NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Pendleton, held on June 4th, 1914, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, the Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 4th day of June, 1914, under direction and by the plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Matlock (formerly Star) street, in the City of Pendleton from the north line of Court street to south toe of the levee of the Umatilla river, by paving the same with gravel bitulith pavement, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the percentage of the total cost of improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement; and

Whereas, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work; and

Whereas, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited by, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such improvement district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas, the improvement of the hereinabove described portion of said Matlock street, with gravel bitulith pavement is at this time necessary; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it expedient to improve, and it is hereby proposed to improve Matlock (formerly Star) street from the north line of Court street to the south toe of the levee of the Umatilla river by paving the same with gravel bitulith pavement and by constructing curbs, gutters, drains and all other things as shown in and provided for in the said plans and specifications; and be it further

Resolved, that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement, as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 4th

day of June, 1914, be and they are hereby approved and adopted; and be it further

Resolved that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof; and be it further

Resolved that an assessment district is hereby created to be known as Assessment District No. 38.

Description of Improvement District No. 38.

From the present pavement on the north line of Court street to the south toe of the levee of the Umatilla river, Pendleton, Oregon.

Commencing on the north line of Court street N. 66 degrees 24 minutes E. 50 feet from the S. W. corner of lot 7, block 27, Arnold & Raley's Addition, thence N. 22 degrees 36 minutes W. 190 feet to the toe of the levee of the Umatilla river, thence S. 77 degrees 43 minutes W. 153.20 feet, thence S. 23 degrees 36 minutes E. 222 feet to the north line of Court street, thence N. 66 degrees 24 minutes E. 160 feet to place of beginning; and be it further
