## ROOSEVELT IN ENGLAND TO DISCUSS HOME-RULE ISSUE

### APPEARANCE OF COLONEL GIVES RISE TO RUMORS HE'LL SETTLE IT.

LONDON, June 13.—After a short stop in Paris, on the way from Madrid Roosevelt arrived here and Ambassador Page met him at the station. He later attended a luncheon in his honor by Major Arthur Lee. More than 130 guests were present. The personnel of the party gave rise to reports the Colonel planned to offer advice to the government and Ulster leaders relative to a settlement of the Irish home rule controversy. The guests included Lord Roberts, John Strachey, Sir Owen Seaman and Sir Sidney Colvin, all of whom have taken a prominent part in the discussion of the Irish question. Luncheon over, the Colonel left to spend the week-end at Major Lee's country place in Buckinghamshire. He is scheduled to return Monday for meetings with Premier Asquith, foreign secretary Grey and other members of the cabinet. Tuesday he has an engagement with Austen Chamberlain, the leading conservative member in parliament and Sir Edward Carson, who led the anti-home rule fight and with Lord Northcliffe, editor. At all the meetings, it is reported, the Colonel will give his home-rule views. Afterward, it is said he might meet with nationalist leaders.

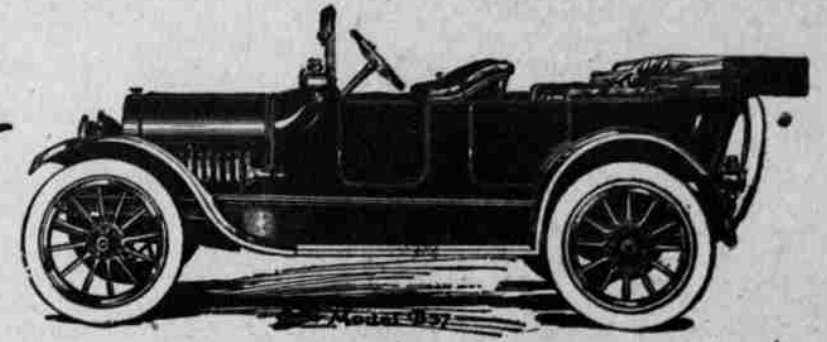

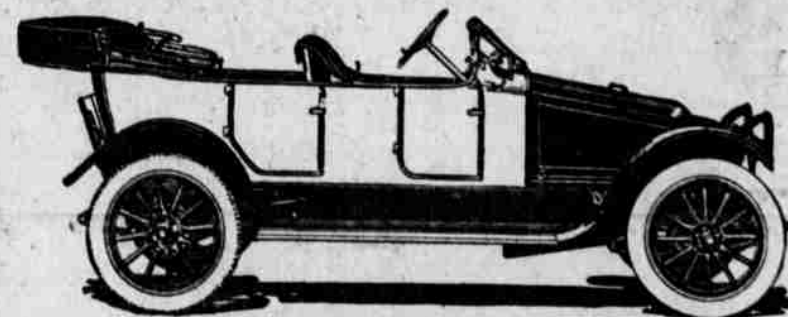
