### LAST LAP OF PENNANT RACE TO START TODAY

BUCKS LEAD THE LEAGUE BY A MARGIN OF TWO AND A HALF GAMES.

Leading the league by a margin of two and a half games and with three more series away from home and but one on the local grounds, the Pendleton Buckaroos today start upon the last lap of the pennant race. The series this week is the critical one, for the Walla Walla Bears, runners up in the race, are pitted against them. The series will see a change in the standing of the two teams for there will be no such thing as an even break, there being seven games in this series. Two are scheduled for July 4.

Judging from the way the two teams have been going during the past few weeks, the long end of the series should fall to Pendleton. Lode and his men have won 17 of the last 20 games played, a record that proves they have the victory habit. However with both teams evenly matched, the breaks in the game generally turn the tide and Walla Walla is as liable to get them as Pendleton. The great strength of the Buckaroos lies in their batting. Six of them are batting consistently over the .300 mark and the others are getting their hits right along. In the fielding department, too, they are without a peer in the league and their pitchers are almost certain of good support.

The question then is, Can the Buckaroos keep down the opposing score? A great deal of reliance can be placed in Osborne and Schroeder and both will probably work in two games this week. However, the best pitchers get their bumps and Osborne and Schroeder have had a long winning streak. Like the little girl with the curl, Fitchner is very, very good when he is good at all and when he is bad he is horrid. Lewis, the new acquisition from Yakima, is mostly a

gambler. He has pitched some mighty good ball for the Braves but was a hardluck twirler for them. With the strength of the Pendleton fielders and batters behind him, he should be a winner.

Walla Walla is not weak in the pitching department. Leeper has been a reliable man all season and the fact that Bridger has not allowed a score in the last 25 innings he has pitched would indicate that he is in his old time form. Lund has been going at a great rate and Pattison, the new hurler, is reported to be a find. The Bears are crippled by the illness of Fred McKeen who has been playing the first sack and Johnson will have to come in from the field. An outfielder from Wabburg will probably take Johnson's place. Sheely is the regular catcher now.

Pendleton's only injured player is Varian who has a torn ligament in his right heel. However, he will probably be able to enter the games this week.

Following the present series, Pendleton plays twice with Baker and once with Yakima, while Walla Walla plays twice with Yakima and once with Baker, making the local team up against the harder proposition.

PHILADELPHIA, June 29.—Mrs. Cyrop Niver, the only woman member of the new state moving-picture censorship board, has come to the conclusion one yard of film is long enough for any kiss, after several weeks spent here in passing on thousands of yards of love-drama films. Love scenes and historic romances, thrilling escapes and runaways, harrowing deathbed repentances and will shapements, the excess of poverty and the extreme of wealth all pass in review before her. She judges each film from the viewpoint of adolescence.

Will it harm the child? What effect will it have on the grown boy or girl? These are the questions Mrs. Niver asks herself.

She has sat through yards and yards of kisses of every variety, and her ultimatum, after watching an embrace which occupied five yards of film, was that four yards should be eliminated and that the young couple should be torn from each other after thirty-six seconds of osculation.

### Social Workers Meet

BOULDER, Colo., June 29.—The fundamental principles and practical application of social welfare problems will be discussed in detail during the second annual Colorado Conference of Social, Educational and Religious Workers, which began here under the auspices of the University of Colorado. Three sessions will be held daily until Saturday afternoon. Some of the most prominent sociologists and workers in the west are on the program. These include President Livingston Ferrand, of Colorado University; Dr. James H. Baker, president emeritus; Dr. Charles Henderson, University of Chicago; Dr. Leonard Ayres, director of the division of education, Russell Sage Foundation; Thos. J. Tynan, warden of the Colorado state penitentiary; Prof. Percy Davidson, Leland Stanford University; Mrs. Mary C. C. Bradford, Colorado superintendent of education. The women's clubs of the state will have an entire day of the program to discuss from their point of view problems connected with dependents, defectives and delinquents.

### Big Sum For New Churches

NEW YORK, June 29.—Reports now nearly complete indicate that there will go into new churches and other buildings intended to advance the Christian cause in America between \$35,000,000 and \$40,000,000 this summer and fall. This is \$5,000,000 above the normal, indicating that causes affecting business in general and lessening the gifts to missions and charities do not prevail against the carrying forward of new projects.

The largest outlays are in New York and new England, in California because of new structures going up for use at the Panama exposition, and in the southwest. The middle west has been building churches in considerable numbers for the last ten years, but this year has slackened up to some extent.

The American people put in Christian work of all forms \$400,000,000 a year. This amount increases steadily, having nearly doubled in fifteen years. Of the total \$45,000,000 goes to so-called home missions, a broad term; \$25,000,000 into new structures and enrichments; \$15,000,000 into foreign missions and the balance into maintenance.

