Patent Leather.

To keep patent leather from cracking and to clean, rub with vaseline. To polish, rub with the white of egg.

The Care of Children

Feeding Babies During Hot Weather. As the warm weather advances, what changes is it advisable to make in the diet of a young infant under one year of age?

This question is asked hundreds of times during the spring and summer seasons. If the baby is a breast-fed child very little need be done in altering his food. On exceedingly warm days it is advisable to give him one ounce of boiled water or one ounce of barley water just before he is nursed, as this dilutes the mother's milk a little and thus aids digestion, which is always taxed somewhat on exceedingly warm days.

If the baby is one year old in the very warm weather, and weaning time is at hand, it is better to nurse him until September if possible than to wean him at this season; but if he is rapidly losing weight and seems anemic the mother should then consult her doctor, and not continue to nurse the child just because it is summer, as more harm may come from starvation than from judicious weaning.

A bottle-fed baby in summertime requires most careful management. The correct diet for a bottle-fed baby is cow's milk properly modified to suit the child; therefore the modified-milk babies will be considered here.

Suppose the baby is taking a formula composed of top milk, which is milk taken from the top of a quart bottle. This top milk is diluted, according to the individual formula with boiled water, barley or oatmeal water, or some similar gruel, then usually an antacid—lime-water or sodium bicarbonate—and some form of sugar are added. The system does not need so much fat or cream in warm weather as it does in cool weather, therefore it is often advisable to use whole or mixed milk in the formula in place of top milk. This is obtained by shaking up the bottle of milk before the milk called for in the formula is taken out of the bottle. In the case of very young infants it may be advisable to give top milk still, but not quite so rich.

COAST CHINESE EXPECT ANOTHER REVOLUTION

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17.—All up and down the Pacific coast plans are said to be ripening in the various oriental colonies for another revolution in China. The same movement is being pushed elsewhere throughout the country but it is on the coast that it has made the greatest progress. The campaign is said to be under the general direction of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who was first provisional president of the present republic and was mainly responsible for the revolution which overthrew the Manchus. Sun is in exile in Japan and President Yuan Shi-kai is reported to have offered \$1,000,000 for his head.

In the United States the agitator is being done by Y. P. Hsieh, for whom, dead or alive, Yuan is understood to have offered \$100,000. Hsieh has toured the country and professes to have found strong financial backing. He is authority for the statement that the revolt is already simmering in central China and may be expected to break out in full volume within the next few months.

The agitators charge Yuan with having undone all the work of the revolution and established a despotism of his own under the name of a republic. Some of them give him credit for being a sincere believer in a despotic form of government for China but they say they do not propose to submit to it merely because he is sincere in thinking it desirable.

GREEKS INSIST ON A WAR AGAINST TURKEY

ATHENS, June 17.—War between Greece and Turkey is inevitable, according to the newspaper "Hestia," which is considered as voicing the majority of Greek public opinion. The government has not as yet received any intimation of the nature of the Sublime Porte's reply to the Greek note, demanding that Turkey cease its persecution of the Greeks in Turkey and make reparation to them for the losses incurred. It is feared here that, in accordance with the usual method of Turkish diplomacy, the Turkish note will contain vague promises and denials and will seek to delay a settlement.

Public opinion is strongly opposed to dilatory tactics, the Hestia says, and will compel the government to insist that the persecutions cease or war will follow at once. It is reported that there have been several encounters between Turks and Christians in the Asiatic littoral and that the Turks are concentrating arms and ammunition at various points. Several sailing vessels with Greek refugees aboard, it is also reported, have been captured by the Turks.

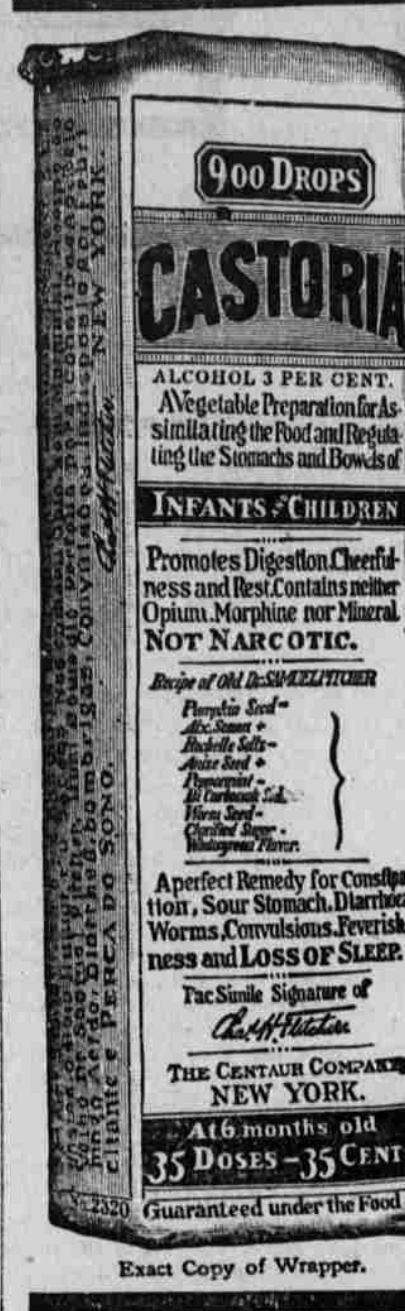

FORMER PENDLETONIAN CAPTURED BY MADMAN

"JIMMIE" MCCOOL, WELL KNOWN HERE, FIGHTS FOR LIFE WITH MANIAC.

