BEST WAYS TO KEEP GOOD LAWNS ARE TOLD

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(Special.)—In the late spring, about a month after active grass growth has commenced on the lawn, it is desirable to apply a grass stimulant to keep the lawn in first-class condition. Nitrate of soda is a good fertilizer and will make the grass grow thickly with a rich dark green color that will show itself promptly after the application. The landscape gardener of the U. S. Department of Agriculture advises that those who use nitrate of soda should apply it at the rate of 50 pounds per acre once a month throughout the summer beginning about the middle of May in the latitude of Washington, D. C.

The nitrate of soda should be applied just before a rain or a sprinkling with the hose. Under ordinary conditions it will keep the lawn in a vivid green during the period when the vitality of the plant is low. The application of this fertilizer combined with careful watering (described in a previous article) will prevent the parched appearance of the lawn during the dry hot summer season. Care in Using Fertilizer During Drought.

When nitrate is applied during any dry period it should be used carefully. It can, however, be applied at any time if the nitrate of soda is powdered up fine before using but it is safest to dissolve it in water. Because of a generally prevailing fear that this fertilizer may ruin a lawn if used care-

lessly, the Department has been experimenting to see just how much nitrate of soda would have to be used in order to kill grass. These experiments seem to show that nitrate of soda can be used fairly extensively without causing injury, for attempts to kill grass with it were unsuccessful except when such large quantities as 400 pounds to an acre were used.

Although fertilization is a splendid thing for the upkeep of a lawn it will never entirely make up for a lawn soil that was poorly prepared in the beginning. It is only when a lawn soil is properly prepared in the first place and enriched with stable manure, lime, and bone phosphate that a lawn may be maintained in the best condition.

Unrotted Manure May Menace Good Lawns.

Unrotted stable manure should be kept away from a lawn at all times, the opinion of many to the contrary notwithstanding. Stable manure contains weed seeds and particularly after the early growth of grass these weed seeds will be encouraged to sprout, for at this time the grass is weakened by its spring growth and the weeds have additional impetus to spread. A weed has been defined as a "plant out of place." Weeds are certainly out of place on a well-kept lawn. Fertilizing materials have a great advantage over stable manure as they contain no weed seeds.

There are other fertilizers beside nitrate of soda that are most valuable for the lawn but their use is more especially adapted to the fall. Later the Department will issue advice regarding the application of such materials as ground bone, phosphate rock, potash, dried blood, fish scrap, and sterilized sheep manure. The dissolved rock in particular should not be used in the spring.

Ed P. Hopkins is Suicide.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 16.—Edward P. Hopkins, 25, committed suicide by jumping into the bay. His body was recovered.

Hopkins' papers show he had been employed at La Grande, Or.; that his home is either at Rural Retreat or some nearby place in Virginia, and that he had evidently been confined in prison for two years and a half.

One of the letters was from a sister who signed herself "Hatt," a school teacher near his home town. A note by Hopkins asked that information be sent to I. S. Hopkins, Rural Retreat, Va.

Kissing Mania Seizes Man.

LOS ANGELES, June 16.—At least temporarily insane is the judgment passed by the police upon a man giving the name of R. R. Odtkirk, who has marked osculatory propensities.

Odtkirk's peculiarity became manifest on a Long Beach Los Angeles train when he suddenly seized and kissed a pretty woman passenger. Then he turned and implanted a fervent smack somewhere on the bewhiskered visage of a gray patriarch, who quickly brought his cane into play.

RUNNER MAKES 32 MILES IN 4 HOURS, 29 MINUTES

SPOKANE, Wash., June 15.—Jack Norman, a local marathon runner, blazed the trail for distance runners this week when he ran from the summit of Mount Spokane to the heart of the city, a distance of 32 miles, in four hours and 29 minutes. Norman had previous experience in mountain marathons, having finished second in the Mount Baker race last year. He is the first runner who has covered the distance between Mount Spokane and this city. The mountain is 6,000 feet high and is unique from the fact that it is almost entirely made up of soil. Norman was carried on a motorcycle to within three miles of the summit. He walked the remaining distance to the top, and at 3:55 p. m. without having eaten since 7 o'clock that morning, he started the run to Spokane. He reached here at 8:24 p. m.

Mayor Sits on Dance Lid.

CHICAGO, June 16.—Mayor Harrison declared he did not intend to take the lid off dancing in restaurants unless he is forced to do so. He explained, however, that in case some of the downtown hotels are successful in their mandamus proceeding to compel him to issue dancehall licenses, he will then remove the restrictions.

"People will become so disgusted at the end of 30 days that the thing will die a natural death," he said. "Or if not, they will demand that it be done away with. Permission for dancing has been granted to some of the outlying cafes because they are primarily places of amusement."

"The case is different with downtown restaurants, where people go to eat rather than to drink or dance."

Woman Given Citizenship.

NEW YORK, June 16.—Declaring that she desired to enjoy all the privileges of an American citizen, even to voting, Miss Elizabeth Loughlin, of 160 Twelfth street, Long Island City, was made a citizen of the United States by Justice Garret J. Garretson.

She is the second woman who has been granted citizenship in the county. Miss Loughlin appeared with 48 other applicants, all of whom were men, and she showed a better knowledge of the questions of civil government asked her than any of the men. She was born in Duinnacloy, Ireland, July 3, 1873, and came to America in 1895. Since that time she has been living in Long Island City.

Old Couple is Hopeful.

NEW YORK, June 16.—The sixty-fifth anniversary of their wedding was celebrated recently by Benjamin Franklin McCreary, 89, and his wife, 83. They live in John street, Jamaica, and are well and strong, excepting that Mr. McCreary suffers at times from rheumatism.

"I hope before I die to have a fine comfortable home of my own," said the aged man. "I have been wiped out financially three times, but you can't keep a good man down. I'm still standing on my own keel and am as young as I feel. I have had 65 years of happy married life."
