'Twas PENDLETON'S DAY TO LOSE ANYWAY

EXTRA INNING CONTEST GOES TO BAKER BY SCORE OF 5 TO 4.

Enclosed across the book of baseball fate yesterday was written "Pendleton shall not win today" and that accounts for the fact that King's Kubs of Baker emerged from an extra-inning contest with the thick end of a 5-4 score, despite the fact that they were gutted two to one. The baby Bruins from the mining town accomplished the feat, too, by pedaling up hill, for, in the early canting, the rough-riding Buckaroos had run up a lead of 4-0.

Credit for the 11-inning victory must go to Fulwider and he is entitled to wear a filmy halo over his sun-thatched dome. Going into the fray after Jonnie Washington had been pounded for four runs and with men on second and third with none down, the boy with the ruddy locks and facial contortions stuck over a brand of shutouts slants that won the admiration of everyone.

After the Kubs had bunched hits off Schroeder and tied the score, Chief Osborne was hurried in and though he allowed but one scratch hit and walked none in the four frames he presided to him is fastened the defeat.

That winning score in the eleventh was made without the assistance of a hit. Philip Lind, first up, was given life when Peterson threw wide to first. King moved him up with a sacrifice and Fuller's infield hit shoved him to third. With two down and Nadeau up, Lind made a wild dash for the plate. Osborne became a bit excited and, just as he did in one other game on a similar play, pitched wild to Pembroke.

Baker started Washington at the slab work and, after sailing smoothly for three innings, he got his bumps in the fourth. Jimmie Mensor started with a single, was moved up by Lodell's sacrifice and scored on Naughton's triple. Pembroke's single scored Naughton. Peterson walked and Briggs' scratch hit filled the bases. A single by Whit scored two, after which the side was retired.

The Bucks started right after Washington again in the fifth but, after both Mensor and Lodell had hit safely, King derrickd him for Fulwider, who got out of the hole and twirled beautifully until the end. Schroeder went along swimmingly until the fifth when French's near-homer for two bases and Togneri's real homer put two over. In the eighth, he walked the first man up. Fulwider hit safely and both scored on Lind's two base drive, tying the score. Osborne then went in. Lind reached third on a sacrifice but was caught at home on an attempted squeeze.

Pendleton had a chance in the ninth when, with two down, Naughton walked and stole second and third. Pembroke, however, fanned. Curly Coen opened the last of the eleventh

Harbor Bill Fight Is Up.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The administration trade commission bill, heading the anti-trust program, was laid aside temporarily in the senate for debate on the river and harbor appropriation bill. No senators were ready to discuss the trade commission measure, but Senator Reed will speak, attacking the constitutionality of the prohibition against "unfair competition."

Consideration of the river and harbor bill developed some of the strong opposition which has been slumbering in the senate. Throughout the day senator Burton continued to attack the measure in a detailed analysis of the various projects applied for. Senators Kenyon, Borah and Norris were ready to aid him in preventing an early vote on the measure.

Loop in Air Disastrous.

STIMUR, France, July 7.—Georges La Gagneux, one of the best known French aviators, was killed while attempting a double loop in the air. He had completed the second loop when the propeller broke as the aviator was finishing a glide on the wing, and the machine plunged into the river Loire.

WELSH WINS AGAINST RITCHIE IN DECISION

BOUT IS LIVELY, AMERICAN REALLY DOING MOST OF THE FIGHTING.

LONDON, July 8.—Fred Welsh, lightweight champion of England last night outboxed Willie Ritchie, the American champion, and on the referee's decision won the lightweight championship of the world.

The fight took place at Olympia and the 8000 spectators witnessed a fast and clever bout. Rapid footwork and a good deal of infighting were pronounced features.

The British victory was cheered to the echo, although there was some dissatisfaction among the American spectators at the decision, because neither man was beaten at the finish. Although Welsh scored the greater number of blows, those of the American, appeared to be the more telling.

Fitchie broke down when the decision was given against him and was in tears when he went to his dressing-room. He refused to talk then, but later, at his hotel, said:

"I do not intend to make a holler, but I do think the worst I should have gotten was a draw. Welsh was holding all the time and I was doing the fighting. Therefore, I think the decision was not fair to me."

Ritchie hurt his right hand in the bout, but otherwise was not much damaged, except for a few bruises on the face.

During the last four rounds Ritchie forced the fighting hard for a knockout, while Welsh was plainly playing to win a decision on points. The success of the affair is likely to kindle great interest in the coming contest between Gunboat Smith and Georges Carpentier, the French champion. A warm reception was accorded to Smith when introduced last night.

The offices of Father Boudier, in clerical garb, as announcer, was a novelty. The American contingent included many theatrical people. Among others were the members of the Harvard and Union boat crews.

Dividend Is 700 Per Cent.

UNIONTOWN, Pa., July 7.—In order to avoid subscribing for stock in the regional bank, under the new currency system, in excess of its own capital stock, the First National bank of Uniontown declared a dividend of 700 per cent. The capital of the bank is \$100,000 and its surplus before the dividend was \$1,650,000.

Under the law, national banks are compelled to invest 6 per cent of their capital and surplus in regional and reserve bank securities.

Family Found Murdered.

BLUE ISLAND, Ill., July 6.—The bodies of Jacob Mesliss, 60, and his wife, 52, and daughter, Mrs. Julia Mansfield and the latter's daughter, 2, were found in their beds at their home, heads split open. A blood-stained axe was found nearby. There were evidences of a terrific struggle.

Mrs. Mansfield was deserted by her husband two years ago. The authorities have telegraphed his description to nearby towns with a request for his arrest.

OFFICERS "PLUCKED" IN NAVY



Captain John H. Gibbons, WASHINGTON, July 8.—The navy "plucking board," which, by law, meets each year to select a certain number of officers for retirement, that the flow of promotion shall continue without check, reaped fifteen officers which will be immediately transferred from the active to the retired list.

To the amazement of the service the name of Captain John H. Gibbons, commanding the battleship Utah, is at the top of the list. "Jack" Gibbons is one of the best known officers of the navy. He was once naval attaché of the American embassy at London and later, for four years superintendent of the naval academy.

NINE YEARS WILL SEE STREAMS FULL OF TROUT

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Plans to completely restock all trout streams and lakes throughout the national forests of Colorado, Wyoming, and South Dakota, within a period of nine years, are well under way, as the result of the approval by the federal bureau of fisheries of a plan of operation prepared by the forest service. The bureau of fisheries has promised to furnish the necessary fish fry for distribution to the various forests, the shipments of fry to be directed to railroad stations nearest the waters to be stocked so that as many streams as possible may be supplied from a central point. The planting of all fry will be performed by forest officers who will keep close check on the results of the work.

Alleged Leper Discovered.

CLEVELAND, July 6.—Dr. William Corlett, a skin specialist, discovered Samuel Phrus, a Sicilian living in the Italian quarters suffering from leprosy in an advanced stage. The patient was sent to the city hospital where he is closely guarded. It is thought possible the health authorities will quarantine the entire Italian quarter.