James McCool as he is now known since he is secretary to City Commissioner Daly of Portland, but known as "Jimmie" McCool when he was a newspaper man in Pendleton, was held captive in the Mountain View Sanitarium, Portland, for 30 minutes Monday by a maniac. It took two attendants some time to force the man to release his hold on his victim.

With friends, McCool went to the sanitarium to visit an inmate with whom they were acquainted. McCool became separated from his companions and wandered into a ward where a man taking the liquor cure was confined. The madman sprang at him, threw a belt around his neck and strangled him down. At first McCool thought a joke was being played on him but the actions of his captor soon caused him to change his mind and then he sought by strategy to secure his release. He attempted to talk to the man sensibly but this did no good and then he endeavored to free himself by sheer strength.

Back and forth they fought through the ward until finally the noise of the struggle attracted the attention of two attendants who came to the rescue. They were forced to choke the madman into insensibility before he would relinquish his hold on McCool.

FAMOUS WRITER SCOLDS WOMEN OF THIS AGE

PARIS, June 17.—When the feminine kiss is no longer something marketable, but assumes its definite value as a thing that cannot be bought, woman will have attained her proper and predestined role on earth, says Marcel Prevost, the brilliant academician, author, and student of feminine psychology, in his new book on women published today.

Prevost urges that women put aside their vanity and cease to be a slave to man. "Women nowadays are chosen by men," he writes, "it is for women to see to it that it shall be the pride of man that he is chosen as a mate by a woman."

"I do not believe in the alleged bankruptcy of that absurd but charming gesture known as the kiss, but I think woman ought no longer to have to submit to it unwillingly; they should have a complete liberty of initiative in love affairs."

He scolds modern women for their weakness for immodest dress, but adds:

"I am convinced, however, that the good qualities of the woman of tomorrow will overshadow weakness of the woman of today."

TRYING TO STOP THE WILSON PROGRAM

(From the New York World.)

The letter on the subject of automobile advertising written by a Detroit manufacturer attracts attention partly on account of its spirit but chiefly because of the person to whom it is addressed.

In this missive it is delicately hinted that newspapers favorable to the Wilson administration should be boycotted by advertisers. Although the writer disavows any intention to "purchase or dictate" newspaper policy, it is plainly his purpose to bully journals that receive their ideas chiefly from the cash register. There are such newspapers.

Strange as it may appear, the letter was drawn out by a suggestion from Marshall Cushing, who has acted as a go-between for business and politics for many years. It was Cushing who as secretary of the National Manufacturers' association, employed Colonel Mulhall in 1902-7 for "field work" in the interest of the lobby at Washington. It was under Cushing's direction that Colonel Mulhall went with men and money into the districts of congressmen to defeat those who were hostile to the interests and to elect those who were hostile to the interests and to elect those who were friendly. It was Cushing who used

Colonel Mulhall in various places as a strikebreaker.

While the bulldozing letter now at hand carries the name of an important manufacturer, it is otherwise characteristic of Cushing himself. It conveys an idea without directly assuming responsibility for it. Proof exists that Cushing did all of his lobbying at night. He wrote many letters, not one of which was signed. His interviews were all secret. If Colonel Mulhall had not kept thousands of documents and made many notes, his story of the lobby's gumshoe processes could not have been substantiated as it was.

Owing to the publicity inflicted upon him last summer by the World, Cushing was under the painful necessity of removing his finely appointed bureau of persuasion and intimidation from Washington to New York. He has no expectation of returning to the capital until political conditions undergo a change. We infer from the Detroit letter, therefore, that the great work of restoring the lobby and beating Wilson is already under way and that it is going on in the dark as usual.

Sparks from the Telegraph.

The strike of 400 miners of the West Virginia and Pittsburgh Coal company at Colliers, W. Va., has been declared off and the demand for recognition of the union waived.

Lengthy litigation over the estate of the late William Ziegler in New York

has terminated with the receipt by Miss Florence L. Brandt, his adopted daughter, of \$375,000 from her brother, William Ziegler, Jr., adopted son.

The fourth and greatest eruption of steam and smoke from the new opening near the peak of Mount Lassen, at the foot of the Shasta range in California, occurred. The smoke columns reached an estimated height of 2500 feet.

The Minnesota supreme court declared the abatement law enacted for the suppression of disorderly houses to be constitutional.

Appointment of a commission to make a social survey of conditions among the Jews in Palestine was announced by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of the Free synagogue of New York. The commission will visit Jerusalem in September.

PANAMA CANAL HAS CUT TOLLS OF SUEZ WATERWAY

PARIS, June 18.—The Cuez canal management was censured for the first time in years at the annual meeting when the usual 33 per cent dividend was declared. Some shareholders demanded to know why the amount was not larger.

Charles Jonnart, president of the company, said the Suez Canal tolls have been reduced 10 cents a ton to meet the rates fixed for Panama, although he asserted that the Panama canal will have little effect on the Suez canal.
