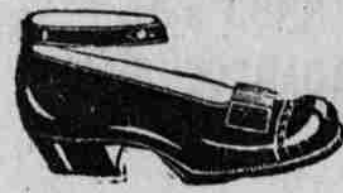

## MINERS AT BUTTE TO FORM SEPARATE ORDER

SECEDING MEMBERS OF WESTERN FEDERATION WILL NOT COMPROMISE.

BUTTE, Mont., June 22.—Seceders from the Western Federation of Miners launched an independent miners' union, rejecting peace overtures of President Moyer and associates and electing as temporary president M. McDonald.

There is little hope of compromising the two factions and with the issues sharply drawn an open breach is expected within a few days. Federation officials threaten to import miners to fulfill the contracts with the operating mining companies.

The mass meeting yesterday was attended by acclamation. All voting was done by acclamation, the officers addressing the assembly through megaphones. The report of the executive committee, in whose hands had been left the drafting of the insurgents' policy, was adopted without change. It provided for the eventual formation of a permanent organization. Temporary headquarters will be established and an assessment of 10 cents a month levied. The membership roll will be opened Tuesday morning.

No official recognition was taken of the Western Federation. President Moyer had no representatives present to offer compromise and his apparent advances in asking for the resignation of all local miners' union officials did not win even consideration from the insurgents.

## WORLD'S PLUME DEALERS TO FIGHT U. S. TARIFF

PARIS, June 18.—A campaign to repeal the clause in the new United States tariff prohibiting the importation of plumes was decided on by the International Congress of Plume Dealers. Besides the French representatives delegates came from Germany, England, Austria, Belgium, Holland and Spain. They will seek the nullification of the decree recently promulgated in Canada and also the prevention of proposed legislation in Great Britain.

It was not true, Edmund Morin said, that their business as plume dealers tended to destroy species. On the contrary, they had the greatest interest in keeping the birds multiplying in domesticity if threatened in wild life.

He cited various examples where this method was employed and pointed out that Austria obtained at the present time 95 per cent of her plume requirements from domestic birds, whereas fifty years ago 45 per cent was derived from wild birds.

## One Prong Fork.

A clever housewife has almost invented a kitchen tool. Taking an ordinary, long handled three pronged fork, she filed off the two outer prongs, leaving only one, and uses this to test whether a vegetable or piece of meat is tender. The one prong makes less mark and is less apt to break the food than the three pronged fork. The fork is good also to remove caps from milk bottles, and especially so in taking olives and other foods from long necked bottles and cans, such as sections of fruit, etc. Indeed, this housekeeper believes that she couldn't "keep kitchen" without it.

## Keeping Cut Flowers.

The life of cut flowers may be prolonged thus: Dissolve a lump of bicarbonate of soda or saltpeter the size of a marrow-fat pea in one tablespoonful of boiling water; pour it into a vase, fill up with clean, fresh, cold water. Now arrange the flowers in it. They will give much better satisfaction than if the soda had been omitted. Change the solution for a fresh one every morning. Confine salt has nearly the same action, though not quite as effectual. Use one tablespoonful to a large vase, say holding a pint. It is wise to keep cut flowers in as cool a temperature as possible. When changing the water cut a tiny piece from the stems.

## The Care of Children

Good Eyesight.

As the mouth has been named the "gateway of the body," so the eyes have been called "the windows of the soul." Blindness from birth means a loss which those of us who can see realize only faintly. The pity of it is that the main cause of blindness in early infancy is one which is easily preventable. Much loss of sight soon after birth is caused by a transmissible disease, and if a little solution of the salts of silver were dropped into the eyes of baby at birth, blindness from this cause would soon cease to exist. Every mother should demand this treatment for her baby, whether or not there is any suspicion that the baby's eyes may be affected. The mother

should not do this herself, but owes it to her child to demand it from her physician.

During babyhood, the eyes should be protected from strong light, particularly when the child is out of doors. Later, when the child makes its first conscious effort to read, to write, or to draw, the time for more definite care has arrived.

Very often it is the teacher who first discovers that a child cannot see well. Books are held close to the face, and the child leans over his desk, straining to see the writing on the blackboard.

Again, defective vision is betrayed by irritability, headache, listlessness and exhaustion after or during school hours, or the child falls behind in his studies. It is not at all uncommon to consider a child stupid, blame him for lack of interest in his studies, or even to punish him for outbursts of temper, when defective vision is the only cause. Medical inspection of school children has shown that fifteen per cent are suffering from bad eyesight, undiscovered until the school doctor calls it to the attention of the parents.

I have personally known of many children who were considered mentally defective, and who would have been committed to spend their lives in institutions for the weak-minded if the school doctor had not discovered that they were suffering from the most extreme form of near-sightedness. After proper eyeglasses were provided these children were able to go back to their regular classes in school, and progressed as other normal children do.

## "American House" for King.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, June 19.—King Christian has decided that the newest of his numerous residences shall be furnished in American style in every detail. He will not imitate the home of the American multimillionaire. The style he has selected to copy is that of the simple equipment of the average American home. He has been an admirer of the American arts and conveniences of home making and has insisted that his newest house, which is situated on the Skaw, will lack none of them.

The excuse for so many residences as King Christian has in so small a country as Denmark is his fondness for keeping in touch with his people, which, he contends, he cannot do better than by living everywhere. The king keeps an elaborate entourage, but it is only for the entertainment

of visiting sovereigns and diplomats. As for himself, he lives in the most simple manner. No ruler in Europe is more easily accessible.

Recently on a visit to Nakskov the king was attracted by a delicious apple pie displayed in a shop window. He went inside to buy a piece and while there bought some cake for a small boy in the shop. Later the shop woman learned the identity of her royal customer and she hung out a sign announcing that her shop purveyed to the royal family of Denmark.

During the recent motor show the king evinced keen interest in the display of American motor cars, and when he bought fifty lottery tickets he expressed the hope that he would win an American car.

## Big Ad Convention Opens.

TORONTO, Canada, June 20.—Absolute honesty in advertising, square-deal business methods to back it up and a better understanding between advertisers and the newspaper publishers were strongly urged here at the opening of the Tenth Annual Convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America. Representatives of the 10,000 business men who comprise the 140 affiliated clubs of the association were present when the first session convened.

"Our goods, our salesmanship and our advertising," declared one of the speakers, "are being cleansed and vitalized by the spirit of truth and sincerity. As a result, we see a growing public confidence in manufactured products and their advertising—a confidence, which if preserved and fostered, decrease our costs, increase our profits, and become a business asset of incalculable value."

## Rotarians Gather at Houston.

HOUSTON, Tex., June 20.—Rotarian clubs all over the world have representatives here for the formal opening tomorrow of the annual convention which will hold sessions through June 26. Six delegates will occupy local pulpits to preach lay sermons on business. A great semi-devotional mass meeting will be held in the city auditorium. The first business meeting of the convention will be opened with Governor Colquhoun and the mayor of Houston to welcome the delegates to Texas and the city. Many of the delegates are accompanied by their families.
