Health and Beauty.

Warts will disappear if touched several times a day with acetic acid, apply with a small camelhair brush or the end of a match.

Clover tea is admirable for purifying the blood, for removing pimples and whitening the complexion, and has also good effect as a sleep inducing draft.

Mosquito bites may be rendered speedily painless by rubbing the place with a piece of soap slightly moistened to produce a lather, which is allowed to dry.

An infant should be given no food containing starch until it cuts its

teeth. Starchy foods include biscuits, corn flower, tapioca, sago, rice, potato, etc. An infant cannot digest any of these until its teeth are cut.

Lemon, orange and cucumber peels are excellent for the complexion. Let them soak in your water jug, for they not only soften but tonify and freshen the complexion, keeping the flesh healthy and firm.

Be sure that your child breathe through his nose and not his mouth. The nose may be clogged by a growth or adenoids in the throat may obstruct the air passage. Habitual mouth breathing creates a tendency to tuberculosis and should be prevented by operation if necessary.

ACTRESS KISSES LION THAT KILLED FIANCE

WOMAN TRAINER ENTERS CAGE WHERE TRAGEDY WAS ENACTED SUNDAY.

CHICAGO, June 23.—After kissing and fondling the lion that had killed and mutilated her fiance, Emerson Dietrich, Miss Adgie Castillo declared her belief at the corner's inquest over the body that George McCord, the keeper did not do all he could to save Dietrich, who was manager of a vaudeville act and a Cornell graduate. Miss Castillo denied that McCord was jealous of Dietrich's attentions to her.

McCord followed the woman lion-famer to the stand. He was asked if he liked Dietrich.

"Well, we had many quarrels in the theaters about staging the act," McCord said. "But we were friends, and Sunday we had no trouble."

"How was it you had so many scraps and yet were friendly?" the coroner asked.

"Troubles About Work Mainly," McCord replied.

"Well, did you have any love for the man?" the coroner persisted.

"I did when I saw him in that fix Sunday," McCord replied.

"Why didn't you go in the cage with your forks and prods and help fight the lions?" McCord was asked. "It was too dangerous," he replied. "I fought them from the outside and did everything I could, but it was useless."

Earlier in the day Miss Castillo entered the cage and kissed and fondled the lion cub which had torn her fiance to death.

The jury returned a verdict that Dietrich died of shock and injuries, the result of an attack by six lions, and the jurors expressed the belief that it was accidental.

INNOCENT OF FORGERY; SET FREE FROM PRISON

BOSTON, June 22.—A remarkable case of mistaken identity was disclosed in the superior court. It resulted in the immediate release from the house of Correction at Deer Island of Herbert T. Andrews, who on May 18 was sentenced to that institution for 14 months for forgery. He had protested his innocence from the time of his arrest.

Through the confession of Earle Barnes of New York, who was arrested at Nantasket Beach for forging and passing checks, the innocence of Andrews was clearly established.

Barnes, who is twenty-seven years old, well dressed and of excellent appearance, the police say, has passed worthless checks in every hotel, department store, shoe store, florist and jewelry concern in this city. These checks varied in amount from \$5 to \$20, the amount of them, rather than their denomination proving the surprising feature of the case.

"Suffragette Glass" Suggested.

LONDON, June 22.—As a safeguard against suffragettes, the authorities of the British Museum are seriously considering the adoption of "armored glass" for the cases containing the more valuable and destructible exhibits. Several thousand dollars worth of this newly invented glass has already been placed in the South Kensington Museum, the National Portrait Gallery, and the Shakespeare Museum at Stratford-on-Avon. Experiments show it to be practically unbreakable, the severest blows with hammers and hatchets merely "starring" the surface. Made by a patented process it is composed of three layers, the two outside ones being of plate glass and the interior one of sheet celluloid. It is perfectly transparent, has no more refraction than ordinary glass, and is only slightly thicker.

