PITCHER BAKER GOES UP IN 9TH; BUCKS WIN

SATURDAY'S GAME RESULTS IN ANOTHER VICTORY FOR LODGE'S BUCKS.

BAKER, Ore., June 22.—Pitching fine ball up to the ninth inning Saturday, Pitcher Baker, following the example of Meili the day before, also blew up, and with the trouble started when Togneri booted an easy grounder that would have been the second out of the Kub twirler allowed five hits in a row, the Buckaroos scoring four runs, which, added to the two already scored, gave them a safe lead. The Kubs got three safe hits off Pitcher in the ninth, but could not register. Final score 6 to 2.

Pendleton's first score came in the first inning and had it counted in the final result Manager King would have protested. Varian was on third with two down and Pembroke was on first. Pembroke started to second and King threw him out, Varian scoring. Pembroke was easily out before Varian crossed the plate, but Williams held the run counted. It made no difference in the final outcome. The Bucks put another one over in the seventh. Pembroke doubled and when the throw from Baker to catch him off second hit him in the back he took third, crossing the plate on Briggs' fly to Nadeau. In the ninth, after Whitt was out, Varian hit an easy one to Togneri, which the latter kicked around, and Varian was safe. Pembroke and Lodell signed, Briggs doubled and Coen and Osborne also hit safely—result four runs.

He scored both of Baker's runs. He singled in the fourth and stole second, Nadeau putting him on third with a well-placed sacrifice. French got a hit and Quack scored. Again in the eighth the first baseman hit safely and again swiped second, scoring on Nadeau's safe one to center field. Baker tried hard in the ninth, Cellars, Baker and King getting hits, but with the bases full and two down Fuller forced King out at second, ending the game. The score:

It is believed Simpson's nine year old daughter was playing with a rifle when it accidentally was discharged. The little girl's father, Ben Simpson, lives at Hillsboro, Oregon.

PITTSBURG, June 20.—Alexander Rufer, a farmer, charged with a misdemeanor by Miss Anna Batany, aged eighteen, testified in criminal court that he was too tired to "spoon" after a hard day's work on the farm. It was a novel defense, but two farmers serving on the jury took exception to his remarks. James B. Emmett arose in the jury box and said he did not believe the statement. He said that, in his opinion, farmers, as a rule, are not so completely exhausted by a day's work that the charms of a comely young woman do not appeal to them.

"That's right, quite right," solemnly affirmed a second member of the jury.

Rufer was found guilty.

LA GRANDE DRESSES UP TO GREET MERCHANTS

OREGON RETAIL ASSOCIATION WILL HOLD THREE DAYS' SESSION THERE.

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 22.—Finishing touches were put on the preparations for the entertainment of the Oregon Retail Merchants' convention, which convenes here for three days. The city presents a gala appearance, being decorated throughout the business section with bunting, flags and vari-colored pennants.

A number of delegates arrived here yesterday in time to witness the eastern Oregon motorcycle races. The larger portion will arrive by special train today and will be met by the La Grande band and escorted to the hall, where routine business will take up their time until Tuesday evening, when a grand community ball will be held on the pavement on Adams avenue, delegate badges to serve as an introduction to all ladies dancing.

Wednesday morning 150 automobiles will take the delegates for a tour of the valley. They will travel the foothill road, so as to view the valley as a whole, to Summerville, and return through the center of the valley by way of Imbler, Union and Hot Lake, making stops at each place. For Wednesday afternoon the most complete wild west show, consisting of racing, bull dogging, broncho busting and all buckaroo events has been arranged. Riders of wide renown will exhibit their dexterity for the pleasure of La Grande's guests.

THIRD MAJOR LEAGUE WILL SOON BE IN FIELD

NEW YORK, June 20.—A third major league to fight the Federals practically was decided upon at a meeting of the national commission. President Johnson of the American league, a member of the commission said: "It has been virtually decided to form a new major league composed of four teams from the international league and four from the American association. The cities to be included in the new organization probably will be announced within ten days."

Church Row in Delaware.

WILMINGTON, Del., June 20.—There is trouble at Milton, Del., over the action of the school board in ousting Miss Heater Derrickson, a teacher. She declares she was dismissed because she is a Catholic. As a result, religious lines are sharply drawn. It is probable an investigation will be demanded by friends of the younger woman.

