WALLA WALLA TAKES OPENER FROM BUCKS

LODELL'S STARS FAIL TO SCORE IN CLOSELY CONTESTED GAME.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 1.—(Special)—Walla Walla beat Pendleton in regular story-book style yesterday in the opening game of the series, the score being 1 to a cipher. That one lone run came in the last half of the ninth frame with two down. Chief Osborne evened two strikes on the batter when Wallace drove a dust scorcher through Naughton and got life. Remmer produced a hit and Patterson, choked the bases by getting his head in front of a pitched ball. Lundstrum then came through with the hit that broke up one of the greatest games of the season.

Patterson, the new California acquisition, did the pitching for the Bears and he made his debut here in a way much to the liking of the local fans. Only four safe blows could the hard-hitting Bucks get off him and his teammates gave him errorless support.

Osborne and several times pulled himself out of seemingly impossible holes. He established a new local strikeout record for the season by whiffing 14 of the Bear batters. Cotton Harmon fanned every time he faced the chief.

Cherries are in Season

The cherry is one of the few fruits that are improved by cooking, and of all the desserts that can be made with them, none is more delicious than this pudding. Turn from the dish to have the cherries upmost. Serve with hard sauce or with a cup of stoned cherries, cooked tender in a cup each of sugar and water.

JOHNS CAPTURES TENNIS TOURNAMENT AND THE CUP

CHAMPIONSHIP OF CITY IS WON AFTER SOME EXCITING CONTESTS.

James S. Johns, erstwhile star track athlete of the University of Oregon, yesterday won new athletic laurels when he captured the city championship in the first tennis tournament ever held here. He won the finals during the afternoon from Frank R. Atkins by taking three straight sets, 9-7, 6-1 and 6-3.

The tournament began last Friday and by the process of elimination the contest was narrowed down to Johns and Atkins. Previous to their match, Johns had defeated in turn R. E. Chloupek, W. C. McKinney and C. E. Nelson, while Atkins had won from C. O. Rhinehart, Poland Oliver and James Bowler. There was a great deal of interest in the final match and the odds were in favor of Atkins. Johns' style of playing proved too much for him, however. Atkins is a quick, nervous player, inclined to press the play as hard as possible. Johns is deliberate, taking plenty of time in serving and between serves and his refusal to hurry soon told upon the other. The first set was a hard fought one, but when Johns finally won the marginal two games, the other two sets were easy for him. As winner of the tournament, Johns secures possession of the handsome silver cup presented by Royal M. Sawtelle.

At the conclusion of the singles tournament, a doubles tournament was started last evening. Brooke Dickson and Irwin Brooks defeated Marsh and Woodward. Brooks, who has spent the past few summers here, was captain of the University of Oregon tennis team that won the northwest championship this season and is a phenomenal player. Dickson makes a worthy teammate and they are the favorites in the tournament.

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Jewish Leaders in Session

DETROIT, Mich., June 30.—Leaders of the Jewish faith in America assembled in Detroit to attend a nine day conference of the Central Branch of the American Rabbis. The meeting is in commemoration of a quarter century of organization. Questions of great importance to ministers and laity of the Jewish faith are to be discussed during the conference. Recent progress in religious education, the divorce laws, a comparison of religious and civil marriages, use of the Bible as a text book in the religious schools and relations between the synagogue and its members are among the subjects to be considered. Formal opening of the conference will occur in the Temple Beth El, when Rabbi Leo M. Franklin, pastor will give the address of welcome. Rabbi Moses J. Gries, of Cleveland, president of the conference, will then deliver his annual message.

Penny Sportsmen Meet

PITTSBURG, June 30.—Canoe racing, revolver and rifle shooting, power-boat races, fly and bait casting and a number of other sports were on the card of the United Sportsmen of Pennsylvania, who convened here

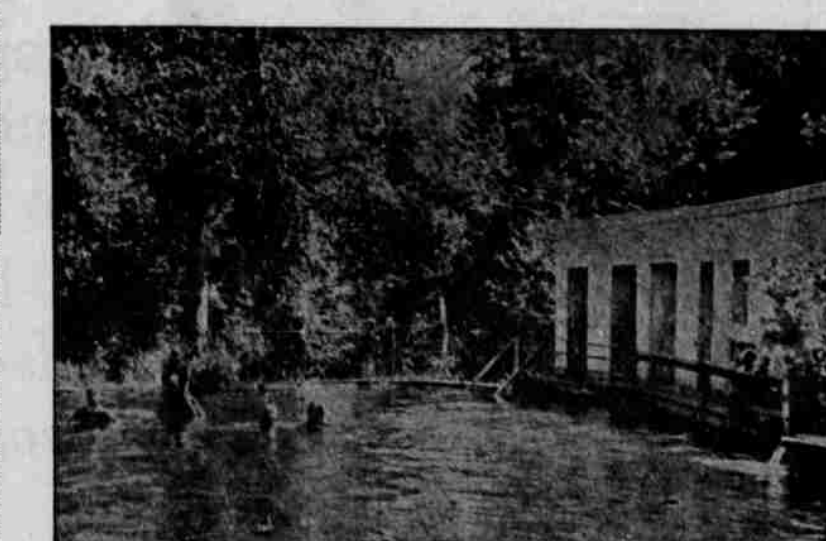
