### Home Hints and Recipes

**To mend glass:** Mix a cupful each of milk and vinegar, then separate the curd from the whey. Mix the whey with the whites of five eggs, beating the whole thoroughly together. When it is well mixed stir in quicklime until it is of the consistency of thick paste. Apply to pieces of broken glass. It dries quickly and resists the action of water and heat. Let the repaired article remain for a few days before using it.

**For the Sink:** Every morning pour into the sink a boiling hot lye solution, then rinse with clear hot water. Lye is unexcelled for this because it actually removes all grease and filth from the pipes as well as acting as a deodorizer. A sink cared for in this manner will never be "stopped up" or have a disagreeable odor.

**Ribbon Holders:** To keep children's hair ribbons from musing cut a piece of cardboard six inches long and four inches wide. Roll the ribbons on this every night after removing them from the hair. This will save frequent pressing.

**Auditorium to Be Finished.**  
OAKLAND, Cal., July 1.—The first contracts have been let out of the \$500,000 voted for the completion of Oakland's \$1,000,000 municipal auditorium, and it is evident now that the big building will be ready for occupancy soon after the start of 1915. The contracts were for the granite-work, on a bid of \$11,857 and the terra cotta work, for \$23,900. Both contracts went to Oakland firms.

**Women Convict Woman.**  
CHRISTOPHER, Ill., June 30.—Stella Johannes was arraigned before Magistrate M. S. Purlow on a charge of illegal sale of liquor and was found guilty by a jury on which were five women.

A fine of \$200 was imposed and up on the failure of the woman to pay she was taken to jail, where she will care for her infant while she serves her sentence.

**Duke Is Sued for \$8,000,000.**  
NEW YORK, July 1.—James B. Duke, the tobacco magnate, was sued to compel him to keep an alleged agreement to put \$8,000,000 into a fertilizer company.

**Airman to Fly 300 Miles.**  
LONDON, June 30.—Lieutenant Gran, the Norwegian who was a member of the supporting party which followed Captain Scott's Antarctic expedition and found the bodies of Scott and his companions, expects to attempt to fly a Bleriot monoplane from Scotland to Norway.

Lieutenant Gran intends to start at Peterhead and cross the North Sea to Stavanger. He may fly at night, when frequently the wind is lighter in that latitude than in the day. The darkness is, of course, of shorter duration in mid-summer than at other seasons. He will take sufficient gasolines for a voyage of seven hours.

Peterhead is the easternmost point of northern Scotland. Stavanger is almost the westernmost point of Norway and is about 78 miles north of the southern extremity of the peninsula. The distance between the two towns is slightly more than 300 miles.

**Ex-Congressman's Barn Burns.**  
DUFUR, Ore., July 1.—A large new barn on the ranch of ex-Congressman Malcolm A. Moody, near the Deschutes river was completely destroyed by fire. The cause is unknown. The barn contained 40 tons of hay. The loss is estimated at \$2000 and is covered by insurance.

**Woman Saves Three Men.**  
NEW YORK, July 1.—Mrs. James Burns, of No. 81 Buena Vista avenue, Yonkers, gave the alarm which saved the lives of three men when she saw their canoe upset in the Hudson, half a mile offshore.

A motorboat put out and rescued John Manning, of No. 224 Riverdale avenue. He was trying to swim to shore and had covered about one-half the distance, but was almost exhausted. William Meehan, of No. 17 Downing street, and John White, of No. 229 Riverdale avenue, clung to the upturned craft.

The Georgianna, a new Columbia river steamer, has been launched at the Supple shipyard, Portland.

STAMFORD, Conn., July 1.—Leonard Blondell, wealthy father of Mrs. Helen M. Angle, who has been released on \$5000 bail, furnished by her father, in connection with the death of Waldo R. Ballou, rich manufacturer and politician, declares he is preparing to spend every cent of his fortune to prove his daughter's innocence. "The idea of connecting her name with this case is preposterous," he said, after having visited Mrs. Angle in her cell before she had been released on bail.

An energetic search is being made for a young man, an admirer of Mrs. Angle, in the belief that he knows of facts directly connected with her aged wooer. The man sought is said to be one of a pugilistic disposition and one who would quickly resent the attempt of a rival to install himself in the affections of the prepossessing widow.

Another mysterious young man was said to be prominent in Stamford, was located, and he will be an important witness at the inquest. He is said to have accompanied Mrs. Angle, Ballou and another woman in the automobile party the afternoon preceding Ballou's death. It is understood he will tell of a quarrel in the automobile which caused Ballou to begin drinking.