The Rev. Charles A. Behringer, an Episcopal clergyman and editor of the Milton Times, in which Miss Derrickson made her statement, supports the teacher. In his paper he said: "This affair, coupled with the action of the men of St. Peter's Cathedral, Wilmington, in passing resolutions denouncing the appointment of Ernest Nathan, former mayor of Rome, an official representative of Italy at the San Francisco exposition, has intensified religious matters in Delaware. The resolutions urge a boycott of the exposition unless Nathan shall be withdrawn, because he 'notoriously insults the pope.'"

Red Letter Day Wednesday

MAN TORN TO SHREDS BY MADDENED LIONS

FIVE BEASTS BATTLE OVER BODY WHILE KEEPER IS HELPLESS.

CHICAGO, June 22.—Emerson D. Dietrich, 26 years old, a graduate of Cornell university, was torn to shreds yesterday by five lions, whose cage he had entered to feed them. There were ten lions in the freight car on a sidetrack at Sixteenth street and Indiana avenue, in the heart of the city. In the excitement, thousands of persons returning from a day's outing were thrown into panic by information that some of the lions had escaped and were being pursued by rifle squads from the nearby police stations and the Union Stockyards.

Crowds Driven to Safety.

Notwithstanding the danger, immense crowds surrounded the scene of the tragedy until driven to safety by the police, who had been hastily summoned from every direction. While Dietrich was making his brief and losing fight for life in the teeth and claws of the ferocious beasts, five lions cubs each about the size of a young wolf hound, leaped from the car and tried to slip away. George McCord, keeper of the animals, realizing the peril to the crowds on every side, devoted all his energies to returning them to the car. This he accomplished.

Lion Leaps from Behind.

The ten lions are the property of Mme. Adèle Castillo, who is to open an engagement in a Chicago theater in July. Dietrich, who was connected with the show, went into the car in which the animals had been brought to Chicago to feed them. Keeper McCord, who saw the tragedy, said: "Dietrich went into the den where the six big lions are kept and I followed him. Teddy, the leader in the attack on Dietrich, started to play with him and he ordered the beast to lie down. Four of the lions were facing him at the time, including Teddy. Almost immediately Teddy slunk around behind Dietrich and in a second was on his back, tearing and clawing him frightfully. The others—Brutus, Nellie, Jeff and Mutt—then joined in, and what followed was awful."

Animals Tear Body to Pieces.

McCord screamed, with tears streaming down his face, as he came to this part of his story. "My God, I'm gone," screamed Dietrich, "get the fork; they are killing me."

Those were his last words. His dying words. His dying moans were lost in the snarl and roar of the lions as they tore his quivering body to rags, pulling it from one to the other. McCord, sick at heart, kept his head as he saw the five lion cubs, excited by what had happened, slip out of the door and drop to the railway tracks. He knew Dietrich was beyond assistance and his first thought was to prevent another tragedy. He slammed and bolted the door of the den and called help to imprison the cubs.

The car was in a labyrinth of tracks but the escaping cubs were caught

slinking back of nearby cars, lassoed and returned to their cage.

It required an hour's time and constant battling with the lions to recover the remnants of Dietrich's body. Great quantities of formaldehyde were shot into the cage and the lions were forced into a corner. Dietrich's head, one arm and a leg had been eaten. A leather belt was the only article of clothing left. Even the shoes had been torn off.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN TERROR OF NIGHT RIDERS

LEXINGTON, Ky., June 13.—Night riders have begun their work afresh in Western Kentucky. In a tier of counties there called the "Black Patch" men, women and children have been whipped with switches, after being bound to trees. Threats have been made against others, and the peace officers have been threatened with death. Whole communities are in terror.

Fully one hundred tobacco plant beds have been destroyed by hordes of masked men in the last two weeks. Grand juries have been instructed to find out who the guilty parties are, and several men have been indicted. Meanwhile, the outrages continue, giving basis for the story that there are large bodies of men in every county who can carry on the work of terrorizing the farmers.

Judge R. O. Pace and County Attorney W. H. Gray of Greenville, who have been particularly active against the Night Riders, have been repeatedly threatened with death. Judge Pace received a letter threatening his life and his baggage and car were burned.

Many men who have been beaten terribly have refused to tell the police officers anything about it for fear of other visits from the night riders. A few years ago the night riders organized in western Kentucky numbered fully fifteen hundred men. Governor Wilson then issued a proclamation that any one killing night riders was already pardoned, and after the troops were ordered out the lawlessness ceased until the last few weeks.
