a recent address said: "The mere business of being a baby must be classified as an extra-hazardous occupation, since the perils which ever encompass human existence are never so bitterly emphasized as in the first year of life. A necessary sequence to a high infant mortality rate is the larger number of children who, having weathered the storms of the first year, reach the comparative safety of later life in a battered, weakened, and crippled condition such as forever handicaps them in becoming efficient units. It is therefore an axiom that in lowering the infant mortality rate, we shall diminish to a far greater degree the great army of defective and degenerate children among us."

RUSSIAN DREADNAUGHT LAUNCHED AT ODESSA

ODESSA, June 5.—The third stage in Russia's ambitious naval program for the Black Sea was concluded today with the successful launching of the Dreadnaught Ekaterina II at the Nikolaioff navy yard.

The two dreadnaughts already launched and soon to go into commission, are the Empress Maria and the Alexander III. The fourth, the Ivan the Terrible, is to be laid down on the ways vacated by the Ekaterina II. The six destroyers and the six submarines, included in the new program, have already been completed and are building. There is also being constructed one of the largest floating docks in the world, capable of carrying a vessel of 40,000 tons. It will cost \$2,000,000.

Notwithstanding this formidable force, naval experts say that Turkey would have a decided advantage on the Black Sea in the event of a war between the two countries, as the Russian dreadnaughts are to be armed with only 12-inch guns, as against guns of 13-inch and 15-inch, respectively on the two battlecruisers recently acquired by the Turkish government, one from Brazil and the other now completing in England. The longer range of the Turkish guns would, it is believed, more than counterbalance the greater aggregate tonnage and armament of the new Russian craft.

Alaskan Road Is Delayed.

SEATTLE, June 5.—W. C. Eiler, chairman of the Alaska Railway Engineering commission, doubts if any real construction work on the government-owned line will be commenced before 1915.

In a brief address before the Engineers' Club he said that the data gathered by the commission and its recommendations cannot be placed in the hands of the president until next year.

"Following the president's decision of the routes followed between an open port on the coast and navigable waters of the interior, the preliminary work that must follow makes it probable that the actual construction will not be under way until next year," said the speaker.
