Library News

NEW BOOKS.

Bowen—The Essence of Religion. "Non-sectarian, liberally orthodox addresses on the religious nature of man, spiritual life and faith in a divine personality."

Edwards—Our Common Road. "One hundred little essays having to do with homely, everyday topics and ordinary emotions. They are sometimes reflective, sometimes didactic, occasionally playful, always clever and sensible. They show the author has observed carefully and done much thinking below the surface."

Kinne—Foods and Household Management. "A good book, presupposing a knowledge of elementary cooking, and of value not only to classes in household arts and in high and normal schools, but also to the home maker. Under food it treats of the kitchen furnishings, food preparation in detail with about 150 tested recipes, cost and purchase of food, menus and dietaries; under household management, the budget, system in management, how to buy, cleaning and laundering."

Laughlin—The Work-a-day Girl. "Miss Laughlin has made a concrete appeal. Every chapter is the telling of the story of some girl who had to go into the world to make her living without sufficient preparation and to work for wages which cannot support her. The questions that the book arouses are many. Some have to do with a minimum wage legislation, others with the training of girls to be ready to earn a living wage—a problem that the public schools are apparently solving with the noticeable turning toward the teaching of trades in place of and in combination with the more purely academic studies."

Richardson—Eulogies. Every practical, suggestive chapters, especially for women whose awakened civic and social consciences have prepared them for effective doing."

Shackleton—Unvisited Places of Old Europe. "Mr. Shackleton has a positive genius for seeking out places never before visited by the ordinary traveler and for picking out picturesque bits of illustration. He finds such bits in the Forest of Arden, in Luxembourg, in Moreauet, over in Holland, among the Alps, in the Dolomites, in the streets of Naples and along the Brenta. To all those unfamiliar places he takes us, tells us their stories, shows us their pictures."
