Taploca Glue.

An excellent glue that is harmless, colorless and odorless is made of tiploca. Cover the desired quantity with cold water, put it over the fire and stir, adding more water as it boils to make a good paste. It can be used to glue wood, leather or paper. For scrapbooks or photographs it may be necessary to add a little water.

To Clean Milk Bottles.

An easy way to clean milk bottles is to fill the bottle half full of hot soapuds and drop in the wire dish cloth that hangs over most everybody's sink. Give the bottle a few shakes and rinse with hot water and your bottles are thoroughly cleaned in a very few minutes.

\$1,500,000 WILL BE VOTED FOR SCHOOLHOUSES

OAKLAND, Cal., June 28.—Oakland will have an opportunity in the fall to vote \$1,500,000 in bonds for new school houses, needed by the big increase during the last year in the number of school children in the city. Within the last year and a half, Oakland has spent more than \$2,000,000 on school buildings, having completed 14 new schools, which is a

record unbeaten by any American city. Despite this, the schools were so crowded when they closed for the summer vacation, that new buildings and additions to old ones are a necessity, and must be provided as soon as possible.

Temporary buildings were provided during the last term, but these, while they took care of a large part of the overflow from the main buildings, were not satisfactory, and a number of new buildings are planned. The great growth of Oakland's population has brought thousands of new families to the city, and the number of scholars applying for entrance to the schools has taxed the ingenuity of the board of education to care for them.

Gideons in Session.

CHICAGO, June 26.—Traveling salesmen, whose routes made it convenient for them to be in Chicago, participated in the first session of a three day conference of Gideons, the organization of Christian traveling men, held in conjunction with the International Sunday School convention now being held here. The Gideons' attending the conference will form a company of their own and march in the big Sunday school parade tomorrow. A Gideon field day will be held Sunday with several officers occupying Chicago pulpits.

Strawberry Crop 93 Cars.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., June 28.—Up to date the Apple Growers' Association has shipped 90 carloads of strawberries. Through more cars will be shipped. The crop is nine cars less than last year, when 102 cars were shipped.

Last year 12 carloads of cherries were shipped. "We do not look for more than three cars of black cherries this year," said William Irwin, of the clerical department of the association. "However, about six cars of Royal Annes have been harvested and used in the local cannery and preserved by the Long Syrup & Refining company of The Dalles.

Home Hints and Recipes

Bags For Vegetables.

These bags are made of cheesecloth and are used to put celery, tomatoes, lettuce and other fresh vegetables in before placing in the refrigerator. Dampened, they keep the vegetables fresh and the ice box clean. They can be put into the weekly wash. They will sell readily at fairs.

How to Plaster.

To repair holes or cracks in walls, secure some fresh mortar. Clean out the holes with a brush, remove all loose plaster thoroughly, wet the slabs and old plaster with a sponge, fill up the hole or cracks with fresh mortar, pat down even. In a few hours go over again with knife or trowel. Close holes in woodwork with a paste made of glue and fine sawdust.
