BERRY STILL LEADING
TRI-STATE WITH BAT

Tate Berry is still the leading batter of the Western Tri-State league. The North Yakima left fielder has been at bat 198 times during the nine weeks of play prior to the present week and has secured 71 safe hits, giving him an average of .358. As member of the Yakima team he has batted .301 but during his stay with Baker before being traded for First-baseman Nick Fuller, he hit at the terrific clip of .571.

Phil Lind, the Baker left fielder, is second high batter with an average of .33186, a fraction of a point more than has Earl Sheely, Walla Walla first sacker, whose average is .32166. Raymond French, Baker second baseman, is only a fraction behind Sheely, his average being .32128.

Of the 14 leading hitters, the Pendleton team has six, Yakima and Baker each three and Walla Walla two. Pembroke is the leading Buck batter, his percentage reading .310. Peterson has .309, Varian .308, Osborne .306, Lodell .297 and Naughton .292. Aside from Sheely, Johnson is the only heavy hitter with the Bears, his average being .327. Stokke of Yakima is hitting .302 and Green, recently released, batted .293. Nadeau of Baker is also hitting .293.

Manager Lodell of Pendleton, has the remarkable fielding average of .985. Walter, Yakima first baseman, is fielding .992, but he has played but a short time. Of the three second basemen who have played their positions all season, Naughton of Pendleton is leading with an average of .944. Peterson is the leading fielder as well as hitting third baseman, his average being .930. Lundstrum leads the shortstop with an average of .905. In the catching department, Brown of Walla Walla has an average of .882 while King of Baker is but

two points behind. While he was with Baker Wetzel never made an error in the outfield. Of the other outfielders, Benny Briggs of Pendleton is leading with an average of .966. Plautz of Yakima and Wallace of Walla Walla are each fielding .964.

Daly of Pendleton and Lewis of Yakima, lead the pitchers in the fielding department with a perfect average. Reese of Walla Walla is fielding .941 and Osborne of Pendleton .931.

SHROEDER IN FORM
HOLDS BRAVES DOWNPENDLETON BUCKAROOS WIN
4 TO 1, IN EXCELLENT
GAME YESTERDAY.

Lefty Shroeder was in perfect form yesterday and, with his teammates giving him almost the support to which he was entitled he was invincible. But for the one bobbie made behind him, his would have been a shut-out victory instead of a 4 to 1 affair. Only three hits could the Braves get from him and two of those were very scratchy and the third a lucky poke by Pitcher Paddy Welch.

While defeated in his first game since his return to the Yakima tepee, Welch twirled good ball for seven frames, and but for his fwn mistake in trying to throw out an advance runner, would not have been beaten by the margin he was.

Yakima got her lonesome marker in the second without the aid of a hit. Plautz struck out, yet he made the score. The third time he swung upon one of Shroeder's hooks, it chanced that the aforesaid hook was both wicked and wild and got past Pembroke, giving the batter life. He was sacrificed to second by McQuary, outgassed the battery by stealing third and finished the circuit when Pembroke's belated throw to catch him escaped Peterson's mitt and rolled on and on.

The Bucks got one hit an inning off Welch for the first six innings but no helpers could be garnered. In the sixth, however, Varian did not require any assistance to circumnavigate the diamond. He hit a tremendous drive that sailed over the fence.

In the eighth, Naughton, who has a way of figuring in the break-up of close games, led off with a two-base blow, raising the ball over the head of Leftfielder Berry, who twice before had baffled the batter by playing close in. Whitt dumped a punt to Welch and he threw to third to catch Naughton. That runner, however, had the base so easy that he didn't even have to slide. The play gave Whitt life and, after Varian had popped out a foul he stole second.

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Pembroke was up and, rather than risk a home-run blow, Welch deliberately walked him, filling the bases. Lodell, after taking two strikes, lured a hole between third and short and laid such a hot one down that Krause could only knock it down. Naughton scored but Whitt was thrown out at the plate. Lodell took second on the play and both he and Pembroke scored on Briggs' third single of the game. Coen hit a slow one toward first which was good as a hit but the scoring ended when Peterson grounded out.

Yakima got a man to third in the third inning and one to second in the fifth, but thereafter, Shroeder, aided by some brilliant fielding, retired the batters as fast as they came up. Chief among the hitters of the day was Varian with his home, two-bagger and single, while Briggs with three singles, came close behind.