### SUSPECT JAPAN OF MEDDLING IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, June 30.—That President Yuan Shi Kai suspects Japan of stirring up anti-government feeling in China, was asserted in news dispatches received here from Peking. It has been the general belief for some time, both in Shanghai and the capital, the Tokio government thinks China safer neighbor under a weaker ruler and will do all it can to prevent a strong man like Yuan from establishing himself securely.

For commercial reasons, good judges of the situation here said, the Japanese, undoubtedly, would like to see peace reign in China, but they do not want it under an administration powerful and independent enough to defy Japan's wishes, if it saw fit.

### Headhunters Give Fight

TAIHOKE, Formosa, June 30.—Lieutenant-General Count Sakuma, governor-general of Formosa, has been seriously injured in the campaign he is prosecuting against the headhunters.

A vigorous military campaign against the 20,000 head-hunters of Formosa who refused to submit to the domination of Japan, has been waging for a year.

The Taruco tribesmen originally came from the Malay peninsula and are the oldest known inhabitants of Formosa.

They wear scarcely any clothing and live in bamboo huts on the heights of almost inaccessible mountains.

It was especially in reference to the "common cold" that Dr. Quigley mentioned pigs. He declared that the "common cold" was the worst ailment of the human race and that not a small part of the affliction was attributable to the family cat and dog, which boys, girls and grownups fondle.

### MELLEN IS INDICTED; 17 OTHERS ARE ALSO

CHARGES MADE IN CONNECTION WITH FINANCES OF RAILROAD LINE.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 30.—Eighteen persons, including Charles S. Mellen, former president of the New York, New Haven & Hartford and the Boston & Maine Railroad Company; Frederick C. Moseley, of F. S. Moseley & Co., Boston brokers; the late Ralph D. Gillett, of Westfield, and the investment committees of two savings banks of this city, were indicted yesterday by the Middlesex county grand jury on various charges in connection with the finances of the Hampden Railroad from Bondville to Springfield. Mr. Gillett was president of the Hampden corporation.

The road was built a year ago as a link to connect the Central Massachusetts division of the Boston & Maine with the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad, but has never been operated, an attempt to obtain the legislature's consent to its lease to the Boston & Maine having failed.

The indictments against Mellen, Moseley and Gillett allege conspiracy to induce the investment committee of the two banks to lend a total of \$45,000 to the corporation. The notes securing the loans were endorsed by the Hampden Investment Company, organized by Mr. Gillett to finance the construction of the road, which cost about \$4,000,000.

The investment committee of the East Cambridge Savings Bank is indicted on three counts of conspiracy to lend sums of \$20,000, \$10,000 and \$5,000 to the Hampden railroad. These indictments charge that the Hampden Investment Company was not a substantial surety or indorser of the notes of the railroad corporation given to the bank.

Similar indictments against the investment committee of the Cambridge Savings Bank, the amounts named being \$25,000, \$25,000, \$22,500 and \$20,250. Frederick S. Moseley was indicted also on six counts, involving the alleged larceny of sums amounting to \$112,500 from the banks, and Mr. Mellen was indicted as an accessory before the fact on five of these counts.

### WAYS OF CONTROLLING BOTHERSOME CHICKWEED

OREGON AGRICULTURAL VOL-  
LEGE, Corvallis, Ore., June 29.—Clean cultivation on cultivated areas is recommended by the Agronomy department of the Agricultural College as being one of the best means of getting rid of the troublesome little chickweed. This weed pest loves gardens and dooryards and has the habit of flowering at all seasons of the year except in frosty weather. The seed coat is heavy enough to carry the seed safely from one season to another, so that one hardly knows when he has eradicated the weed.

If the last cultivation of the season is rather shallow, so that ungerminated seeds are not brought near enough the surface to germinate the plant can be gradually exterminated.

In sowed crops the chickweed will probably be pretty well starved and if the stubble is disked after harvest the number of weeds will be greatly reduced. On land thickly sown to clover and grasses the chickweed is often starved out. Since it is a lover of water, drainage will help check its growth.

On lawns, where cultivation cannot be practiced, the best means of eradication is spraying with a solution of iron sulphate spray, mixed in the ratio of one pound of iron sulphate to slightly over a half gallon of water. It is advisable to apply the first spray as soon as the chickweed appears and make from one to four succeeding applications.

### Crows Flew Stylish Visitor.

MARINET, Wis., June 29.—Crows on the farm of Henry Smithson near here fled in shame from his cornfields according to his statement, when he substituted up to date feminine apparel for the usual garb of his scarecrow. After a visit to Marinet, Smithson clothed the scarecrow in diaphanous skirts. The crows at once fled.
