

TUTUILLA MEETING IS BROUGHT TO CLOSE

ENCAMPMENT PROVES HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL—TEMPERANCE IS THE THEME

The encampment of the Tutuilla congregation closed with the service Sabbath evening. During the time of encampment special emphasis has been laid on temperance work and instruction to voters relative to the fall election. Incident to this Mr. R. P. Hutton, assistant superintendent of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, was with the camp and addressed the people several times. He was well received and left a good impression in the minds of the Indians. The Tutuilla congregation shared their feast with the Cayuse camp and on Sunday afternoon a large crowd of the Christian Indians accompanied Mr. Hutton to Cayuse where he addressed an audience of three hundred or more, both white visitors and Indians.

All were given a healthy welcome by Captain Shumkin, the head man of the Cayuse camp, and Captain Shumkin responded in a hearty welcome address saying: "I am fully in sympathy with what you have been telling us and I know the evils of temperance. It has destroyed many of our strong young men and children and unless it is stopped there will be nothing left of our people but the old women. But what I want to know and be assured of is that in case we are able to put the saloons out of business will it also be possible to shut up the drugstores? Unless we do this it seems to me a futile effort. I want to say to you, I join hands with you in this work and I expect to register and cast my vote in the fall against this, our enemy and destroyer."

Rev. E. F. Harper preached the sermon Sunday morning and assisted the mission, J. M. Cornelson, in the quarterly communion service. The interest was very good during the entire encampment and 148 partook of the Fourth of July dinner and later joined in many games.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4.—The high cost of living problem is being solved here to some extent by the people of Portland through the establishment of a municipal market in one of the principal streets of the city. Although opened but a month ago, the market has expanded until it now occupies two blocks. Fruits, vegetables, poultry, dairy foods, in fact everything produced on the farm is being sold by the producer direct to the consumer at prices that are competitive with the market. HOLD-UP MEN CONFESS TO TRAIN ROBBERY

(Continued from page one.)

About 9:30 he met the two men walking on the track just at Hilgard which is only 17 miles east of the scene of the robbery. He questioned them and asked if they knew Hugh Whitney. "He is my cousin," promptly admitted Stoner and it was this admission that decided the officer to hold them. He did not search them then but upon reaching La Grande found \$355 cash on them. This was another suspicious circumstance and notification was sent to Sheriff Taylor, who, with Chief Agent Wood, was en route to Kamela to run down another crew. They wired back to hold the men until their arrival.

The two officers reached La Grande about 5:40 a. m. and went directly to the county jail. The La Grande officers had failed to shake the prisoners in their story that they knew nothing of the hold-up and admitted afterwards that they would probably have released them later. After comparing them with the descriptions received from the railroad men, both Taylor and Wood were convinced they were the robbers and commenced to "work" upon them.

Stoner, the more youthful, was selected first and steadfastly denied any connection with the robbery. The officers talked to him quietly, assuring them that if they would be better for him to make a frank confession. "You boys don't look to me like you are old hands at this business and it will be better for you to make a clean breast of it," Taylor told him and after a good deal of persuasion, Stoner admitted his identity and told the full story.

Meadors was then taken off by himself and questioned. He was even more stubborn than his companion. He admitted knowing Manning but held fast to his story that he and Stoner had no connection with the crime.

"Have you and Stoner been together for the past week?" he was asked. "Yes," was the answer. "Would it have been possible for him to have taken part in the robbery without your knowing it?" Taylor queried.

"No," he replied. "Then if he says you and he went with Manning, what about it?" "He wouldn't make such a crazy statement," was the reply. Stoner was then brought in, somewhat reluctantly, and when Meadors saw that it was true his pal had confessed, he backed up at once.

"If that's the way of it," he said, "I give up. I'll tell you anything you want to know."

Search for Booty. After that it was not difficult to get the full story and their promise to take the officers to where they had cached their plunder. Securing a special train, the four men were conveyed to the point where Deputy Ratchler had arrested the men. There they recovered the big diamond ring stolen from H. B. Royce of Walla Walla, and two other rings, one set with opals and the other with an emerald. Meadors had had them tied together in a back pocket when picked up but, pleading that he wanted a drink, was permitted to stoop over the water. Undetected he lifted up a rock in the bed of the stream and deposited the tell-tale rings under it. This was in Five Point creek. Another smaller diamond ring was found along the track where Meadors had thrown it as Ratchler ordered them to step aboard the callous of a passenger freight.

Having secured this much of the booty, the train went on to Meacham and while Chief Agent Wood kept Meadors at the station, Stoner plotted Sheriff Taylor over the hills to the other caches. One was located on one of the north prongs of McKay creek under a bank. In it were the express orders. At milepost 256, a short distance from Hilgard siding, the other express packages, two red, one a 45 automatic and the other a 38 Smith & Wesson Special, and cartridge belts were found. Stoner told Taylor a 25-30 rifle was hidden in another cache five miles away but they did not go after it. This rifle, they said, belonged to Manning.

