Library News

NEW BOOKS.
Dorr—*What Eight Million Women Want*. "Popular articles describing the four movements which the International Council of Women have agreed to support; peace and arbitration, social purity, removing legal disabilities of women and woman suffrage. Such things as the playground movement, the servant question, the social conditions of the factory workers, and the lure of the dance halls are discussed while all that is being done by women to correct these evils is vigorously set forth. The examples from real life are convincing."

Frederick—The New Housekeeping. "Points out lines of investigation which a housekeeper may follow in attempting to do her own work with little assistance. Treats of the family budget in a casual way, and the wage scale and servant problem in an efficient manner. The author makes a strong stand for educating the housewife to demand good quality, full weight and standard purity, and shows the need of legislation in regard to enforcing a one price plan for the whole country."

James—Varieties of Religious Experience; a Study in Human Nature. "Psychologic study of personal religion in widely different manifestations."

Lane—The Great Illusion. "Dispels the illusion that commercial and industrial well-being depend on armament and urges the necessity for realizing economic interdependence. Brilliant, thought-provoking arguments against war. Its strength lies in the fact that it aims to take this movement out of the realm of the spiritually ideal into that of the practical—to found an anti-militarism basis on material advantage."

Shackleton—Adventures in Home-making. "A fascinating account of the making over of an ugly old house into a charming and artistic home. Most of the author's successes in remodeling, decorating and furnishing could not be duplicated, but they give much really useful and practical advice to home-makers. 'There is no use living in a house you don't like,' aver the Shackletons cheerfully, and then proceed to produce their evidence: photographs of the very ugly one they bought, and of the charming abode into which they have transformed it. The adventures extended to porches, barn, gardens, useful and ornamental, and lawns; so that a variety of interest is assured. There are pictures of all stages of the game of home-making, the fascinations of which, in spite of multitudinous details, are never lost sight of."

Solenberger—One Thousand Homeless Men. "A scholarly and dispassionate study of about 1000 cases of unemployment which came under the author's observation while in charge of the central district of the Chicago Bureau of Charities. The collection of data, following up of cases and preparation of tables were carried on from 1900 to Mrs. Solenberger's death in 1910. The result is a mass of well arranged material of great value to charity workers and to students of sociology. No panacea is offered but many reforms suggested. The records are analyzed for all that they have to show as to causes of homelessness, the characteristics of the homeless, their individual treatment, their environment and the social remedies."

Home Hints and Recipes

Saltin Almonds.
When saltin almonds, put the almonds in boiling water and at the end of five minutes, drain and plunge im-

mediately into cold water then the skins will come off easily. Do not use much butter and watch the nuts constantly while they are in the oven lest they become too brown.

Salt Extracted.
It is an easy matter to drop too much salt in the potatoes or peas. To remove the salt stretch a clean cloth over the vessel and sprinkle a tablespoonful or more of flour on the cloth and allow the contents to steam. In a short time the flour will have absorbed the salt.

A Laundry Help.
One of the most disagreeable features of the wash boiler is the difficulty with which small articles such as handkerchiefs, collars and small laces are fished out of the steaming suds. If a small cheesecloth bag is made, and these articles put into it for the boiling process, your time, temper and complexion will be saved.

DUKE OF GRAFTON



Earl of Euston.

LONDON, June 30.—The Earl of Euston, has announced his engagement to Miss Edith Havemeyer, daughter of the late Henry Havemeyer, of New York. The Earl of Euston is the eldest son of the Duke of Grafton, who is in his 94th year. Miss Havemeyer is a granddaughter of William Frederick Havemeyer one of the founders of the house, whose vast fortune was made in sugar. When Miss Havemeyer became the Duchess of Grafton, she will be the fourth American woman to attain the title of Duchess. The Earl of Euston's family name is Fitzroy. The Duke of Grafton was created in 1875.

FAMILY ROW OVER FUNDS PUT UP TO SAVE PATRICK

DENVER, June 29.—John T. Milliken, St. Louis and Colorado millionaire, who saved Albert T. Patrick, his brother-in-law, from the electric chair at Sing Sing, has been sued in the United States court in Denver for an accounting of the costs of the fight to free Patrick.

Oil stock now valued at \$250,000, which was contributed as part of the fund raised to save Patrick, forms the basis of the suit. Leonidas E. Hill of Denver, well known Cripple Creek mining man, brother-in-law of Patrick and Milliken, brings the suit.

Hill alleges that in 1907 he turned over to Milliken 20,000 shares of oil stock of the Milliken Oil Company, Tulsa, Okla., to be used to aid Patrick. He says Milliken has refused to make an accounting and he is unable to ascertain just how much of the fund he gave went to the cause of Patrick.

TERMINAL RATE CASE OPENS AT PORTLAND

ASTORIA'S FIGHT FOR READJUSTMENT IS IN LINE AGAINST RAILS.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—The taking of testimony in the city of Astoria's fight for terminal rates equal to those in force to Puget Sound ports began here today before Examiner Pugh of the interstate commerce commission. All of the testimony gathered will be submitted to the commission itself and later arguments will be heard in Washington.

All of the railroad companies affected apparently were aligned solidly against Astoria, their representatives declaring previously to the opening of the hearing that they will resist all efforts of the Columbia river to become a terminal on the grounds that the distances are greater to Astoria than to Puget Sound from the east and that the entire freight rate fabric will be overturned.

On the other hand, Attorney C. W. Fulton, counsel for Astoria, declared the matter of distances paled into insignificance when it is considered that on account of curves and grades a single 110 ton locomotive can haul only 600 tons of freight over the mountains to Puget Sound, while the North Bank railroad can haul 4000 tons to Portland in much less time and the same water grade obtains from there to Astoria.

The interest the railroads are taking in the hearing was indicated by the presence of J. G. Woodworth, vice president, Henry Blakely, general freight agent of the Northern Pacific, H. A. Scandrett, special interstate commerce commission attorney for the Union Pacific, P. J. Costello, general freight agent of the Northern Pacific, many other railroad officials, and a formidable array of legal lights.

Indians Find Suicide.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., June 29.—Coroner Merle Chapman returned yesterday from Tumwater Falls, on the Columbia river, where he investigated the death of Edgar Porter, who committed suicide. Indians early Friday morning found the body of the man, wrapped in his blankets, with the top of his head blown off with a 30-30 Winchester which lay on the ground beside him.

A skiff, the gun and camp outfit and \$1.40 in money comprised his belongings. He had been at the store in Celilo the day before and seemed in good spirits and no cause is assigned for the act. His father, Walker G. Porter, of Sand Creek, Mich., and J. T. Brown, a half brother, of Clare, Mich., have been advised by telegraph of Porter's death.
