Resolved, That an assessment district is hereby created to be known as Assessment District No. 29, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Description of Local Improvement District No. 29.
Alta Street from the West line of Main Street to the West line of Chestnut Street to the South line of Alta Street to the North line of Webb Street.

Beginning at the S. W. corner of Lot 9, Elk 46, Reservation Addition to the town (now city) of Pendleton, Oregon; thence N. 23 deg. 36 min. W. along the center line of said Elk 46, 410 feet to a point which would be on a westerly projection of the north line of Alta Street, thence N. 66 deg. 24 min. E. along the said projection of the north line of Alta Street 160 feet to the S. W. corner of Lot 8, Elk 23, said Reservation Addition, thence N. 23 deg. 36 min. W. along the east line of Chestnut Street and along a northwesterly projection of said east line of Chestnut Street 175 feet; thence N. 66 deg. 24 min. E. parallel with and 175 feet northerly from the north line of Alta Street, and through the center of Lots 13 and 4 in Elk 26, 25, 24, 22, 21 and also through the center of Lots 11 and 4 in Elk 20, 19 and 18 respectively all in Arnold and Raley Addition to the town (now city) of
