TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS

PORTLAND, June 25.—A three day conference for the training of state prohibition workers opened here today. Prohibition advocates from all parts of the state were in attendance. A number of prominent speakers will be heard.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—J. O. Davis, customs collector in San Francisco has appealed to the treasury department for 200 more men to handle extra business he expected during the 1915 exposition.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Senator Works, California, has introduced in the senate a bill appropriating \$100,000 for an irrigation and reclamation exhibit at the Panama-California exposition to be held in San Diego next year.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—A bill prohibiting the tipping of waiters or porters on trains and ships engaged in interstate commerce and making it unlawful for employers paying wages so low that tipping is necessary was introduced in the senate by Senator Works, California.

Crude Oil Price Cut Again.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 25.—Another reduction in the price of crude oil was announced at the opening of the market. The new prices are Pennsylvania crude, \$1.75; Mercator black and Newcastle, \$1.34; and Cabell and Newcastle, \$1.34. A reduction in each grade of 5 cents a barrel. Ragland advanced 5 cents to 70 cents and Somerset at \$1.05 and Corning at \$1 were unchanged.

Oil men when they saw the new quotations professed to believe that the bottom of the movement had been reached. The advance in Ragland was the first noted since Pennsylvania crude began to slip off from \$2.50 several months ago, and the reduction in other grades was the smallest per barrel in the same time.

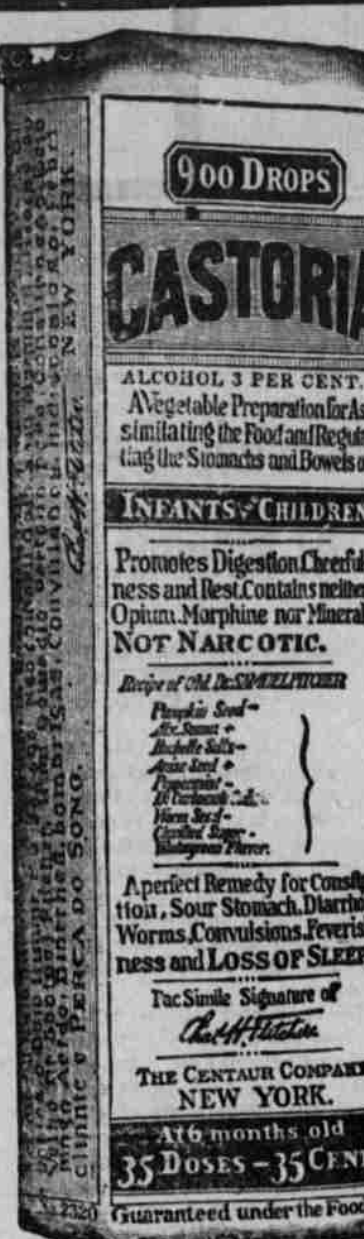
Armour Yacht Is Refloated.

MERCHANTS ENDORSE OREGON MADE GOODS

RETAIL ASSOCIATION AT LA GRANDE MEETS IN PORTLAND NEXT YEAR.

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 25.—With the election of Portland as the next meeting place, and the reelection of J. L. Stockton and F. R. Merrick as president and secretary, the Oregon Retail Merchants' association convention closed so far as business is concerned.

The convention passed resolutions endorsing the use of Oregon-made goods, changes in bankruptcy law, more protection from bad checks, federal law for standardizing of merchandise, cooperation with Commercial clubs to bring more farmers to Oregon and the proposed initiative measure giving the Oregon manufacturers a fair price differential.

The newly elected officers are: President, J. L. Stockton, reelected; secretary, F. L. Merrick, reelected; Portland; treasurer, Theo. Watts; vice presidents, southern Oregon, Mr. Isaacs, of Medford; Willamette valley, Mr. Epley, Salem, Mr. Tilburg, McMinnville, and E. D. Matlock, Eugene; Portland, Mr. Mann, Mr. Guither and Mr. Maloney; Astoria district, N. P. Perry of Holton; eastern Oregon, E. Pollock, La Grande, W. H. Browning, Baker; first vice president, Dan Kelaher, Portland; second vice president E. N. Warner, Medford; third vice president, J. G. Snodgrass, La Grande.