NEW RATES WILL BE CONSIDERABLY LOWER

REDUCTIONS FROM 4 TO 20 PER CENT FROM EAST WILL BE IN EFFECT.

Victory Over Railroads in Decision of Supreme Court Means Much to Inland Empire—25-Year Fight Is Victory for Spokane—First Protest Made in 1889.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 23.—The decision of the supreme court in the intermountain rate case means that new freight rates, running approximately from 4 to 20 per cent lower than the present rates to Spokane from eastern territory, will be put in effect.

The decision of the interstate commerce commission making blanket or zone rates is upheld and will result in the following approximate reductions in rates:

To Spokane from Missouri river points, 4 per cent.
To Spokane from Mississippi river points, 10 per cent.
To Spokane from Chicago territory, 14 per cent.
To Spokane from Detroit territory, 15 per cent.
To Spokane from Pittsburg territory, 20 per cent.
To Spokane from New York territory, 10 per cent.
To Spokane from New Orleans territory, 28 per cent.

25-Year Fight at End.

The decision marks the end of a 25-year fight. In 1889 a protest was first shaped against the railroad policy that took a heavier tribute from freight bound to Spokane than it did from freight carried 500 miles further to the Pacific coast. In 1892 the case was carried up without result. In February, 1902, the interstate commerce commission gave a ruling affording partial relief, but later Spokane filed a new complaint and put into issue all the rates on freight to Spokane, the commission's first order having affected only specific commodities. The same month congress passed the "long and short haul" amendments to the interstate commerce act.

Under that law the roads were forbidden to charge more for short hauls than they did for longer hauls, without the consent of the commerce commission, and were given six months to adjust conditions where that state of affairs existed. In 1911 the railroad acting under the law came before the commission with their request for the right to charge lower rates to the coast than they did to the intermountain cities. This was the final hearing, and the commission reported in June, 1911, their final decision of the intermountain rate case.

Zone Relief Established.

Setting out the system of zone, the commission ordered the roads to reduce rates to Spokane from points west of Grand Portage, Minn., and Missouri Valley points 7 per cent. From zone two, territory approximating the distance of Chicago, they ordered rates reduced 15 per cent, and from zone three, best described as the Buffalo-Pittsburg locality, they ordered a reduction of 25 per cent.

Before the commerce court, now out of existence, the railroads made application for a restraining order preventing the new rates from going into effect, and got it easily. The commission, backed by Spokane and the intermountain cities, appealed to the supreme court.

The decision yesterday concludes the case.

Porter Bros. expect to add \$600 men to their force on the Tillamook lake section of the Willamette Pacific, south of Florence.

PIONEER ATTORNEY OF OREGON CALLED BY DEATH

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Cyrus A. Dolph for many years one of the leading attorneys in Oregon, died at the age of 73. He had been ill since January. Mr. Dolph had participated in many great movements for development of the west. He came to Portland in 1862.

Gamblers Stop Traffic.

JOHANNESBURG, June 22.—Johannesburg recently has acquired an unenviable reputation for gambling among the colored people, who are turning the streets in some parts of the town into casinos. Traffic is occasionally held up by crowds gathering and playing games of chance with dice and cards.

The police raided several groups, but their efforts are almost nullified by the players, whose scouts watched the police and gave notice of their approach. The majority of the players sought safety in flight.

The police followed and battles royal ensued, with the ultimate result that a number of Indians and Chinese were arrested.

Native detectives were also busy rounding up resorts where illicit liquor trade is carried on, and many arrests were made.

CHICAGO, June 23.—A new thing in the way of conventions opened here when the twelfth annual meeting of the Wholesale Saddle Association of the United States convened in the Auditorium hotel. The saddlery wholesalers will be in convention for two days but with the exception of an address of welcome and a response there are no speeches on the program. The saddlery manufacturers, who will open their meeting tomorrow to continue through Thursday will go the wholesalers one better by dispensing with all set speeches and listening to committee reports and informal talks. Theater parties, boat rides and other entertainments occupy choice places on the program for the two conventions.

