Ranges Will Be Leased

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 4.—Five-year leases on more than 46,000 acres of land in Klickitat, Yakima and Asotin counties will be sold this month by the state land office, under grazing applications, principally for sheepmen.

In the past, sheepmen, to a large extent, have been allowed to pasture their flocks free of charge, but notice was served on them this year that they must apply for leases. Lease sales are to be made at Goldendale, for Klickitat county, July 11, covering 23,000 acres; at Asotin, for Asotin county on the same date, covering 2600 acres, and at North Yakima for Yakima county, July 14, covering 16,000 acres.

Lane Woman "Freighter"

EUGENE, Ore., July 4.—Mrs. Charles Croner has the distinction of being the only woman "freighter" on the McKenzie river. She makes regular weekly trips over the 40 miles between Eugene and McKenzie bridge, hauling supplies for the summer resort, her load averaging 1600 pounds. She is an expert horsewoman, and is accompanied on her trips by a dog as her sole companion. This trip takes two days each way.

FOURTY-THREE FRANCHISE IS GRANTED SANTA FE

LINDSAY, July 4.—City officials have granted to the Minkler Southern (the Santa Fe Railroad) a fifty-year franchise for the use of certain city streets. The company has secured a suitable site for a railroad station and practically the entire right of way for the extension of the line from Exeter to this city has been secured. It is also announced that upon the completion of the line to this city work will be taken up to secure a right of way to Porterville, through the orange district. Some preliminary work on the Porterville extension has already been done.

Food Rushed to Fire Victims.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The promptness with which the government is prepared to respond to emergency calls for food supplies is shown by a report to the navy department from Capt. Colman, commander of the Boston navy yard, on the distribution of provisions to citizens of the fire-stricken city of Salem, Mass.

Within two hours after Gov. Walsh at 9 o'clock in the morning had requested Capt. Coffman for food supplies, 2,000 pounds of loaf bread had been distributed and 7,000 pounds more were supplied later in the day. In addition, eleven tons of provisions were furnished.

These issues were made under authority given the commandant and Gov. Walsh expressed his appreciation of the promptness and value of the services rendered by the navy.

WOMEN URGES PASTOR TO GIVE UP BASEBALL

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., July 4.—Insisting that the Rev. Clinton D. Drum, rector of the Episcopal church at Fishkill, cannot consistently manage the village baseball team and preach the gospel, the members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of that village are circulating a petition calling upon the rector to give up one or the other. The fight is made against the clergyman because his team sometimes plays on Sunday, although he never goes to the games.

PASTORS DENOUNCE WILD WEST SHOW

FRESNO, July 4.—The Fresno Ministerial Union took a strong stand in support of the attack by the Fresno Humane Society on the proposed "bulldogging" at a wild west show to be given at a recreation park this city.

Resolutions were passed denouncing as cruel the sport of throwing bulls by the horns, such as is advertised to be given.

The movement against the sport was started by President William Harvey of the humane society, who declares that he will arrest all who take part in the exhibition.
