ASQUITH CAPITULATES AND WILL HEAR WOMEN

PREMIER CONSENTS TO RECEIVE DELEGATION OF SUFFRAGISTS SATURDAY.

LONDON, June 19.—Premier Asquith capitulated to the suffragettes yesterday. He consented to receive a deputation of East End working women in Downing street Saturday.

Miss Sylvia Pankhurst's attempt to carry out her threat of a hunger strike at the entrance of the house of commons until the premier yielded to the demand that he listen to a delegation of women was largely responsible for the prime minister's decision. The efforts of J. Kier Hardie, the socialist-independent leader of parliament, and George Lansbury, an ex-member, helped the militant suffragette leader to bring the premier to his knees.

The victory is a distinct one, because Sylvia Pankhurst was arrested about a week ago for attempting to lead a procession of East End women to Westminster to demand the audience which Mr. Asquith now has promised.

Holloway jail opened its doors last night to release Miss Pankhurst, who was weak and pale after her eighth successive hunger strike, but still determined. She drove to Westminster immediately in a motor car with a woman chauffeur and rebuffed J. Kier Hardie's efforts to persuade her to go home. She was sitting on the steps of the central entrance to parliament house, propped up with cushions and supported in the arms of friends, when Mr. Lansbury came out with the news of Asquith's surrender.

CLERK COFFEY HAS STARTED RECOUNT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—The recount of election returns for the republican nomination for judgeship of the supreme court to determine the winner between Henry L. Benson of Klamath Falls and C. L. McNary of Salem, began in Multnomah county.

County Clerk Coffey began the recount on notification from Secretary of State Olcott that a recount will be made throughout the state. Judge Benson claims the nomination by 16 votes on a mistake discovered in this county and Judge McNary disputes this claim, saying he has won the nomination by a narrow majority.

"WHITE WOLF," DREADED CHINESE BANDIT, ESCAPES

PEKIN, June 18.—"White Wolf," the notorious Chinese brigand, together with 1000 of his followers, broke through the circle of regular troops which had surrounded him on Lily Mountain, 100 miles to the south of Lanchow, since June 4.

General Chao, with 5000 regular troops, followed the brigand in hot pursuit.

"White Wolf" after devastating the provinces of Shan and Shen si, on June 4, attacked Tao Chow. In the extreme south of Kan Su, and, after robbing the inhabitants, burned the town to the ground. He and his followers were surrounded afterward by the regular troops.

NEW YORK, June 18.—The Christian and Missionary Alliance of New York received a dispatch from its headquarters in Central China, saying:

"Kan Su stations revolted. All destroyed. Missionaries safe. There is not much cause for anxiety."

Home Hints and Recipes

Clean With Meal.

Stenciled scrim can be freshened very effectively by this method: After taking down the curtains, shake well, then spread out one at a time on a sheet of clean wrapping paper. Then take a clean whisk broom and brush well to remove corn meal as well as dust. If curtains are wrinkled they may now be pressed, and will be found to be almost as fresh looking as if laundered.

Cooked Radishes.

When radishes are plentiful they are nice to serve as a main dinner vegetable. Boil them till tender in salted water, then drain and reheat in a cream sauce. They are more delicate than turnips and make a very attractive looking dish.

French Coiffures.

The Parisienne appears at her best when in evening attire, and this fact is partially due to the perfection of her coiffure. The French are past masters in the art of arranging the hair, and the new coiffures are of German simplicity. The hair is drawn back over the forehead in soft waves, and the back tresses are coiled in a Grecian knot or figure eight. Another favorite coiffure resembles that of the Empress Josephine at the time of her coronation. The hair is dressed low over the forehead, and soft ringlets fall about the ears and brow. The back hair is arranged close to the head, and a fillet of jewels is worn well over the forehead.

The Care of Children

Training the Child's Will.

After all, what is there about a person that really counts? All experience and all philosophy agree that it is the character; and the central fact in character is the will. Indeed, the training of the will is even more important than the training of the mind. The great defect in our moral training is that we generally attempt to train our children through precepts and mottoes, and rules. The will cannot be trained through learning; it can be made to help. The will expresses itself in action, and must be trained through action.

It is important that the child should acquire certain habits as early in life

as possible. But we must remember that in guiding the child to the formation of these habits, example and practice are far more important than precepts and rules. Example is important because the child is very imitative; one rude act on the part of some older member of the household will counteract the benefit of many verbal lessons in politeness. Practice is important because it is through constant repetition of an act that it is at last automatic, and performed without thought or attention. Imagine how wasteful it would be if, for instance, we had to attend to every movement in dressing ourselves!

It is when we pass from the routine acts that are repeated every day that we come to the field in which the will holds sway. There is nothing more helpful in the training of the will than a great deal of occupation with tasks requiring application and self-control.

All systematic and sustained effort, whether in organizing a game or carrying a garden through from the sowing to the harvest, whether in making a dress or a chest of drawers, has its moral value as training in self-control and application, quite distinct from its contribution to knowledge or skill.

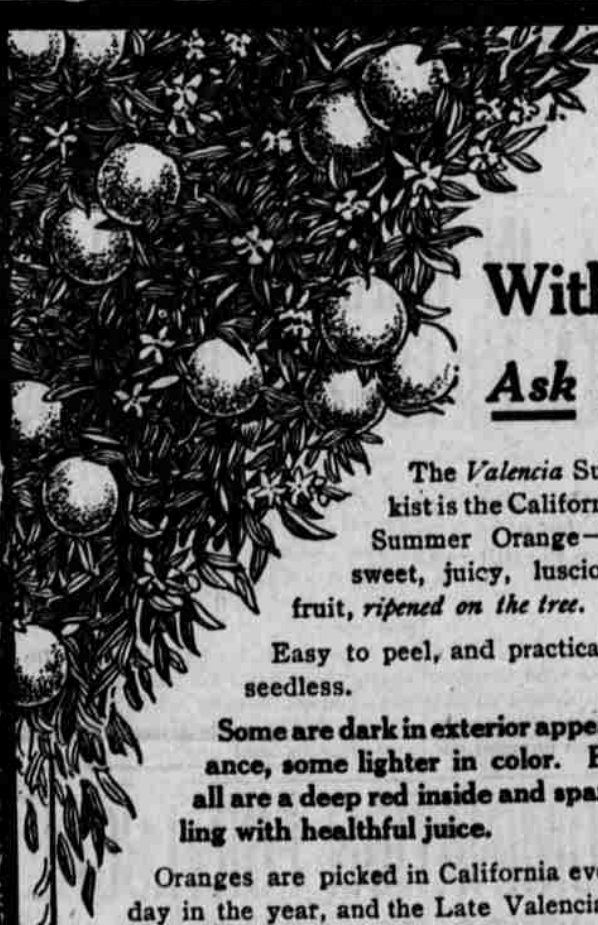
The enlisted men already were enforced abstainers and the officers' messes on the warships and in the garrisons are now to be made "dry."
