

MILLION FOR STATE
FROM AUTO LICENSES

SACRAMENTO, July 12.—Between August 19, 1913, and May 31, 1914, the California motor vehicle department took in \$1,169,669 in automobile license fees, according to a report completed by the state engineer, head of the department.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1913, the state's revenue from this same source was only \$55,810. Collection of the tax at that time was under the secretary of state's supervision. The new law, under which the state engineer is now acting, called for a much more energetic prosecution of the business of collection. Automobile owners fought the law hard but the state beat them. There are at present registered in California 199,514 automobiles and 29,427 motorcycles.

Old Claims Arbitrated.

PARIS, July 12.—When the Anglo-American claims arbitration tribunal reassembles here in a few days a number of claims of long standing will be decided. Some of the cases are said to date back nearly a century and have already been argued. In such cases decisions will be announced.

Fir to Displace Yellow Pine.

BERLIN, July 12.—That the Douglas fir of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia will displace and crowd out the yellow pine in the building market of Europe when the Panama canal is completed, is the prediction of the German "Holzzeit" (Timber World). German builders and lumber dealers, says the "Holzzeit," look for great imports of Douglas fir as soon as quicker and cheaper transportation from the Pacific coast is afforded through the canal. It declares that no industry in Europe will profit more by the canal than the timber and lumber industry.

Feed "Tummy," Then Berlin.

BERLIN, July 12.—The school authorities of Berlin have ordered that commencing with the fall term, children in the lower grammar grades shall be officially weighed and measured every six months to carefully note their physical development. Should it be found that poor children are not receiving the proper nourishment for normal increase in growth and weight, this is to be remedied by providing them with breakfast and luncheon in the schools at the expense of the city. The authorities have found it uphill work to cram knowledge into a brain when the little "tummy" that feeds the brain with blood, is empty. Also that big heads and weak bodies make a poor combination for the future of the nation.

National Guard Maneuvers.

GEARHART, Ore., July 12.—Two thousand national guardsmen from Oregon and Idaho and 599 regulars from the twenty-first infantry stationed at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., entered camp here for ten days of maneuvering. This is the largest body of military men ever gathered in encampment in the state's history. The twenty-first infantry marched to camp, a distance of about 100 miles, leaving Vancouver Barracks July 2 and arriving here several days ago.

TOPEKA, Kansas, July 12.—That the newly enfranchised Kansas women are taking keen interest in politics and will cast as heavy a vote in proportion as the men in the August primaries and congressional and state election this fall, is the belief of campaigners who report that the attendance at political meetings over the state is about half men and half women.

Interlake Regatta Week.

PUT-IN-BAY, July 12.—The annual regatta of the Interlake Yachting Association opened here and will continue throughout the week. The Cleveland Boat Club, the Vermillion boat club and the Lone Star Club of Toledo are new members which will compete.

SOMERSET, Ky., July 12.—A show with a "dancing Cleopatra" as an attraction opened here and bucked against the street preaching of the Rev. James L. Delk, a traveling evangelist.

The preacher and Cleopatra jacked at each other on platforms on opposite sides of the street. Then Cleopatra's dark eyes flashed. The snapped her fingers wrathfully and whacked the evangelist with her umbrella. The Rev. Mr. Delk sought refuge in the courts. Cleopatra and two other dancers were arrested. They pleaded guilty of having "mused up" the parson, and they were fined 1 cent and costs each.

The preacher was fined \$50 and costs and sentenced to ten days in jail after a jury had found him guilty of a breach of the peace.

Find a Mine in the Street.

SAN BERNARDINO, July 12.—At Atolla on the desert a rich strike of tungsten ore has been made in the middle of the main street, where for years miners have trod back and forth between the saloons while at work in the tungsten mines.

The discovery of the vein was made by Crook and Lypps, who have already taken a lease there. The ore will run as high as 50 per cent, according to the report which came in today.

CONWAY, Ark., July 12.—C being to the pilot of a speeding train with one hand, D. C. Fowler, a fireman on the Iron Mountain railway, with the other hand rescued a three-year-old child from being run over near here.

The child was playing along the tracks and was not discovered by the engineer until it was too late to stop the train to prevent killing the baby. Fowler climbed over the engine and pulled the child to safety.

The weight of the infant and his stooped position almost threw him in front of the engine but he held on until the train stopped.
