such carriage is about eight times that. In other words, The government practically gives a tremendous subvention to second class mail.

When you post a letter, nearly half of what you pay goes to defray the cost of carrying newspapers and magazines. Why books were not included in the subvention is not explained. If it is justified in the case of newspapers and magazines, on the ground that in a democracy the government should thus encourage the diffusion of ideas among the people, why are books considered less important for this purpose? It certainly seems that our postal laws have discriminated against books. The present administration has improved the situation, as far as the nearer zones are concerned, by the inclusion of books in the parcels post. But for the more distant zones the rate is higher than before. Whenever the postal rate on books is higher than the cost of handling, the government is levying an unnecessary tax on ideas.

Our tariff on English books bears heavily on those who are least able to pay it—our scholars, our teachers, our scientific investigators. Elsewhere the most enlightened governments do everything in their power to encourage such men as national assets. Here our policy actually discourages them. An enlightened policy would put books in a class by themselves and on a plane above the ordinary commodities of the world. Instead of being taxed they should be privileged, not for the encouragement of an industry but for the education of the people.

Home Hints and Recipes

Progress in the Kitchen.

The fact that a thing has always been done in a certain way—the mere precedent—limits originality and hinders progress. For example: In a recent issue of the Survey the question why kitchen sinks have been made so low was discussed. No one seemed able to explain. Finally a certain maker discovered that the original sinks were made when the washing of dishes and other sink-work was done in wooden tubs with high sides. Such a tub when used in a high sink came up too far, so the sink was made low. Furthermore, as running water and fixed faucets had not long been made, the tub had to be lifted out of the sink, and the lower the sink the lighter the lift. Though improvements in faucets, dish-pans and other accessories of kitchen sinks have been made, no one has seemed to realize that the sink could be improved by raising. So women were—and are—compelled to endure discomfort when doing their ordinary household work. There may be a certain percentage of inconvenience to be reached before the human mind grasps the fact that something must be altered. The wise inventor says The Journal of the American Medical Association, attains a reputation for brilliancy by making his invention before the need becomes obvious to others.

Made From Bones.

Place turkey or chicken bones in stew pans; cover with cold water. Let boil until water has become a rich stock; add one quart of milk, few pieces of celery, one tablespoonful of butter, salt and pepper to taste. This makes an excellent white soup.—Los Angeles Express.

ART CONTROVERSY STARTS OVER PAINTING OF NUDE

NEW YORK, July 10.—That New York has to take second place to Pittsburgh as a center of art controversies is now the fear of many persons whose chief ambition for the city is that it shall be first in everything. Until recently, as a result of the now famous "September Morn" incident, this city has felt secure in its title in this particular field. Word from Pittsburgh, however, indicates that the feeling of security is not altogether justified. From the Smoky City come tidings of a controversy over a nude painting known as "La Paresse" by Lawton Parker, an American artist which, although it received a gold medal at the Paris Salon, barely escaped refusal by the director at the Pittsburgh exhibit after it had been accepted by an international jury. Although the Pittsburgh authorities reconsidered their decision and hung the picture at the last moment, the matter is by no means at an end and it is not beyond the range of possibilities that New York will yet have a chance to see on private view the picture which has stirred the public by so much discussion in Pittsburgh. In such an event there will doubtless be a critical comparison between this famous painting and "September Morn," and the activities of Anthony Comstock will be closely watched in the effort to decide whether the appreciation of real art is less in Pittsburgh than it is in this city.

15 Hurt by Collision.

FARIBAULT, Minn., July 10.—Fifteen persons were injured, several probably fatally, when a freight train crashed into a suburban car near here.

Women and men in the forward end of the car were jammed and cut with broken glass and wooden splinters. One woman had both eyes put out by glass.

The motorman of the car did not see the on-coming freight until too late to avert the collision.

Escaped Trusty Caught.

BAKER, Ore., July 10.—Word of the arrest and confession of a horse-thief, who stole two horses from Sam Hale, at Whitney, June 23, was received from a deputy sheriff at Wallula, who telephoned that S. C. Thompson who had escaped from the penitentiary, had been arrested at Lind, Wash., and had confessed.

Thompson was convicted in Baker county last year for horse stealing and October 19 was taken to the penitentiary to serve a term of one to ten years. He escaped in April and was not heard of until his arrest.

MILKERS BADLY WANTED ON WASHINGTON FARMS

SPOKANE, WASH., July 7.—So rapidly has the dairy industry developed in the last few years, due to the introduction of diversified farming in the Spokane country, that a shortage of milkers is resulting, according to dairymen, Thomas S. Griffith, owner of a large dairy on the Little Spokane river, states that 1,000 milk cows have been shipped into eastern Washington since January 1, and that demand for good stock continues heavy.

"The rapid development of the dairy business has resulted in a shortage of milkers," says Mr. Griffith. "Our dairymen are not using milking machines extensively. So-called Swiss milkers are not hired in the first class dairies, and the workmen are required to work 'dry handed' in order to prevent contamination of the milk."

At present the mines and all stores are closed. It is reported starvation will bring on more trouble shortly unless this strike is settled.

Choice Is Given Strikers.

NOGALES, Ariz., July 10.—Colonel Calles, commander of the rebel garrison in Sonora, has given the 2500 striking miners at Cananea the alternative of going to work, leaving the camp or joining the army. This was the news brought here by John Bowman, United States consul at Nogales, Sonora, on his return from Cananea.

An apple tree belonging to S. W. Alexander of Los Angeles county, California, is exciting considerable interest because it bore two crops in one season, and the second crop was of a different variety than the first. The apples of the first crop were light in color and of medium size, while the second edition were dark reddish in color and in no way resembling the earlier crop.

As usual, Enoch protests he does not know why he was thus treated, and the assailant has not yet been captured.

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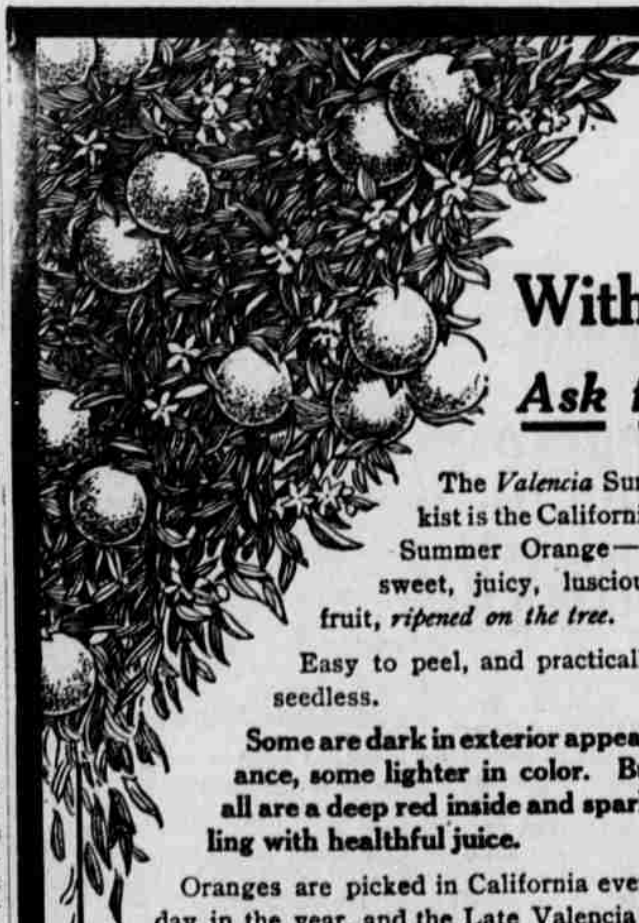
