Home Hints and Recipes

Dictates of Fashion.

The Care of Children

"Among the ailments of babies must be classed the failure to gain from two to six or more ounces a week," said Dr. Robert G. Hall in his lecture on "The Prevention and Treatment of the Common Ailments of Children" given at the Parents' Educational Bureau of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, Continuing Dr. Hall said:

"All babies should be weighed carefully each week, and if not gaining, a change should be made in their food."

"Colic is indicated by crying that cannot be stopped. Keeping the bowels loose and a suitable food will prevent it, and a large hot injection will relieve it."

"Constipation should always be corrected by a change of food. Use castor oil only rarely as a purge. Milk of magnesia is the best laxative for babies, and should be given in sufficient quantity to be effective, as it is harmless. Compound licorice powder is the best for children over two. A teaspoon, full dose, at night, is best."

"Diarrhoea should be treated by giving a large dose of castor oil, no food much water, rest in bed, and later, thin cereal gruels, avoiding milk and animal food till recovery occurs."

"Croup alone should be treated with the windows closed. In practically every other disease fresh air is best. Steam inhalations and special drugs relieve this. Only a doctor can tell the difference between this and the dreaded membranous croup."

"Astology a Superstition."

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—Astology is branded as a superstition by the department of agriculture in its current weekly news letter. Discussing the question whether the planets affect "the belief, still to be found in all countries, that the planets and the moon do affect the weather never had any scientific basis. It is only a remnant of the many superstitions generated and fostered by that greater superstition, astrology."

The department's conclusion on the subject says:

"We have every reason to believe that neither the planets nor the moon can have any appreciable effect on the weather because they furnish so little heat upon which all weather changes ultimately depend, and this belief is supported by weather records."

\$500,000,000 for Farm Loans.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—Comptroller of the Currency, Williams estimates that about \$500,000,000 in national banks throughout the United States is available for farm mortgage loans under the provision of the federal reserve act, making it possible for national banking associations to lend money on improved farm lands.

Scores of inquiries concerning this provision reach the treasury department daily and there does not seem to be a general understanding that the farm loan clause of the act is in force and makes it possible for national banks to make farm loans before the formal organization of the federal reserve board.

The estimate of Comptroller Williams is based on reports showing the capital stock and surplus of national banks to be \$1,777,000,000. Twenty-five per cent of this amount, or \$444,250,000, is available for farm loans. Furthermore, the federal reserve act provides that national banks may grant farm loans up to 33-1-3 per cent of their time deposits. Banks with large deposits will be able to exceed the sum they could lend on farms under the 25 per cent clause and the estimate of Mr. Williams is believed to be conservative.

Farm loans under this act are thought to be made for longer than five years and the amount of each loan is not to exceed 50 per cent of the actual value of the farm offered as security.

WASHINGTON MEMORIAL TABLET IS DEDICATED

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., June 24.—With impressive ceremonies city officials and local members of the Sons of the American Revolution and other patriotic societies joined in dedicating the tablet on the site where George Washington stopped here on his way to take command of the Continental army at Cambridge, Mass., 139 years ago. Three members of the Massachusetts chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution left Philadelphia two days ago to cover the route taken by Washington. A tablet will be unveiled at Elizabeth.

BUTTE MINERS IN RIOT; 1 IS KILLED

ANOTHER MORTALLY WOUNDED—DYNAMITE USED TO BLOW UP UNION HALL.

BUTTE, Mont., June 24.—Open warfare, in which guns and dynamite were used, broke out in Butte last night in the trouble between factions of the miners' union.

One man was killed, one was mortally wounded, another was less seriously hurt, in a fusillade by deputy sheriffs who were keeping the crowd back from the Miners' Union hall. Three charges of dynamite were exploded in and under the hall, the front of which was blown out. Deputies fire to keep crowds back. The crowds had pressed on the Miners' Union hall in consequence of a scheduled meeting there, at which President Moyer, of the Western Federation of Miners, was to outline a peace plan.

Most of the shots were fired into the air by the officers. The shooting of the three men apparently took most of the nerve out of the crowd and they quickly backed a distance of two blocks from each side of the hall.

A hundred deputies with sawed-off shotguns were holding the hall.

Sheriff Cries for Deputies.

Sheriff Driscoll, shortly after the firing began and after the crowd was forced down the street, appeared at the entrance of the hall and shouted that he wanted 500 deputies. No response was made to the sheriff's appeal.

Ernest Noy, traveling inspector for the Montana demurrage bureau, a bystander, was the man killed. The bullet passed through his neck.

The mortally wounded man is J. H. Brune aged 52. He was shot through the head and cannot live.

Brune was going upstairs to the miners' hall to attend the meeting when a bullet struck him. The deputies apparently fired on any one in sight who approached the hall.

The third man wounded is Charles Kramer of Los Angeles, a spectator. The bullet grazed his stomach. He is not seriously hurt.

Hibernians Hold Meet.

CHESEAPEAKE BEACH, Md., June 24.—A joint athletic meet and picnic was held here by members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians of Baltimore and Washington. The athletics were under the auspices of the A. O. U. in charge of Daniel N. Hassett, of the Irish-American Athletic Club of New York.
