RESTRAINT OF TRADE ALLEGED IN SUIT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Charges that the grocers and merchants association of Portland and its officers have been active in restraining the operations of the Hamilton corporation, a merchandise premium concern in violation of the government anti-trust laws, are made in a suit filed by the latter company in the federal court for damages of \$75,000. The complaint alleges an attempt has been made by the local merchants association and the Oregon retail merchants association, which is a subsidiary, to prevent the Hamilton corporation from operating in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Water rates have been raised about ten per cent at North Bend and Marshfield after investigation by the railroad commission.

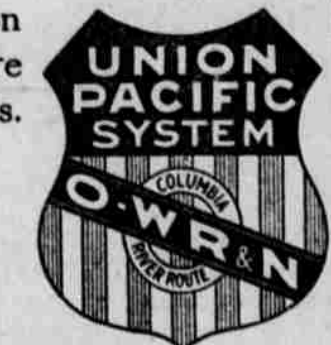

CHICAGO WHEAT HOLDS PORTLAND IS INACTIVE

CHICAGO, July 1.—The wheat market here opened yesterday lower than Monday, but developed strength and closed 7-8c higher than at opening for July. About similar strength was shown in September and December.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—The wheat growers in the Pacific northwest are keenly watching the fluctuations in wheat quotations, but are not eager to unload for the present, and hence there is little or no business transacted in wheat for the present. Exporters, too, are apparently waiting to see what time will develop and on account of the lack of seeming interest in Europe are not in a great hurry to take hold. New crop club is quoted here at 77 cents.

Snow reported the outlook for winter wheat at 93.1, the estimate being 657,000,000 bushels; spring wheat the report places at 93.2, with an indicated crop of 279,000,000 bushels. On corn the report shows: Acreage, 104,320,000; condition, 87.9; indicated crop, 2,925,000,000 bushels. On oats, the report shows: Condition, 82.3; indicated crop, 1,132,000 bushels.

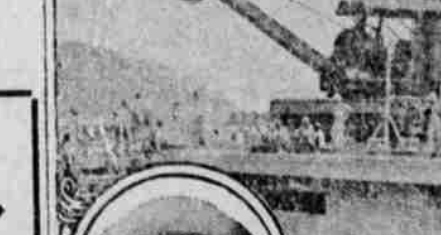
Judge Gives Boy Prisoner \$1.
CHICAGO, June 30.—Charles Burch, 18 years old, of Houston, Tex., is skeptical of matrimonial bliss. His ideas expressed in the Boys' court caused Judge Scully to give him \$1 and his liberty so he might find employment. The youth was arrested for trespassing on railroad property after riding on freight trains from Houston to Chicago.

"Any man who gets married is a fool; there is something loose in his head," young Burch asserted in court. "If my chum hadn't got married I wouldn't be here now."

"Why, I'm married, my bailiff is married and so is the state's attorney, and we're happy," commented the judge.

Adamson Bill Considered.
WASHINGTON, June 30.—The house considered the Adamson general dam bill, which provides that dam sites everywhere may be leased for 50 years, after which the government will be given the right to purchase and operate them. It is understood Secretary Garrison favors the bill.



CUT OFF SON BECAUSE DAUGHTER CANT VOTE

LONDON, June 30.—The newest specimen of suffragette tactics is revealed in the announcement of Mrs. Margaret Stockman of Hampstead, London, that she has altered her will disinheriting her son in favor of her daughter pending the granting of votes for women. She says that other women are taking the same step.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—President Wilson and members of the cabinet, diplomats and several members of the federal supreme bench attended the funeral of the late Dr. Pedro Rojas, Venezuelan minister, who died at Atlantic City recently. A military escort and the United States Marine band accompanied the body to the church where a solemn high mass was celebrated. After the services the body was taken aboard the Dolphin at the Washington Navy Yard and will be taken to Hampton Roads where it will be transferred to the battleship Kansas and taken to La Guayra.