Chicago Most Musical City.

BERLIN, Germany, June 23.—F. Wight Neumann, the Chicago impresario, is convinced that Chicago is the most musical city in America because it is virtually the only city where concerts are not attended by "dead-ends."

"If the people of Chicago," he said "love music sufficiently to pay to hear it, then they love it more than the people of other cities where free tickets or the playing upon society ambition is required to fill the houses."

In reply to a question as to how many Chicagoans could be counted on to attend good concerts, Mr. Neumann said:

"For a concert of excellent character but not sensational, 2000; about 300 will attend chamber concerts."

Mr. and Mrs. Neumann and daughter are going to Bayreuth, Munich and Salzburg festivals and later to Bad Kissingen and Carlsbad.

Number of Insane Grows.

NEW YORK, June 22.—Dr. A. J. Ransoff of King's Park hospital for the insane, in a paper read at the second annual conference of the Eugenic Research Association at Columbia University, asserted that the number of insane persons in the institutions of the United States has nearly

trebled in the last 40 years in proportion to population.

The average per 100,000, according to Dr. Ransoff's figures, has increased from 88.3 to 232. The most fortunate state, the physician said, was Oklahoma, in which only 67 per 100,000 of the total population are in the insane category. Massachusetts, he asserted, is in the worst condition, having 312.4 per 100,000 of its total population either insane or semi-insane.

Uncover Loot 20 Years Old.

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., June 20.—S. H. Morris, a merchant of this city believes the silverware that was found buried beneath a bridge near Waldron several days ago was of the loot of a gang of robbers who infested Greensburg about twenty years ago.

Mr. Morris was a resident of Greensburg at that time and his home was among the numbers entered. Silver and articles that were three silver butter knives. These, it is said, were found in the silver at Waldron.

The burglars terrorized Greensburg until detectives were employed to ferret out the crimes. Mr. Morris believes that when hard pressed they took their loot to the place and buried it, intending to get it later.

Y. M. C. A. Boys in Camp.

GRANBY, Colo., June 23.—Seventy-five boys went into camp on the site of the old camping ground of the old Indian Chief Curay, four miles from here. They constitute the first camping party sent out by the Denver Y. M. C. A. for the summer. The boys will remain at "Camp Chief Curay" until July 6. On July 7 the second camp will be established at the same place, extending until July 20.

Prominent Engineer is Dead.

CHICAGO, June 23.—Benjamin Williams, past president of the Western Society of Engineers, dropped dead here shortly before he planned to take a train for Ann Arbor, Mich. He was to have received the honorary degree of Master of Engineers at the University of Michigan.

HOME ECONOMICS POPULAR IN NEW CURRICULA

MADISON, Wis., June 23.—A notable increase in courses offered in home economics, agriculture, manual training and physical education marked the opening of the summer sessions of the University of Wisconsin. The home economics courses are considerably expanded, and an interesting line of work will be offered in courses of public speaking, argumentation and speech composition.

The entire staff of the department of education will be kept busy during the summer sessions and teachers will find courses in this department specially adapted to meet the practical problems that confront them in their every day work. Provisions are being made by the university to take care of the recreation side of summer life, and a special playground will be established for the benefit of summer students.

MOOSE MAY LOCATE SANITARIUM AT DENVER

DENVER, Colo., June 22.—That Denver will be chosen as the site for the \$2,000,000 sanatorium proposed by the Loyal Order of Moose was the prediction made when the supreme council of that order began a session here. Delegates from all the mountain states are in attendance, the principal business being the selection of the site.

The members of the supreme council and the special committee which traveled over the country looking at various sites submitted, have been offered 33 sites in the immediate vicinity of Denver.

Teacher at Summer School.

BOULDER, Colo., June 22.—Several hundred teachers from states in the Rocky Mountain region are attending the eleventh annual summer session of the University of Colorado. The formal opening exercises will not be held until Wednesday. Classes will continue until the latter part of July, examinations being held July 31.
