Home Hints and Recipes

News of the Shops.
Tea and luncheon cloths range from the simplest, hand embroidered on fine linen to a most elaborate combination of filet and point de Venise lace and hand embroidery, together with twelve napkins to match, is \$175.

Luncheon sets, consisting of a centerpiece, dozen large dollies and a dozen small dollies, come in a combination of hand embroidery and cluny lace, and also in plain, hand embroidered linen, cluny trimmed linen and Italian filet and fine cluny with very little linen. They range from \$40 to \$95 a set.

Dollies and traycloths may be had in a number of designs. There are plain hemstitched damask traycloths, hand embroidered ones, others both hand embroidered and trimmed with cluny lace. Traycloths range in size, from 14x20 inches to 26x36 inches, and in price from 45 cents to \$5.75 each.

Vests of organdie trimmed all around with Venise lace and having a highly rolling collar fastened in the front with two pearl buckles, are \$1. There are other pieces of neckwear, including the Paquin collar of stiff linen, suitable for tailored suits, price 50 cents, and low, flaring collars of organdie, fastened at the throat with moire ribbon, price \$2.75.

The Care of Children

Veranda Nursery.
If it is at all possible, have a veranda nursery for the children this summer. Usually it is very easy to convert a veranda into a satisfactory one. Screens, hanging curtains or awnings adjusted so they can be lowered to shade it when the sun's rays strike it directly and, if possible, netting to keep out the insects, are all that is required.

Where there are boys whose climbing propensities are developing it may be necessary to heighten the fence by

nailing up two or three bars, but the fence is usually sufficiently high. A comfortable couch, their toys and large cushions big enough to lie or sit upon them with ease will do for the most modest of these out-of-door nurseries. If the children are large enough to manage it for themselves a hammock is most desirable. There is no better place for baby's afternoon nap, if his eyes are carefully shaded and he is protected from the annoyance of flies.

The effect of fresh air will benefit the health and temper of the little one and their prattle loses lots of its noisiness out-of-doors. One mother who served the children's luncheon on her veranda last year declared it well repaid her, and made the meal part of their play day.

How I Planted and Cared for My Garden.

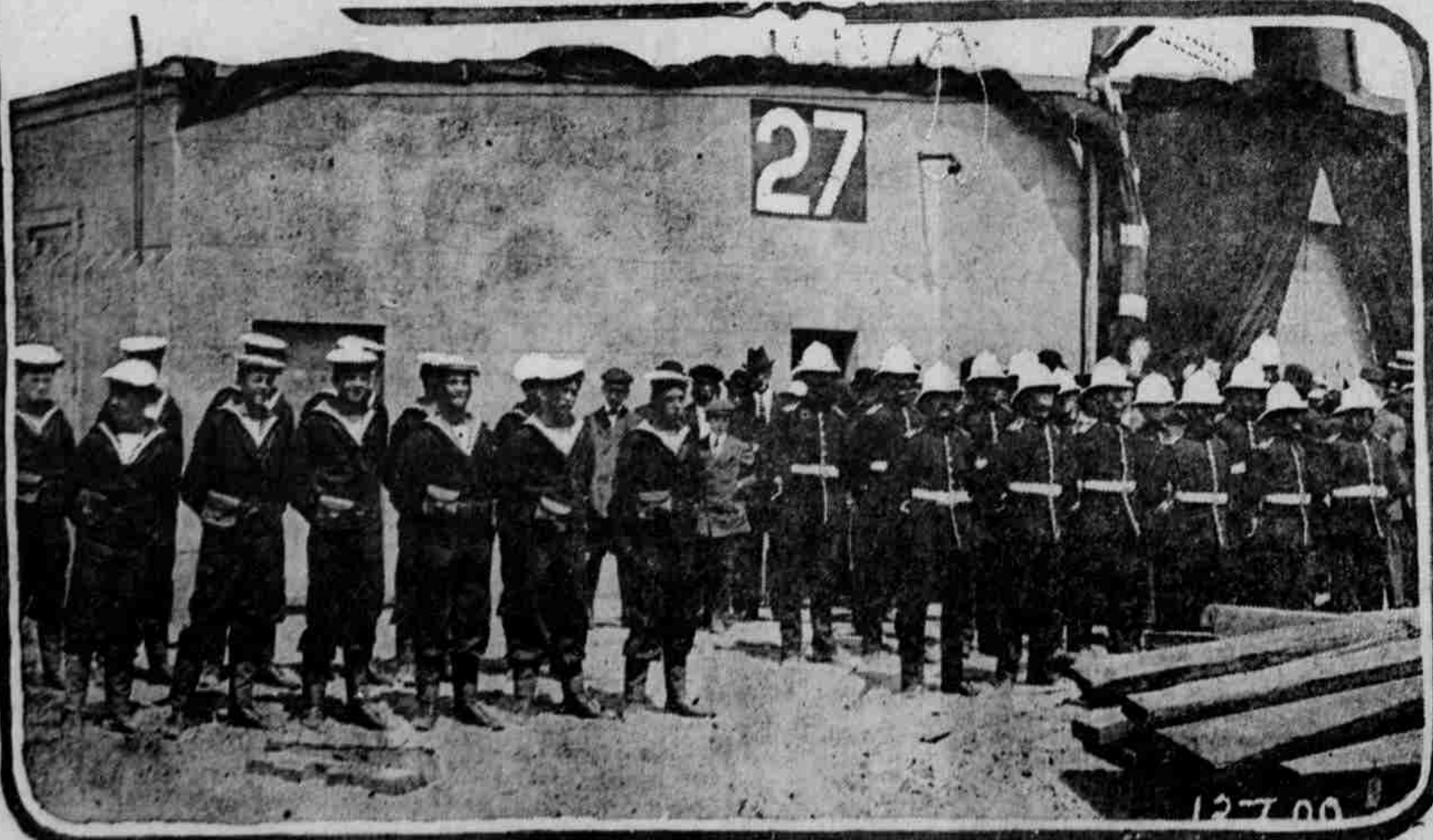

DOWN WITH ROOSTER! IS OHIO SLOGAN

COLUMBUS, June 10.—This was the greatest execution day in the history of all Ohio. Countless hundreds of roosters went to the barnyard gallotline. This wholesale declaration was in the interest of the unfertile egg. It was the result of a special proclamation of the state agricultural commission. Here are the reasons set forth in the proclamation which is directed only against old birds.

This is the egg laying season. There will be no fertility of eggs if roosters are killed. Unfertilized eggs will not spoil. Fertile eggs will. Fertility of eggs is a bad thing because it reduces the output of good eggs and in consequence boosts prices. Roosters are of little real value from May 1 to December 1. The rooster killing is not compulsory, the commission explains. But it is generally believed it will be observed. The commission picked Saturday for the slaughter in order that Ohio families can have their fill of chicken for Sunday dinner.
