RANCHER SUED FOR \$30,000 HEART BALM

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 12.—An action for \$30,000 damages for alleged breach of promise has been brought by Alice Moore against George Pierce, prominent cattle man and rancher. The complaint alleges that the defendant promised to marry the plaintiff on or before April 15, 1909; that she frequently urged Mr. Pierce to fulfill his promise, but he postponed it repeatedly. It further alleges that on or about October 15, 1911, another promise was made to marry on January 1, 1913, but that when the time came for the ceremony Mr. Pierce declined to go through with it. Both have had trouble recently, in which jealousy is thought to have played a leading part. This breach of amicable relations is believed to have led to the present action.

CLOUDBURST IN NEW MEXICO WRECKS TOWN

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., June 12.—Hillsboro, in the southwest corner of New Mexico, practically was destroyed by a flood which swept through the principal business section last night. A continued rain which had swollen the mountain arroyos was followed by a cloudburst, which sent a wall of water six feet high foaming through the town. Most of the 800 inhabitants had been warned, and those living in the lower part of the town had sought safety on the hillside. Thomas Murphy, a pioneer resident, and first sheriff of the county, is missing, and is believed to have been drowned. No other loss of life is reported.

Judge Must Pay \$1 Damages.

EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., June 11.—J. E. Hillskotter, county judge of Madison county, was ordered by a jury to pay damages of \$1 to Mrs. Emma R. Mackinaw, who sued him on a charge of slander. In addition, Judge Hillskotter must pay the costs of the suit—about \$500.

Four Killed in Collision.

OMAHA, June 11.—Three were instantly killed and a fourth so badly injured that he died, in a collision between a Union Pacific train and an automobile at Sarpy near here. The dead: Oscar Krug of St. Louis, Carl Behr, chauffeur, and two unidentified women. There were four occupants in the car. All were frightfully mangled.

FIRST SHIP PASSED BY PANAMA CANAL

PANAMA, June 11.—To test the electric locomotives provided to tow vessels through the canal, the Panama railroad steaming ship, a ship of 4100 tons, passed from ocean to canal and back, taking about an hour and a half each way. It was the first ship to make the trip.

NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

HEAVIEST RAIN OF YEAR FALLS HERE

One of the heaviest rains of the year fell early this morning, commencing two or three hours after midnight and continuing without intermission until 7:30 this morning. The official register showed that .53 of an inch fell during the storm, while yesterday .12 of an inch fell, making the total precipitation for the past 24 hours .70 of an inch.

While the rain will probably do some damage to the hay that has already been cut, it is not expected that the loss will amount to much. The benefit to the grain will more than compensate for any loss, for reports are that the rain was general all over the county. Inasmuch as there has been a slight deficiency this year in the rainfall, the soaking given the fields yesterday and this morning will add many dollars to the income of the farmers.

The last rain has brought the total precipitation for June up to 1.12 inches, whereas the normal for the entire month is but .92. This cuts down the deficiency for the year and for the wet season. The normal for September 1, 1913, through June 13, 1914, whereas the precipitation to date is 12.09, leaving a deficiency of 1.13. Since the first of the year the rainfall has been 6.85 inches and the normal is 8.12, a deficiency for the six months of 1.27 inches. The following shows the normal and the amount received since last September: September, .89, .43; October, 1.19, 2.41; November, 1.51, 1.34; December, 1.51, 1.06; January, 1.59, 1.51; February, 1.47, 1.02; March, 1.62, .35; April, 1.01, 1.59; May, 1.46, 1.26; June, .92, to date, 1.12; total 13.22, 12.09. The rain this morning stopped shortly after 7:30 and soon the clouds began breaking and by noon had disappeared to leave a perfect day.

AUTO TRUCK IS USED TO CARRY VERY STUBBORN HOG

UNRULY BRUTE MAKES IT UNPLEASANT FOR FARMER COMING TO TOWN.
