NEBRASKAN HAS LIVED IN THREE CENTURIES

WESTERVILLE, Nebraska, July 2.—Thomas Morris, who this month is one hundred and twenty years and six months of age, is believed by some of his friends to be the oldest man in the United States. He is the only man in Nebraska at least, who has lived in three centuries. He was born in the eighteenth century, saw all the nineteenth and now has a pretty good start into the twentieth. He was two years old when Washington's term as president closed. This fact connects him with the administration of every American president. Morris was one year old when the famous trial of Warren Hastings closed, and eleven years old when Admiral Nelson won his victory at Trafalgar. He lived during the periods of the Napoleonic wars, attaining his majority six months before the battle of Waterloo. He was seven years old when Ireland and England were united and has lived during the reigns of King George III, George IV., William IV., Queen Victoria, King Edward VII and the present King, George V. He was past three score and ten when Abraham Lincoln was assassinated. Thomas Morris was born January 15, 1794, at Bellew, Montgomery, Wales. His father was a common laborer. As a lad Thomas was apprenticed to a shoemaker, which work he continued until recently. In 1871 when he was seventy-seven years of age, he came to the United States. He is a bachelor and has been for years a confirmed woman-hater. He walks with the aid of a stick and wears spectacles, the first pair of which he purchased after celebrating his one hundredth birthday.

PSYCHOLOGY OF THE HAPPY ENDING

(Atlantic Monthly)

The human heart has an unlimited appetite for tales with triumphantly happy endings. Not in cheap melodrama alone are thwarted villainy and rewarded virtue beloved. I sometimes please myself by fancying that this taste, like most of our deep, unreasoned preferences, may be both a forecast and the means of its own fulfillment. Certain schools of new thought claim, I believe, that the universal mind of our long belief is a subconscious mind, compelled by the law of its being to respond to human suggestions almost as unerringly as our own submerged seelys may respond. While this notion strikes us old-fashioned folk as distinctly impious, a kind of magic and dabble in rashly. It yet has the fascination of suggesting to audacious wits a plausible method of remodeling this sorry scheme of things closer to the heart's desire. Perhaps we all would be glad to believe that novelists, by setting Providence a frequent-

ly repeated example of stories with happy endings, were really doing something toward making this world a place where such endings are the rule.

WEST VIRGINIA LAW AGAINST LIQUOR IS RIGID

WHEELING, W. Va., July 1.—West Virginia awoke a dry state for the first time in history. By virtue of the 90,000 majority for prohibition two years ago the legal sale of liquor ceased. Brewery, distillery and saloon property valued at approximately \$60,000,000 is worthless. Twenty-five thousand persons are seeking other employment.

stringent legislation against those who seek to sell intoxicants became effective today with the new order. To give away liquor or sell it means a jail sentence and fine for the first offense. Jail sentences a not to exceed five years are provided for a second offense. Patent medicines to the extent of half those now sold throughout the United States are barred from sale in this state. All preparations containing more than one half percent of alcohol are classed as intoxicants. Advertisements of liquors are barred from newspapers. It is unlawful to distribute advertising pertaining to intoxicants of any character. Saloonists, distillers and brewers who allowed liquor to remain in their establishments today were in violation of the law. State officials are conducting a search of all such places with orders to make arrests and confiscate the goods, if violations are found.

SEEING IT THROUGH.

It was perfectly natural that many republicans should ascribe the Clafin failure to democratic policies. For 40 years government and business have been stumbling along in a drunken embrace, sometimes prosperous but for protected periods depressed and suffering.

The Clafin collapse had its origin in commercial methods and financial ideas which lie at the very root of discredited republican policies. It bears the bitter fruitage of Hannibal and Morganism combined.

He knew of the Clafin failure when he spoke. With that in mind, he nevertheless adhered to his faith that, once separated from the Morgan and Hanna theory that affluence can be bought from political parties or manufactured by lithographing establishments, the American people will experience a prosperity such as they have never known before.

He is right. His prophecy has been reasoned out. There is no doubt of the accuracy of his diagnosis. The only question is whether the American people have the stamina to adhere to doctrines that they believe, or have believed, to be essential to the political, commercial and social health of the republic. There's the rub.

On that point, Mr. Wilson has no doubts. Those who in good conscience have followed him thus far can hardly fail him now.—St. Louis Post Dispatch.

Prefers to Die in Old Garb.

HARRISBURG, Pa., July 2.—Paschal Hall, colored, who was hanged here for a murder committed in a brawl at Steelton, Pa., a year ago, refused to wear a new black suit provided for his execution. He said that he would go to his death in his old suit as the trouble with people nowadays is that "they are too proud."

Hall refused to sing hymns with the minister who attended him but started the prison by singing "Casey Jones." The execution was witnessed by a jury of twelve colored men and the minister and physicians in attendance were colored men.

DREADED BOARD CALLS ON MANY TO RETIRE

FIFTEEN NAVAL OFFICERS END ACTIVE CAREERS IN U. S. SERVICE.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Fifteen naval officers, several of them captains with distinguished records, ended their active careers yesterday, on the recommendation of the dreaded "plucking board." Secretary Daniels made public the names of those selected for compulsory retirement this year, with a formal announcement of the law of 1899 under which the annual "plucking" is done.

In addition to the list of those who retired, several other officers had asked for voluntary retirement and had all the applications been accepted, the board would have been relieved of the necessity of "plucking."

Last year, however, the president decided not to permit the voluntary retirement of any officer who has not had 20 years service after graduation from the naval academy. The law requires the creation of 40 vacancies annually, with 15 compulsory retirements if necessary.

Included in the list of "plucked" this year are the names of some officers who have been so prominent in naval circles as to cause great surprise among their colleagues at their retirement.

Captain Gibbons has been superintendent of the naval academy and naval attaché to the American embassy in London, assignments given to officers of the highest professional ability. Captain Hill is one of the younger school of officers who became prominent through his outspoken criticisms of defects in the employment of armor on the older battleships which led to radical changes in the designs.
