The Care of Children

Health and Beauty.

Cream the face before going into the sun for several hours' exposure, then powder lightly; this will prevent the sun from further drying and burning the skin. A rub with pure almond oil several times a week, massaging it well into the pores, using a rotary motion around, up and out. Spasmodic croup is common in young babies and dangerous, too, unless one knows exactly what to do. The room should be very warm, hot cloths or poultices should be applied over the throat and either a croup kettle or an ordinary teakettle kept boiling in the room. This is more efficacious if the child is placed in a tent made by raised umbrella with a sheet thrown over it, and the steam introduced beneath this tent. Whenever the symptoms reach a point where breathing becomes difficult a doctor should be summoned without delay.

The Porch Pillow.

Nothing is more enjoyable than porch pillows for the hammock or easy chairs and a balsam pillow is more delightful than any other. The odor quiets the nerves, refreshes the tired one and induces a restful nap.

A pretty slip for such a pillow is best made of tan linen with a pine tree crossstitched upon it.

Care of Combs.

Combs, like stockings, should be washed before being used, if one would get the best possible wear out of them. Wash the comb in a suds made of tepid water and pure white soap and then rub hard with a soft rag moistened with olive oil.—Newark News.

W. leaders who will be called upon to face trial in Tammany on charges of riotous conduct in connection with the "murdering" campaign against John D. Rockefeller.
