The Care of Children

Better Babies in Canada.

British Columbia is to have its first Dominion-wide Better Babies Contest in the latter part of September. It will be held in connection with the Dominion Exhibition at Victoria, under the auspices of the Agricultural Association and the local Council of Women. Among those who are taking an active personal interest in the preparations are Mrs. R. L. Day, convener of the Committee on Problems of Childhood, Council of Women, and Fleet-Surgeon W. E. Home of the Royal navy. The cooperation of social workers and medical men for the contest promises well for the betterment of Dominion babies.

Fair officials and committee women who wish to make the Better Babies Contest a success, not only from a medical and educational standpoint but as an attraction of which visitors will talk for months to come, are referred to the splendid arrangements made by the workers at the Washington state fair, at North Yakima, last season. At this contest more than six hundred babies were examined without friction, crowding, or dissatisfaction of any sort, largely because ample room provided and committees were prepared for the work assigned them. Mrs. H. B. Averill, wife of the fair association secretary, was superintendent of the contest and organized her workers months in advance. The scene of the contest was the Woman's Building, a fine two-story structure, surrounded by a well-kept lawn. The contest rooms were arranged on the second floor, with the cut-flower exhibit as an appropriate centerpiece. Four small rooms were partitioned off for examinations, with a fifth and last for dressing and undressing the babies.
