Home Hints and Recipes

When Planning That New House You Will Build.

Plan first for an airy, sunny cellar. It is quite true that a high cellar, as it is usually treated, is an eyesore. But if the cellar foundation is faced with cement or shingles or brick or whatever the material of the house may be it is not out of harmony with the rest of the house, and does not have the stilted, ungainly look that a high cellar of different construction from the rest of the house gives. Remember that a dry sunny cellar means health.

Be careful to have all electric lights where they can be easily reached. In many houses the pantry light, for instance, is where it is hidden when the swinging door is fastened open.

Arrange the lights with a view to the bureau and chiffoniers and dressing tables or other pieces of furniture which boast mirrors. These must be placed so that the light shines to some extent on the face that looks into them.

Plan the bedrooms with an idea of the placing of the beds. Put the win-

dows where draughts directly across the beds can be avoided.

Have a door that closes easily and securely on the back stairs, either at the head or the foot, so that the odor of cooking in the kitchen will not penetrate throughout the house.

Plan to have the bedroom closets on the walls between the bedrooms which are to be occupied by persons easily disturbed. If the closets separate the bedrooms they serve to deaden noises. This arrangement occupies interior space, of course, when closets can be put in the eaves, but it insures quiet bedrooms.

Linen Waists Again.

The linen waist is here again. It has not yet returned with its time-honored accessory of high turn-over collar. It is now finished with a frill or flaring collar of some sort. The shirtwaist of colored linen for sports or country wear persists in spite of certain predictions that it would not do so.

Health and Beauty.

Nothing is quite so good for freckles as the humble horseradish. A fresh horseradish root should be grated very fine and then covered with fresh buttermilk. Let stand overnight. In the morning strain through a cheesecloth and wash the face night and morning with the resulting liquor.

The very first item in the training of the day old infant is the matter of regular and punctual feeding. Inexperienced mothers little realize the importance of this seeming trifle, both for their own comfort and for their baby's physical welfare. Once get a baby into the habit of taking it up and feeding it every time it happens to cry and you have indeed started trouble for yourself.

There is nothing like housework for physical culture. In the various actions performed by the different sets of muscles during the large number of movements incidental to housework there is an admirable system of gymnastics peculiarly adapted to the needs of women. A certain amount of exercise which arouses and interests the mental faculties, while occupying the activities of the bodily organs is necessary to health, and housework undoubtedly complies with both these conditions.

BIG STEAMER EQUIPPED WITH NEW STYLE ENGINES

OAKLAND, Cal., July 7.—The Kronprinz Gustav Adolf, a Swedish freighter, has sailed from Christiania for Oakland, with a general cargo of freight. The Adolf will be the second large vessel equipped with the Diesel motor to reach the Pacific coast, and both will have had Oakland harbor as their objective point. The other was the Danish vessel Slam, which reached here some months ago, and was visited while lying in Oakland harbor, by hundreds of steamship men, who inspected her new style engines, that it has been prophesied, will soon displace the present type.

Two small vessels have recently been completed in Oakland shipyards that have been equipped with the Diesel engines. These are the first boats of the kind to be built in the United States.

Girls in Canoe Save Two. SOUTH NORWALK, July 7.—Miss Elizabeth Stapleton, daughter of the Rev. John Stapleton, and Frederick Soder-Hueck, son of Mrs. Ada Soder-Hueck, a New York singer, had a narrow escape from drowning here when the canoe in which they were paddling capsized in the Sound.

Soder-Hueck abandoned the canoe and dived for his companion, who could not swim. When the couple came to the surface, the canoe had drifted beyond reach. Soder-Hueck became exhausted by his efforts to keep the girl above water, and both had gone down for the second time, when they were rescued by Miss Carrie McCausland and Miss Madeline McKibbin, who reached them in another canoe.

MAYOR'S ASSAILANT DIES OF HIS WOUNDS

BUTTE, Mont., July 7.—Though Eric Lantala, the Finnish miner who stabbed Mayor Lewis J. Duncan Friday, and was in turn shot by the city executive, died Sunday of his wound. It was not expected the authorities would take any action against Duncan. The case was considered one of plain self defense and it was taken for granted the coroner's jury would exonerate the mayor.

Duncan himself was improving rapidly from the effects of the three wounds inflicted on him by Lantala. The miner attacked him when he refused to deport a leading supporter of the Western Federation of Miners.

Wilson Pleads for Maid. TRENTON, N. J., July 7.—Through the personal efforts of President Wilson a woman who was employed in his Princeton home as a domestic ten years ago, will be released from the Mercer county jail, to which she was committed on a charge of habitual drunkenness.

Her predicament was discovered by a former Princeton schoolteacher, Miss Katherine Welsh, who wrote to the president. Governor Feller, of New Jersey, was asked by the president to investigate the case.

Cornell Honor Refused. EUGENE, Ore., July 7.—C. Roy Reed, an instructor at the university, will give up a fellowship at Cornell, through loyalty to his students, after he has won the honor in competition with the whole country. Electrical engineering at the university has been eliminated, but he considers it his duty to remain with the class until it has been graduated.

Eugene boys this year have won both of two science fellowships. That in physics was awarded recently to Peter Irving Wold, a Eugene boy now in China.

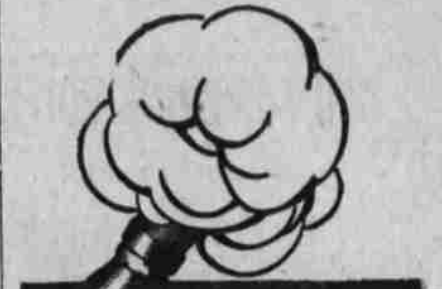
Bull Moose Held Pledge.

Oath Costs Damages.

EUGENE, Ore., July 7.—The fact that O. C. Stanwood, a farmer on Maple creek, near Glenada, on the Siuslaw in western Lane county, had sworn the value of his place less than he considered it worth prevented him from obtaining heavier damages from the railroad which sued for right of way across the farm.

The railway company had offered him \$500 for 1.7 acres. He sued for \$5000, but admitted on the witness stand that he had sworn to the assessor's valuation of his entire 160 acres at \$900. The jury allowed him \$700 for the acre and a fraction. He says that he considers his farm worth \$10,000 to him.

Water Wagon Is Costly.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Americans drank less whiskey during the last twelve months than they did the year before, but they consumed more beer and smoked a great many more cigarettes.

Reports to the internal revenue commissioner show that the receipts for the fiscal year just closed totaled \$564,665 less than for the previous year, and most of this decline was due to the falling off in tax collected on distilled spirits.

In the first eleven months of the fiscal year there was a decrease of \$3,784,857 in the income from distilled liquor. Receipts from tobacco taxes show an approximate increase over last year of \$1,500,000. This gain is due almost entirely to a phenomenal increase in the cigarette trade. The gain in receipts from fermented liquor, beer and ale, was about \$560,000.

Italian Voters Turbulent.

ROME, July 8.—Violence marked the elections for city and provincial councils which have been going on throughout Italy the last few days.

In the constituency where Prince Borghese was a candidate a serious riot took place in which one man was killed and another seriously injured.