Crowd Stampedes. With their visitors and all of the stolen booty, the two officers came down the mountain to Pendleton in the special train, arriving here at 7:30. Fully 2000 people had been waiting at the depot all afternoon, eager for a glimpse of the bandits. When the three sections of No. 17 arrived, men, women and children stampeded to the rear end only to be disappointed.

The officers put their men in a taxicab at once and they were surrounded by such a mass of humanity that it could hardly proceed. All the way to the court house, the mob raced alongside and the doors of the sheriff's office had to be locked to keep out the throng.

Neither of the youthful robbers appeared in the least excited but laughed and joked about the crowd that had drawn. As they were placed in the jail they turned and thanked the officers for the courtesy with which they had been treated. Throughout the trip neither had been handcuffed.

Sheriff Taylor and Chief Agent Wood express their implicit confidence in the stories told by the young fellows to the effect that they had never before been implicated in any crime and were only influenced to take a hand in the robbery by Manning.

Check Identifies Manning. Even though the two men had succeeded in escaping capture for the time being, the officers believe they would have picked them up in a short time. They had practically assured themselves that the dead bandit was not Hugh Whitney but was Charles Manning. On his body had been found a check for \$150 made payable to "Charles Manning" and bearing the signature of P. E. Woods. It was upon the Utah State National Bank and stamped across its face was the words "Payment stopped."

Saturday through the bank and through the assistance of Chief Agent Joseph Jones of the Oregon Short Line, they had learned that the check had been cashed in the saloon of Boomer & Fuller of Cokeville. It bore their endorsement across the back. They had presented it for payment, had learned that it had been stopped and had returned the check to Manning.

They had also heard from Dr. Maders of Cokeville to the effect that he had made out the prescription found on the dead body. In copying the prescription, the Baker druggist had written the physician's name "Nadeau." Stoffer had also been communicated with. Had they not found the two fugitives within a few days the two officers intended going direct to Cokeville to begin their search.

Taylor and Wood worked almost without sleep or food from Thursday night until last night and their long tramps through the mountains and other hardships, together with the nervous strain have almost exhausted them. The success of their efforts, however, makes them feel amply repaid.

For Monte Carlo at Panama. LONDON, Eng., July 4.—The "Casino National de Panama Company, Limited," with the early of Shrewsbury and Talbot as chairman, which plans to start a second Monte Carlo at Panama, gives in a prospectus an alluring description of the wonderful gambling and amusement resort it intends to launch.

The company is to acquire 250 acres of land and to operate under a charter "insuring absolute freedom from all interference for a period of twenty-five years," according to the prospectus of its prospectus, but no statement is made of what authority is to give the charter and to insure the freedom from interference. The casino is to include most of the attractions of Monte Carlo, a big hotel, an orchid garden which will be one of the wonders of the world, a bathing pavilion, pigeon shooting grounds, tennis courts, golf courses and the gambling hall.

Polas Bear Attacks Keeper. ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 4.—Crazed by the excessive heat of the last few days a polar bear in the Forest park zoo attacked and severely injured its keeper here. The injured man, Henry Zimmerman, 52 years old, is at his home with one foot manied and the other cut and badly bruised.

Zimmerman had climbed to the top of the big outdoor cage to give the bear his customary evening meal of meat. The bear threw aside the food held out by the keeper. With one lurch he reached Zimmerman, caught his right leg in his mouth and tried to make a meal of it.

The keeper yelled for help. A crowd of spectators stood by and heard the animal crunch the bones in the man's leg, but could lend him no aid. Women screamed and men ran for the other zoo attendants. The bear was finally driven off with long poles. Zimmerman was rushed to a dispensary where physicians said his wounds would not prove fatal unless blood poisoning sets in.

Bull at Large Perils Many. CHICAGO, July 4.—A realistic imitation of a bull fight was given near the loop with a snorting, charging, bellowing young bull and a bunch of overall clad toradors. The exhibition which alarmed pedestrians occurred in streets near the Dearborn street railroad station.

For more than an hour the bull charged about the streets, sending pedestrians scurrying in doorways and other places of refuge only to coax them out on the sidewalk a minute later to laugh at the efforts of express company employees to surround the rebellious beast. When the toradors crept up on the bull and its capture seemed certain, it would wheel about and dash away with a bellow of triumph.

The bull, named "Carranza" was finally captured at West 12th and South "Carment" streets. Athletes of the police department aided in the roundup. The animal had broken out a crate in a freight shed near the Dearborn street station. It was consigned to Soldier, Iowa.

"Opium Trust" Is Hinted. CHICAGO, July 4.—Special agents of the government in search of evidence against an alleged Chinese organization for the distribution of opium, blew open the safe of Lee Fun, a native-born Chinese, and found a draft for \$22,500 on a Hong Kong bank. The find is regarded as important in connection with what the agents term an "opium trust" in Chicago.

The rain on Fun's place was one of several made this week in the government's campaign against the traffic in opium. Four arrests were made and several hundred pounds of opium confiscated.
