STATE HIGH SCHOOL IS NEW DEPARTURE

CALIFORNIA INSTITUTION WILL OFFER ADVANCED COURSE TO TEACHERS. OAKLAND, Cal., June 20.—A state high school, in which vocational training will be given the students and in which practice in the art of teaching will be given to advanced students in the courses of education at the university and normal schools, is to be located in Oakland. San Francisco and Berkeley both were after the school, but the Regents of the University of California, after a conference with state officials and others decided that Oakland should have it.

The state high school is a new departure in California educational methods. The school will be supported by the state, but the buildings and site will be furnished by the city of Oakland. The city, however, will use only the fee of the expense of caring for a large high school, but will have the advantage of having a school directly under the jurisdiction of the educational department of the University of California.

The demand for a state high school grew out of the law that requires all high school teachers to undergo cadet training in a high school of the state. The system of sending scattered schools in which to give this training eliminated the possibility of adequate supervision, and was in many ways unsatisfactory. The new Oakland school will be under the direct supervision of the department of education of the university, of which Dr. Richard G. Boone is acting director. Oakland's offer for a site and buildings was far more liberal than those of the other cities that wanted the school and this and the other superior advantages, including location offered, were the main reasons for the choice of the Regents.
