He conferred with local Republican leaders during the evening. Dr. Withcombe is to speak at Echo July 4 and may also make a speech at Stanfield while in eastern Oregon at that time.

Three Pendleton Admirals.

Four local men have been honored through being asked to serve on the staff of the admiral at the regatta to be held at Astoria, July 2 to 4. The admiral is Phil Metcahan, Jr., of Portland and the Umatilla county men invited to be upon the staff are R. Alexander, Al Slusher, R. N. Stanfield and J. W. Tallman. The first three named have accepted, but Mr. Tallman will be unable to do so.

Walla Wallans Attend Game.

A special excursion train was run to Pendleton yesterday from Walla Walla for the two ball games played here between the Bears and Buckaroos and there were 120 fans aboard, including a brass band sent over by the Walla Walla Meat Co. The train did not arrive until 12:20 but was run on through to the park so that the excursionists missed only three innings of the morning game, it having been held until 12. The Walla Walla Elks ran the excursion and after the morning game they were taken to the local Elk temple and given a buffet luncheon. The train left on its return trip at 7 o'clock.

Yakima Here This Week.

Pendleton will have another week of ball at home before taking the road again, a series with the North Yakima club being scheduled here this week. Yakima last week played in Baker and dropped four out of the six but the week before at home took five out of six from Pendleton. The Buckaroos took five out of six from the Braves when they played here before and will try hard to cap the long end of the series this time. INDIANS WILL CELEBRATE ON RESERVATION JULY 4

Relating to the Indian celebration to be held at Cayuse July 4, the East Oregonian has received a letter from Pomeroy, well-known local Indian. The letter as interpreted for this paper by Leo Sampson, means that there will be but one Indian celebration this year. It will be at Cayuse commencing July 4 and Pomeroy will be the head man for the Indians. The Round-Up June 10 to which reference is made in the miniature round-up to be given here Wednesday for the Milwaukee business men. Pomeroy's letter is as follows: Cayuse, Oregon, June 6, 1914.

To The East Oregonian:—We have July all the time every year, every time. I invented to make July myself, I beg out July ground the first place that it is at Cayuse about eight year ago; I made a feast on time about eight year ago and I told the people about Cayuse ground and that the people are willing about the ground and to have Fourth. I said to the agent, "I am willing to make a race track—just a round track to race our horses for the Round-Up and Barney Sherry he is the witness once upon Roy Bishop, my friend told me we better have little Round-Up here at Pendleton on June 10." I told him, "All right, Bishop, I am willing to join it any time; all the white people my friend and the Indians know me, Pomeroy; I am the head man for the Fourth of July," but now after this the Indians decided for July will may be two place one on Cayuse and the other one opposite off Cayuse, but now I don't know what to do; I wish you all, you white people, welcome to the Round-Up on June 10, and also they are coming to Pendleton; next week I arrive to you people; be sure and see it; don't miss it these two men, Captain Sam-Kin and Joe Crage they are the mission church chiefs; their head aint for July; not for it.

His widow and three children, William Roesch, Jr. and Mrs. Frederick Steiner of this city and Ensign Herbert Roesch of the U. S. navy, and two brothers, Louis Roesch of Philadelphia, and Julius Roesch of La Grande, Ore., and one sister, Mrs. Charles Matthews of Pilot Rock, survive him.

Mr. Roesch during his long residence here had been very successful in his business enterprises and accumulated considerable property. His friends were legion and his death will be a matter of great regret.
