NEWS OF FARM AND RANGE

FARMERS UNION BUYS WAREHOUSE

PRICE OF \$5000 PAID FOR STORAGE BUILDING ON EAST WEBB STREET.

Warehouse Will Be Used for General Warehouse Purposes Under Auspices Cooperative Organization—Connects With Two Roads.

For the sum of \$5000 the Farmers' Union has purchased from the First National Bank the interior warehouse, located on East Webb street and which has connection with both the Northern Pacific and the O.-W. R. & N. tracks. The warehouse will be used by the union under the management of the Farmers' Union Grain Agency and will be for general warehouse purposes. It will be open for business from any farmer irrespective of whether the patron is or is not a member of the union.

At the present time the warehouse is being used by the Pendleton Roller mills and the mill has had the use of the structure for some years past. However, the lease is now expiring and the sale has resulted. The Farmers' Union has been anxious to secure the warehouse for several years. Until now they have been without warehouse facilities here.

Unfair to Beef Raisers—Eastern Oregon cattlemen have learned of tactics on the part of the packing interests in Portland which they resent as unfair and injurious to the beef growing business in this state. It is said several of the Portland commission houses have been maintaining representatives in California for the purpose of urging California growers to send their beef to the Portland market. Not only that but it is said in a number of instances California grass cattle have been purchased at higher prices than are paid for Oregon beef, the plan being to use the southern beef to break down prices in this state. In view of the fact most of the eastern Oregon feeders make no money this year this move by the packers does not take well.

Hermiston Creamery—During the first four months of this year the creamery at Hermiston purchased

from project settlers an average of about 5000 pounds of butter fat a month. The price paid during the first three months averaged 20 cents

per pound and the price was 25 cents during April. The lowest sum paid for fat was \$121.50 during February and the highest amount \$1692 for March. These figures are given in the reclamation record for June.

Sold Beef Cattle—W. H. Guilford has sold four cars of beef in Portland for delivery at Seattle. He received a price of \$7.40.

Henry Blackwell Here—Henry Blackwell, prominent cattle dealer,

has been here today. He is en route to the John Day cattle country where his son is buying some stock.

U. S. Express Company Quits. BALTIMORE, July 1.—Beginning today, the Wells Fargo Express company took over all the express traffic handled formerly by the United States Express company on all Baltimore & Ohio lines. Parcel Post expansion was given as a reason why the U. S. Express company retired.
