

## The Care of Children

How Much Sleep, Few mothers realize how much sleep a baby will take if given the epportunity, and not only babies but small boys and girls. A baby, until he is nine months old, should sleen from two to two and one-half hours after his morning bath, and for an hour in the afternoon.
